Ryde Lights to Light up Eastwood this Saturday

The next phase of the exciting <u>Ryde Lights</u> initiative will be launched this Saturday from 4 pm at Eastwood Night Markets as part of the <u>Lunar New Year Celebrations</u>.

The display will light up Eastwood Plaza at sunset with a special Lunar New Year installation that includes 800 illuminated red lanterns. The lights will be turned on at 8pm on Saturday 24 February.

Ryde Lights is a key component of Council's Night Time Economy Action Plan and is designed to enhance the night time economy in the City of Ryde through the installation of creative lighting displays throughout the community.

The lighting installed at Eastwood Plaza is the latest phase of the initiative with the first phase unveiled in Trim Place at Gladesville in December last year. Additional instalments are planned for ANZAC Park in West Ryde during April's Cinema in the Park series and Meadowbank Wharf by the middle of the year.

City of Ryde Mayor, Clr Jerome Laxale, said the Ryde Lights initiative was a direct response to the community's clear desire for creative lighting to be installed as a way of activating spaces at night.

"The City of Ryde is determined to do more to enhance the night time economy throughout the community. Vibrant night time activities can enhance economic growth, create jobs and build community cohesion," Clr Laxale said.

"Initiatives such as Ryde Lights are only the first stage of the Night Time Economy Action Plan, with Council keen to pursue policies that will make it easier for local businesses to become involved in the night time economy."

It is anticipated the Ryde Lights installations will remain in place until 2020.

Ryde Aquatic Leisure Centre Water Quality Safe

A story was published in Saturday's Daily Telegraph (17 Feb 2018) in relation to water quality at 5 public swimming pool locations including the Ryde Aquatic Leisure Centre.

Council would like to assure our customers that the Ryde Aquatic Leisure Centre is open for business and is safe for the community to use.

Council categorically refutes the Daily Telegraph's bacteria reading (Heterotrophic Plate Count) that has been quoted in the article and we are dubious that all 5 Aquatic Centres could record similarly high readings. In addition, Council has also made contact with the other Aquatic Centres this morning who also refute the results.

The Daily Telegraph has failed to provide Council information regarding its testing procedure including methodology, when and where it took place and how the samples were collected and transported for testing, to assist Council in determining how such a varied test result for the heterotrophic count was reportedly established. In addition, Council has not been provided with or given the opportunity to view the official laboratory results.

Council continuously upholds water quality requirements and rigorously conducts water tests. All Council records are compliant with Public Health requirements.

Council has a robust methodology of monitoring water quality at Ryde Aquatic Leisure Centre which includes a raft of regular and comprehensive testing to ensure the water quality is of a standard that does not pose any risk to users of the facility.

This testing of the water quality includes regular independent assessment by the NSW Government's Health Department and for a number of years has consistently returned results that comply with relevant water quality criteria of the Public Swimming Pool and Spa Pool Advisory Document, Health Protection NSW. The most recent independent test undertaken of the pools at the Ryde Aquatic Leisure Centre found a heterotrophic colony count to comply with the standards set by NSW Health.

City of Ryde Council Appoints New General Manager

During his time as Acting General Manager, Mr Dedes has demonstrated that he is the perfect fit to lead the operations of the City of Ryde and oversee key projects that are planned for 2018 and beyond.

In addition, Mr Dedes' leadership, communication and service delivery skills have strengthened the commercial focus of Council, improving service delivery for the Ryde community in an environment of continuous change.

Mr Dedes will commence the role of General Manager effective immediately.

Council Seeks Assurances around Funding for Eastwood Upgrades

Following two council resolutions in 2017, the City of Ryde has sought an update about the status of a \$25 million grant pledged last October by Member for Ryde, the Hon. Victor Dominello, to build a new commuter car park and install sets of signalised pedestrian lights in Eastwood as part of the NSW Government's Transport Access Plan Grants program.

Council is still awaiting the details regarding the security of the funding since the October announcement. To date, Council has not received any of the funding and confusion surrounds what the grant can, and cannot, be used for.

Council has strongly supported the installation of traffic signals throughout the traffic network in Eastwood, having made multiple applications since 2009. Council remains reliant on the NSW Government funding and approvals to begin preliminary work on this project. Given Mr Dominello's public announcements, Council is also seeking confirmation that the proposed grant can be used for pedestrian lights. To date, no such confirmation has been received.

City of Ryde Mayor, Clr Jerome Laxale, met with a representative of Mr Dominello's office and staff from Transport for NSW last week to seek assurances that the grant funding had been approved, what the grant can be used for and when Council would likely receive the funding. Despite Mr Dominello setting the meeting time and place, he did not attend.

"Council requested the meeting because we have not received any further information about its specifics," Clr Laxale said.

"Furthermore, the promises made verbally and in the local press by Mr Dominello, do not match what has been conveyed by Transport for NSW officials."

"Our residents and business owners deserve clarity on this promise. What is it for, and when will it be delivered? Once the Council has that, we will be in a much better position to finalise our preferred sites for pedestrian lights and increased parking

"Despite Mr Dominello's absence, I believe that the meeting finished on a positive note with Transport for NSW and ministerial staffers making a commitment to provide all the information requested by Council in writing."

Council will continue to proceed with the Comprehensive Traffic and Parking Study of Eastwood and surrounds, passed unanimously by all Councillors on 24 October 2017. The study is due to report back to Council in the first half of 2018.
