RYDE RIVER WALK'S NEW GLADESVILLE SECTION REVEALS HIDDEN GEMS

Some of Ryde's 'hidden gems' will be revealed when the new Gladesville Section of the Ryde River Walk is officially opened on Sunday 11 October.

Residents are invited to a community celebration to mark the completion of the works connecting a string of beautiful parks and natural areas between Banjo Paterson Park and Bill Mitchell Park.

Ryde Mayor, Clr Jerome Laxale, said: "We have worked hard to preserve the foreshore environment and improve public access to this picturesque and historically significant stretch of the Ryde River Walk.

"The new works, recently completed by the Council at a cost of \$1.8 million using Federal, State and City of Ryde funding, is the culmination of years of planning and negotiation and the community is invited to join the celebration."

The new 2km section, running through Bill Mitchell Park, Glades Bay and Looking Glass Bay to Banjo Paterson Park, replaces dirt tracks and unconnected walks with well-defined and signed all-weather pathways, a mangrove boardwalk, stairs, bridges and landscaping.

Ryde River Walk is a \$5 million City of Ryde project, in partnership with Federal and State Governments, creating a continuous green reserve along a 10km stretch of the Parramatta River, from Kissing Point to the western boundary of Meadowbank Park. It was created to improve the community's enjoyment of the unique attractions along the famous waterway with improved public access and enhanced recreational facilities. The shared pedestrian highway runs along the northern foreshore of the River, linking a network of parks, playgrounds, sports fields, historic sites and natural areas.
