Highlights 2007/2008

People

We installed new security and a self check system into the Eastwood, North Ryde and Ryde libraries, with four branches now converted to self-service reservation collection, providing a speedy process for library users.

Promotion of Brush Farm House as a new cultural facility – for events, tours and art exhibitions.

Formation of Aboriginal Community Working Group and Aboriginal Educational Consultative Committee.

Children's conference at Macquarie University.

Assets

\$30 million of new and replacement infrastructure was completed.

Council's largest footpath program on record was completed with seven kilometres of paving laid in 27 locations.

Four kilometres of cycleway were constructed.

Major park upgrades at Ryde Park (Stage 2) included the new cenotaph and landscaping adjacent to Blaxland Road and the upgrade of the main oval. The construction of Anderson Park has also been completed as part of the Parramatta River foreshore parkland.

Environment

The City achieved a high four star rating in Sydney Water's 'Every Drop Counts' Business Program, achieving a water saving equivalent to 6,900 x 10 litre buckets of water!

Developed an Economic Development Strategy for the City.

In conjunction with the developers of the Top Ryde City shopping centre the 'Top Ryder' Community Bus Service was created, encouraging people to use this free public transport for local trips instead of using the car.

Significant improvement in approval time for Development Applications, placing the City of Ryde among the top performing councils in NSW.

Governance

Installation of Customer Service Kiosks in all library branches to facilitate easy access to Council services and information.

Achieved improved operating surplus to deliver a strong financial position.

Initiated Country Council Partnership with Central Darling Shire Council.

Upgraded corporate governance framework improving internal audit and risk management for greater transparency and accountability.

Volunteer Recognition Awards

The Volunteer Recognition Awards are held every year in conjunction with National

Volunteer Week to honour the largely unseen army of volunteers who generously give their time and skills to uplift and benefit the lives of so many in our community.

- Volunteer of the Year: Rob Wilkinson, for 30 years of service to the community, particularly for his work with Rotary's ROMAC project which raises money to provide medical treatment for children from developing countries
- Young Volunteer of the Year: Arda Lepedjian, a valued member of the Armenian Apostolic Church who works to bring young people together to help those in need
- Group Volunteer of the Year: Ryde Hospital Pink Ladies, a group of 48 dedicated women who assist patients and staff in a variety of areas.

Financial Overview and Five Year Trend

The City of Ryde financial result for 2007/2008 of an operating result of \$29.9 million reflects Council's continuing strong financial performance.

Council achieved an operating result before capital of \$21.3 million which is an increase on the surplus by \$14.6 million for the previous year. This is the third successive year that Council has achieved an operating surplus before capital and indicates that the regular costs incurred by Council in its normal day to day service delivery operations is less than revenue received from providing these services.

This allows Council to generate sufficient funds to provide for asset replacement and strategic service delivery projects and is key to Council's long term financial sustainability.

Key features of the 2007/2008 result are:

- Council delivered \$28.3 million on capital expenditure, an increase of \$4 million from the previous year, with major projects including:
 - Town Centre upgrades (\$2.9 million)
 - Roadworks (\$5.2 million)
 - Footpaths & Cycleways (\$3 million)
 - Community Halls & Facility Upgrades (\$0.6 million)
 - Catchments (\$4.7 million)
 - Parks (\$4.5 million)
 - Ryde Aquatic Leisure Centre (\$0.3 million)
 - Technology Systems (\$2 million)
- Working capital of \$2.2 million, to cover day to day operations and provide a buffer for unforeseen expenditures
- Council's debt service ratio has been steadily declining over the past 6 years with 2% of our total revenue committed to loan repayments in 2007/2008

- Council receives approximately 48% of its revenue from rates and annual charges and has consistently achieved an excellent recovery rate with only 2.8% of rates outstanding.
- Council's unrestricted current ratio, which is a measure of its capacity to satisfy obligations in the short term, remained sound and is a healthy 3.65 : 1
- Council's level of internal reserves (funds put aside for specific projects) has increased from \$15 million in 2002/2003 to \$59 million in 2007/2008.

The Council's financial indicators as attested to by its auditors Spencer Steer reflect that it is in a sound financial position, however it faces a number of challenges in the years ahead.

Some of Council's investments have been impacted by the current global financial crisis as have superannuation funds, businesses and all levels of government. Council has taken responsible action to contain losses by establishing an \$8 million Financial Security reserve to contain losses to ensure our service delivery is not affected.

Council continues to address its long term financial sustainability, a major issue for Local Government across Australia, through its Long Term Financial Strategy (LTFS).

The City of Ryde owns over \$2.4 billion in essential infrastructure (roads, footpaths, drains, libraries, community buildings etc) and is well advanced in developing asset management plans for all of its assets. It is estimated that the cost to bring these assets up to a satisfactory condition is in the order of \$74 million and based on Council's LTFS, it needs to spend around an additional \$4 million per year on asset renewal.

Council is continuing its proactive approach to Asset Management to ensure the community's assets are maintained.


