



# Shipping & Passenger Records

This is a guide to resources relating to shipping and passenger records of relevance to family historians and held by Ryde Library Services. Most of the items listed can be found in the **Family History Collection (G)** at Ryde Library. The majority of the records themselves are on microfilm or microfiche. A few items listed are held in the Reference collection at Ryde Library and others are available for loan through one of the branch libraries of Ryde Library Services. Records of convict arrivals are discussed in a separate guide to *Convict Records*.

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# ASSISTED IMMIGRANTS

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A number of schemes operated in the nineteenth century to enable individuals or families to emigrate to the Australian colonies. The schemes usually either paid for or subsidised the cost of the passage and often provided employment for the immigrants once they arrived.

In **NEW SOUTH WALES** government schemes were designed to meet specific needs of the colony for skilled labour and tradespeople. The 'Bounty Scheme' paid a bounty to recruiting agents in Britain to find able-bodied men and women of good character, with appropriate skills and not exceeding a certain age or specified number of children. Another scheme sought to redress a colonial imbalance of the sexes by attracting single female immigrants. The Poor Law immigration scheme, on the other hand, attempted to alleviate unemployment in England by sponsoring the migration of thousands of labouring people from England and Wales. The Donegal Relief Fund established in Sydney enabled evicted tenants in Donegal in 1859 and 1861 to emigrate and the remittance or nomination system allowed relatives or prospective employers to pay a deposit for nominated immigrants.

Various assisted immigration schemes also existed in the other Australian colonies. Sources of information on immigration schemes to all Australian colonies are listed on pp. 9-11 of this guide.

Ryde Library Services has records of assisted immigration to **NEW SOUTH WALES** from 1828 to 1896. These records include arrivals at **PORT PHILLIP** until 1851 when Victoria became a separate colony and arrivals at **MORETON BAY** until 1859 when Queensland became a separate colony. A list of immigrant ships can be found on pp.95-138 of the Archives Office of New South Wales *Guide to Shipping and Free Passenger Records* G325.94 ARCH. Ryde Library also has an index to assisted immigrants arriving in **TASMANIA** between 1841 to 1889 and some lists of **QUEENSLAND** immigrants.

Between January 1836 and August 1840 the Colonization Commissioners of South Australia received over 9000 applications from labourers within the British Isles seeking a free passage to the new colony of South Australia. This is an alphabetical list of applicants who were given an embarkation number and others known to have arrived under the scheme. The list refers to the *Register of Emigrant Labourers applying for a free passage to South Australia*, a microfilm copy of that is available through the Australian Joint Copying Project at the State Library of New South Wales.

***19th century voyages to Queensland***

The Genealogical Society of Queensland has published some passenger lists in a series called **19th century voyages to Queensland**. These include the following:

***Montmorency***

The *Montmorency* made 4 voyages to Queensland as an emigrant ship, in 1860, 1862, 1863 and 1865, bringing nearly 1400 people. This publication gives passenger and crew lists for each voyage. Additional details given for 1860 and 1862 include age; occupation and place of origin, while the 1863 and 1865 lists give only name and age.



***Windsor Castle***

The *Windsor Castle* made voyages to Queensland in 1876, 1877, 1878, 1879, 1880, 1881, bringing both assisted and unassisted passengers. This publication gives passenger lists for each voyage, including age and status.

***Great Victoria***

The *Great Victoria* made one voyage to Queensland as an emigrant ship in 1865 carrying 649 passengers, including some people who paid their own passage. No proper passenger list for the *Great Victoria* survives and this publication, compiled from various sources, lists only names and sources of information.

## **THE AUSTRALIAN AGRICULTURAL COMPANY:**

Between 1825 and 1862 the Australian Agricultural Company brought over 700 men to New South Wales to work either on the company's extensive pastoral estates or at its colliery in Newcastle. These people were managers, overseers, skilled mechanics; shepherds, miners and unskilled labourers and many of them were accompanied by their wives and families. # UNASSISTED PASSENGERS

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Throughout the nineteenth century a large number of immigrants paid their own passage to Australia. Some paid for first class cabins some for an intermediate cabin and some traveled steerage. Ryde Library has some lists of unassisted passengers arriving in New South Wales, South Australia, Tasmania and Victoria.

Arranged chronologically by date of ship's arrival. **Pastkeys**, a genealogy research service, has a project to index NSW records of unassisted arrivals. For a fee they will undertake searches for the period 1842-1854.

The information given about each passenger in these records is often scant. For example, the list of passengers arriving on the *St. George* on November 9 1845 includes a "Miss Poole", with no further details to distinguish her from other "Miss Poole's" who arrived in the 1840's.



Sometimes the "Shipping Intelligence" columns of the *Sydney Morning Herald* provide further detail. In this example, the *Herald* of November 10 1845 reported that "Miss A.E. Poole" had arrived on the *St. George*. Ryde Library Services holds the *Sydney Morning Herald* for the following years:

## **CALIFORNIAN GOLD RUSHES:**

Thousands of Australians tried their luck on the Californian gold fields in the mid-nineteenth century. From Sydney alone 4900 people were listed as departing for San Francisco on 111 ships between 1849 and 1851. Their names can be found in:

A number of those who left for California did not return. A correspondent in San Francisco wrote to the *Sydney Morning Herald* in November 1849 with the following report: "I am led, from my own observation, to believe that if any one hundred Australians who may leave the colonies in health were correctly accounted for at the end of a year, it would be found that about twenty have died, thirty have been so injured in their constitution that their recovery is hopeless, twenty will have disappeared altogether and cannot be accounted for, ten will be about as well off as when they left Sydney and ten may have money - and, if anything, I think this rather too favourable a view of the case". (*Sydney Morning Herald* 7.2.1850) Around 2500 of those who did return are listed in:

365 emigrants, bound for Port Phillip from England and Ireland, drowned when their ship was wrecked on August 4 1845 within one day of its destination. Of all the passengers on the ship just one survived and only 8 out of 44 crewmember lived through the wreck.

Some of the emigrants had relatives in the colony. This book reconstructs the voyage of the *Cataraqui*, discusses the origins of the emigrants and provides an authoritative list of crew and passengers.
