REPORT SUMMARY

This report details Council's performance of its investment portfolio as at 30 June 2019 and compares it against key benchmarks. The report includes the estimated market valuation of Council's investment portfolio and loan liabilities.

Council's return for the reporting period is 2.84%, which is 1.22% above the benchmark figure of 1.62%.

Income from interest on investments and proceeds from sale of investments totals \$6.96M for the financial year to date, which is \$977K above the 2018/19 revised Budget. The vast majority of the \$977K is restricted income (for example, Income received via Development Contributions) and therefore does not benefit Working Capital.



Council's Investment Properties, valued as at 30 June 2018, are shown in **ATTACHMENT 1**.

The valuations listed have been undertaken in accordance with the revaluation process to 'best use' by an independent valuer, in compliance with the Australian Accounting Standards.

Council continues to utilise the Federal Government's current guarantee (\$250K) investing in Term Deposits with a range of Authorised Deposit Taking Institutions (ADI's) on short to medium term investments (generally 30 days to 180 days maturity) where more competitive rates are available.

Whilst Council has moved some of its investment portfolio out to longer terms, to lock in future returns, it should be noted that there is approximately \$95 million of Council's funds held in Internal Reserves (as at 30 June 2018).

Council's income from investments continues to exceed budgeted expectations, due primarily to Council receiving significant Developer Contributions. Interest on investments relating to available General Revenue funds also continues to rise.

Loan Liability

Council's loan liability as at 30 June 2019 was \$1.6 million which represents the balance of two loans were established under the Local Infrastructure Renewal Scheme (LIRS). Council receives a 3% interest subsidy payment from the OLG twice a year.

- A \$1.5M 10 year loan drawn down 31 January 2014 at 180 day BBSW +175 basis points for the Children's Play Implementation Plan, which was approved for an LIRS subsidy in Round 2. The interest rate for this loan is reset every six months;
- 2. A \$1.5M 10 year loan drawn down 1 September 2014 at 4.95% for Phase 2 of the Children's Play Implementation Plan, which was approved for an LIRS subsidy in Round 3.







Divestment of Fossil Fuel Aligned Financial Institutions

As at 30 June 2019, Council had a total amount of \$74.35 million (31.6%% of Council's total investment portfolio) invested in non-fossil fuel aligned financial institutions. A further \$17.5 million was invested in unrated financial institutions where their 'alignment status' is unclear/undetermined. It is almost certain all of these unrated financial institutions are non-fossil fuel aligned institutions as their lending profiles are almost identical to other unrated institutions. If it assumed those institutions are non-fossil fuel aligned financial institutions, then the total amount is \$91.85 million (39% of Council's total investment portfolio).

By way of comparison, Council had \$50.5 million (24.5% of its total investment portfolio) invested in non-fossil fuel aligned financial institutions, as at 31 January 2018.



Council's divestment from fossil fuel aligned financial institutions has increased by more than \$41m (an 82% increase) since January 2018.

Financial Implications

Council's return for the reporting period is 2.84%, which is 1.22% above the benchmark figure of 1.62%. Income from interest on investments and proceeds from sales of investments totals \$6.96M for the period ended 30 June 2019, \$977K above the 2018/19 year-to-date revised Budget. The vast majority of the \$977K is restricted income (for example, Income received via Development Contributions) and therefore does not benefit Working Capital.

Summary

Council's investment portfolio continues to perform well with returns well above benchmark. The recommendation in this report is consistent with Section 625 of the Local Government Act, which deals with the investment of surplus funds by Councils.

Benchmark

The Bloomberg Ausbond Bank Bill index is constructed as a benchmark to represent the performance of a passively managed short-term money market portfolio. It comprises thirteen Bank Bills of equal face value, each with a maturity seven days apart. The average term to maturity is approximately 45 days.

A Bank Bill is a non-interest bearing security issued by a bank whereby the bank takes on an obligation to pay an investor a fixed amount (face value) at a fixed future date. It is sold to an investor at a discount to the face value. Bank Bills are short-term money market investments with maturities usually between 30 days and 180 days.

Types of Investments

The following are the types of investments held by Council:

At Call refers to funds held at a financial institution, and can be recalled by Council either same day or on an overnight basis.

A Floating Rate Note (FRN) is a debt security issued by a company with a variable interest rate. This can either be issued as Certificates of Deposit (CD) or as Medium Term Notes (MTN). The interest rate can be either fixed or floating, where the adjustments to the interest rate are usually made quarterly and are tied to a certain money market index such as the Bank Bill Swap Rate.

A Fixed Rate Bond is a debt security issued by a company with a fixed interest rate over the term of the bond.

Credit Rating Information

Credit ratings are generally a statement as to an institution's credit quality. Ratings ranging from AAA to BBB- (long term) are considered investment grade.

A general guide as to the meaning of each credit rating is as follows:

AAA: the best quality companies, reliable and stable

AA: quality companies, a bit higher risk than AAA

A: economic situation can affect finance

BBB: medium class companies, which are satisfactory at the moment

BB: more prone to changes in the economy

B: financial situation varies noticeably

CCC: currently vulnerable and dependent on favourable economic conditions to meet its commitments

CC: highly vulnerable, very speculative bonds

C: highly vulnerable, perhaps in bankruptcy or in arrears but still continuing to pay out on obligations

D: has defaulted on obligations and it is believed that it will generally default on most or all obligations

Note: Ratings from 'AA' to 'CCC' may be modified by the addition of a plus (+) or minus (-) sign to show relative standing within the major rating categories.



ATTACHMENT 1

Council's Investment Powers

Council's investment powers are regulated by Section 625 of the Local Government Act, which states:

- (1) A council may invest money that is not, for the time being, required by the council for any other purpose.
- (2) Money may be invested only in a form of investment notified by order of the Minister published in the Gazette.
- (3) An order of the Minister notifying a form of investment for the purposes of this section must not be made without the approval of the Treasurer.
- (4) The acquisition, in accordance with section 358, of a controlling interest in a corporation or an entity within the meaning of that section is not an investment for the purposes of this section.

Council's investment policy requires that all investments are to be made in accordance with;

- Local Government Act 1993 Section 625
- Local Government Act 1993 Order (of the Minister) dated 12 January 2011
- The Trustee Amendment (Discretionary Investments) Act 1997 Sections 14A(2), 14C(1) & (2)
- Local Government (Financial Management) Regulation 1993
- Investment Guidelines issued by the Department of Local Government

Discussion

Council has previously endorsed the following three (3) Standing Committees:-

Council's Code of Meeting Practice allows for the three (3) Standing Committee meetings to be held on the second Tuesday of the months February to December inclusive.

The Code allows for Council meetings to be held on the fourth Tuesday of the months February to December inclusive.

A schedule of meeting dates for the remainder of 2019 and up to the Local Government Election in 2020 is provided for in **ATTACHMENT 1** for Council's consideration. The calendar may be amended at any time if Council resolves to alter the meeting day or to adjust the Council/Committee structure, although at least one month transition period is required in order for public notices to be amended.

The proposed schedule has taken into account public holidays such as Easter, Anzac Day and a July mid-year recess. The 2019 Local Government Conference will be held from Monday, 14 October 2019 to Wednesday, 16 October 2019 and as such will have no impact on the proposed meeting schedule.

The schedule has followed normal procedure for the majority of the year, however slight amendments are recommended as follows:-

Schedule of Meetings for December 2019

As previously resolved by Council, Council meetings are scheduled to be held on the fourth Tuesday of the month. Councillors should note that the December Council meeting is scheduled for 24 December 2019 (which is Christmas Eve).

Having regard to this, it is proposed to cancel all Committee meetings (Works and Community, Finance and Governance and Ryde Central) scheduled for the second Tuesday of the month (10 December 2019) and just hold a Council meeting in December 2019, to be held on the second Tuesday on the month being 10 December 2019.

Mid-Year Recess – July 2020

Discussion

Conference

The 2019 Local Government NSW Annual Conference will be held from Monday, 14 October 2019 to Wednesday, 16 October 2019 at The William Inglis Hotel, Warwick Farm. Attached is a copy of the Program and Registration details for the Conference (ATTACHMENT 1).

The Conference is the annual policy-making event for all Councils of New South Wales. It is the pre-eminent event of the Local Government year where local Councillors come together to share ideas and debate issues that shape the way we are governed.

Delegates Representing the City of Ryde

Council has been advised by Local Government NSW (LGNSW) that it is entitled to send seven (7) Councillors to the Conference as voting delegates.

In this regard, this report recommends that Council select seven (7) Councillors to attend the Conference as voting delegates.

Voting

This year the Conference will involve two types of voting and LGNSW is required to develop two separate rolls of voters:

1. Voting on Motions

2. Voting in the Election for Office Bearers and the Board (Board Election)

Ordinary members need to advise LGNSW of the name(s) of their nominated voting delegate(s) for both types of voting: voting on motions and voting in the Board Election.

With respect to voting in the Board Election, LGNSW has advised Council that six (6) Councillors are entitled to vote in the Election for Office Bearers and the Board Election.

In this regard, this report recommends that Council select six (6) Councillors to vote in the Election for Office Bearers and the Board Election.



Motions

Local Government NSW has requested input from Councils, to guide the content of business sessions at the conference and is requesting Councils to ensure that the motions debate centres on advancing the sector wide policy agenda.

Councils were asked to identify motions relating to the following overall categories:-

- 1. Association Business (Industrial Relations and Employment policy)
- 2. Economic policy
- 3. Infrastructure and planning policy
- 4. Social and Community policy
- 5. Environmental policy
- 6. Governance and Accountability of Councils (eg. legislative and regulatory setting, elections, participation, reform)

Further, the LGNSW Board has resolved that motions will be included in the Business Paper for the Conference only where they meet the following criteria:-

- Are consistent with the objects of the Association (see Rule 4 of the Association's rules – ATTACHMENT 2);
- 2. Relate to Local Government in NSW and/or across Australia;
- 3. Concern or are likely to concern Local Government as a sector;
- 4. Seek to advance the Local Government policy agenda of the Association and/or improve governance of the Association;
- 5. Have a lawful purpose (a motion does not have a lawful purpose if its implementation would require or encourage non-compliance with prevailing laws):
- 6. Are clearly worded and unambiguous in nature; and
- 7. Do not express preference for one or several members over one or several other members.

The Board has advised that it will not include motions in the Business Paper which do not advance the local government policy agenda. Therefore a motion will not be included if it is operational, rather than strategic; not local government business; focused on a local issue only or if the motion is consistent with past policies and actions of LGNSW or the Local Government and Shire's Association.

Local Government NSW have advised all Councils to submit proposed motions by 19 August 2019, however, in accordance with the Local Government NSW rules, the latest date motions can be accepted for inclusion in the Conference Business Paper is 16 September 2019. All Motions must be adopted by Council before submission to the Association.



Councillors were invited through the Councillor Information Bulletin dated 2 July 2019 to submit proposed motions and notes for Council to consider endorsing for submission to Local Government NSW for inclusion in the Business Papers for the Conference. Councillors were requested to submit any draft motions by 12 July 2019. It is noted that no motions were received from Councillors. The Executive Team have also not proposed any motions for Council's consideration.

Attendance at the Conference

Councillors can attend the Conference using their own vehicle and receive reimbursement on the travel expenses per kilometre should they wish to drive. Alternatively, taxi e-tickets can be issued to Councillors for travel to and from the Conference.

As this Conference is held in the Sydney Metropolitan area, accommodation will not be provided.

Critical Dates

The following deadlines are required to be met:-

- Early bird registrations paid by 9 September 2019.
- Councillor delegates and motions are to be determined and confirmed at the Council Meeting on Tuesday, 23 July 2019.
- Motions are to be submitted by 12 midnight, Monday, 19 August 2019 and no later than 16 September 2019.
- Voting Delegates on motions and Board Election will be confirmed to the Association by 12 midnight on Friday, 20 September 2019.

Financial Impact

Early-bird registration cost for the Conference is \$840.00 per person (paid by 9 September 2019).

Standard registration cost for the Conference is \$940.00 per person (paid by 1 October 2019).

In addition to the above summary, it is anticipated that additional costs for incidentals, meals and taxi fares would also be incurred. This will be determined after the Conference.

The total cost for attending this Conference is approximately \$1,137 (excluding meals, incidentals and taxi fare charges).

Currently there is an allocation of \$33,500 left in the 2019/2020 budget for Conferences.

Policy Implications



It promises to be an exciting and rewarding few days. I look forward to seeing you at Warwick Farm in October.

CONFERENCE VENUE



The William Inglis Hotel by Sofitel Warwick Farm

The conference will take place at The William Inglis Hotel, which is on Governor Macquarie Drive and directly accessible by road and train. Conference Overview

Registration to Attend the Conference

Registrations are now open on the LGNSW website. We invite councillors, mayors, general managers and senior staff to register as individuals or groups.

Member Early bird registration rate is \$840 and applies if you register and pay by 9 September 2019

Member Standard registration rate is \$940 for all registrations from 10 September – 2 October 2019

Dinner is not included in the overall registration cost and is an optional added cost of \$110. Members wanting to take advantage of the early bird rates, who are uncertain of the names of councillors attending, can still register and pay now and confirm names later, provided they do so by 2 October. (Delegates' names and alterations to delegates' names can be completed online.)

Note: Voting delegates must be registered to attend the Conference *and* be registered as a voting delegate.

Registration as a Voting Delegate

Separate from Conference registration, financial members must nominate the names of their voting delegates for voting on motions and, where applicable, for voting in the LGNSW Board election, by 12 midnight (AEST) on Friday, 20 September 2019.

Online registration is conducted through a secure site which accepts credit cards (Visa or Mastercard with a 1.0% surcharge), cheque and direct deposit payments. Once you have registered, you will receive a confirmation email and a tax invoice. Your registration will be confirmed once full payment is received.

Delegate Registration

On Monday, 14 October registration will open from 9.30am – 4.30 under cover between the main conference room and trade exhibition. Registration will move to the President's Opening Reception at Casula Powerhouse Arts Centre from 6.00pm – 8.00pm. Registration opens from 7.30am on Tuesday, 15 October at the William Inglis Hotel in the same area as the previous day.

Delegate registration fees include business papers, the President's Opening Reception, two-day business sessions including morning and afternoon tea, lunch, delegate networking functions, name badge and a satchel. The cost to attend the conference is heavily subsidised by LGNSW and sponsors.

Voting on Conference Motions

ATTACHMENT 2

RULE 4 – OBJECTS OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION

- 4. The objects of the Association shall be in New South Wales and elsewhere:
 - (a) to encourage, promote, protect and foster an efficient and effective autonomous, democratic system of Local Government elected by and responsible to local communities with its position constitutionally guaranteed and with adequate resources including revenue from State and Commonwealth Governments:
 - (b) to promote, maintain and protect the interests, rights and privileges of Local Government in New South Wales and of the constituent members of the Association:
 - (c) to encourage and assist Local Government to seek out, determine, assess and respond to the needs and aspirations of its constituents;
 - (d) to encourage, assist, promote and foster the achievement and maintenance of the highest level of integrity, justice, competence, effectiveness and efficiency of Local Government;
 - (e) to develop, encourage, promote, foster and maintain consultation and cooperation between councils and Local, State and Commonwealth Governments and their instrumentalities:
 - (f) to develop, encourage, promote, foster and maintain the financial and economic well-being and advancement of Local Government and for such purposes to undertake, establish, acquire, conduct or dispose of any business, enterprise, undertaking or venture which in the opinion of the Association is necessary, desirable or convenient;
 - (g) to represent the members of the Association and Local Government generally in their dealings with State and Commonwealth Governments, with statutory and other corporations, with the media and with the public;
 - (h) to promote, support and encourage Local Government at a State and national level:
 - (i) to provide an industrial relations service to members including:
 - (i) representing the interests of members in industrial matters before courts and tribunals;
 - (ii) assisting in negotiations relating to the settlement of disputes between members and their employees;
 - (iii) representing the interests of members in negotiating the establishment of and/or variation of industrial awards and agreements;
 - (iv) promoting training programs aimed at enhancing the performance of Local Government.
 - (j) to undertake or promote any activity which the Board determines to be for the benefit and/or interest of members and local government in New South Wales.

Councillor Attendance at Conferences Guideline

Related Policy

This guideline sets out the criteria to determine the attendance of Councillors at Conferences It relates to the Policy on the Payment of Expenses and Provision of Facilities for the Mayor and Other Councillors.

Guidelines

Council acknowledges the value of Councillor attendance at conferences to enable them to be both knowledgeable and current on issues affecting the City of Ryde. In order to ensure that attendance at Conferences is equitable, transparent and consistent, attendance will be limited as follows:

- 1. Local Government Association Conference the number of voting delegates plus one. Details of the delegates and attendee to be determined by resolution of Council.
- 2. Australian Local Government Association Conference.
- 3. In addition, to 1 and 2 above, every Councillor is entitled to attend one conference in either NSW, Canberra, metropolitan Brisbane or metropolitan Melbourne. The conference must directly relate to the business of Council. More than one Councillor may attend the same conference if Council resolves that this will be beneficial for both Council and the Councillors concerned.
- 4. Within 2 months after the conference the attending Councillor must report to Council on the proceedings of the conference. That report will be included in the Councillors Information Bulletin.
- 5. No Councillor can attend a Conference without the prior approval of Council. Reports to Council are to include details of the Conference and an estimate of the associated costs including registration, transport and accommodation.
- 6. Council may resolve that a Councillor can attend more than one conference per year but this determination will be dependent on budgetary constraints and with an emphasis on ensuring that all Councillors have equal access to conferences.
- 7. Each year, as part of the review of the Policy on the Payment of Expenses and Provision of Facilities for the Mayor and Other Councillors, Council officers will provide a full report of expenditure and Conference attendance by Councillors.

6 PLANNING PROPOSAL - HERITAGE REVIEW

REPORT SUMMARY

At its meeting of 28 November 2017 Council unanimously resolved:

That Council, in order to ensure certainty in the development process, undertakes a City wide heritage study to ensure items of heritage significance are identified and options for their adequate protection recommended.

In response to the above resolution GML Heritage Consultants were engaged by Council in 2018 to conduct a detailed heritage review of the City of Ryde Local Government Area.

GML Consultants have identified in a report titled "City of Ryde Heritage Review" dated June 2019 (ATTACHMENT 1 – CONFIDENTIAL – CIRCULATED UNDER SEPARATE COVER) built, landscape and archaeological items that are of heritage significance to the City of Ryde for inclusion in *Schedule 5 Environmental heritage* of the Ryde Local Environmental Plan 2014 (RLEP2014).

Based on the recommendations of the GML report, a Planning Proposal (the Proposal) (ATTACHMENT 2 – CONFIDENTIAL – CIRCULATED UNDER SEPARATE COVER) has been prepared. The Proposal seeks to make the following amendments to Schedule 5 Environmental heritage of RLEP2014:

- 1. Part 1 Heritage Items 44 new heritage items.
- 2. Part 2 Heritage conservation areas 6 new heritage conservation areas
- 3. Part 3 Archaeological sites 2 new archaeological sites.
- 4. Amend descriptions of 8 existing heritage items.

The Proposal also seeks to amend RLEP2014 *Heritage Maps* to incorporate the additional heritage items, conservation areas and archaeological sites.

The Proposal was reviewed by the Ryde Local Planning Panel at its meeting of 4 July 2019. The Panel has advised the following:

The Panel recommends to Council that the planning proposal be submitted for Gateway Determination under Section 3.34 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979.

This report outlines the Proposal and provides a preliminary assessment in accordance with the requirements of the gateway plan-making process.



As the proposed changes will ensure that places of high heritage significance are identified and adequately protected, this report recommends that Council supports forwarding the Proposal to the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment for a Gateway Determination and, upon receipt of approval, to undertake community consultation. An extensive community consultation program is proposed including community drop-in sessions, multi-lingual materials, and letter box drops to directly affected owners. Drop in sessions will held in locations to facilitate attendance by impacted residents. A Councillor Workshop will also be held (currently scheduled for August 2019) prior to the Proposal being reported back to Council.

It is also proposed to increase the funding available to owners of Heritage Items under Council's *Local Heritage Assistance Fund*. Currently, \$75,000 (2019/20-2021/22) is allocated to fund this program, which offers grants of up to \$5,000 for works to conserve and enhance the significance of Heritage Items. A one off increase of \$500,000 is proposed, with the additional funds to be subject to a maximum grant of \$15,000. The purpose of this increase is to ensure sufficient funds are available for owners of existing and newly listed items, should the Planning Proposal proceed.

RECOMMENDATION:

- (a) That Council submit the Planning Proposal Heritage Review for Gateway Determination, in accordance with Section 3.34 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979 and that Council request delegation from the Minister to implement the Plan.
- (b) That Council, when the Gateway Determination is issued pursuant to Section 3.34 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979, delegate authority to the General Manager to publicly exhibit the Planning Proposal. A further report will be presented to Council following the completion of the exhibition period.
- (c) That Council allocate an additional \$500,000 from General Revenue to Council's existing *Local Heritage Assistance Fund* and that this additional funding be available for grants of up to \$15,000. A further report detailing the grant process will be presented to Council with the results of the exhibition of the Planning Proposal.
- (d) That a two hour Councillor Workshop be held to discuss the Heritage Review and the Local Heritage Assistance Fund.
- (e) That the General Manager write to the Hon. Member for Lane Cove, Anthony Roberts MP, the Hon. Member for Ryde, Victor Dominello MP, and the Hon Minister for Planning and Public Spaces, Rob Stokes MP, to seek their support for the Heritage Review and the expeditious processing of the Planning Proposal.

Background

Ryde Heritage Study 2010

The Ryde Heritage Study 2010 identified and recommended the heritage listing of 71 properties (47 dwellings, 15 public buildings/churches and 9 stone survey markers), together with updating information on existing items and boundary changes to a conservation area.

At its meeting of the 17 August 2010, Council resolved to:

- list properties only where the owners consented to the heritage listing,
- · update existing heritage listings, and
- make boundary changes to reduce the size of the Maxim Street Heritage Conservation Area.

In summary 6 dwellings, 2 public buildings and 9 stone markers were listed.

Council further resolved not to pursue the heritage listing of any property unless the land owner specifically applied for a heritage listing and that the properties that had been rejected from this process not be considered in any future heritage.

As a result, sites of known local heritage significance are currently not afforded any statutory protection and are eligible for demolition and/or redevelopment by Complying Development or merit assessment.

Since 2010, of the items identified in the study:

- 1 has been significantly damaged by fire and is beyond salvageable repair,
- 9 have been demolished or are subject to approval for demolition,
- Several have also been the subject of alterations, and
- 2 have been subject to Interim Heritage Orders and subsequent Planning Proposals resulting in amendments to RLEP2014 to list the items in Schedule 5 Environmental heritage.

Interim Heritage Orders (IHO)

An IHO is a temporary heritage protection measure which prohibits demolition of the item listed and requires approval for any development of that item for the life of the order. An IHO provides Council with the time to further assess the heritage significance of a potential item and take the appropriate steps to list the item if warranted.

In response to community concern regarding the loss of local heritage, two of the properties identified in the 2010 study, 87 Bowden Street Meadowbank and 330 Rowe Street Eastwood, have had IHOs imposed and in both cases the IHOs on the sites culminated in subsequent amendments to RLEP2014 and the listing of the two properties as items of local heritage significance on Schedule 5 Environmental heritage.

When reviewing the action to be undertaken to protect and heritage list 330 Rowe Street Eastwood Council on the 28 November 2017 resolved in part the following:

That Council, in order to ensure certainty in the development process, undertakes a City wide heritage study to ensure items of heritage significance are identified and options for their adequate protection recommended.



Since 2017, a further two IHOs have been imposed on the following properties in Ryde:

• 68 Denistone Road Denistone – on 25 September 2018 Council resolved to place an IHO over the property, prepare a PP to list the property as an item of local heritage significance within Schedule 5 Environmental heritage of RLEP 2014 and upon receipt of the Gateway Determination place the PP on community comment. An IHO was imposed on the property in September 2018. A detailed heritage assessment recommended that the property be listed. The PP for the site was exhibited from 29 May 2019 to 28 June 2019. As the PP has been exhibited, it has not been included in the city wide study and will be processed separately.

• 68 and 70 Chatham Road Denistone – on 26 February 2019 Council resolved to place an IHO on the property and prepare a PP to list multiple properties within Chatham Road, Denistone as a heritage conservation area of local heritage significance within Schedule 5 Environmental heritage of RLEP2014. GML Heritage Consultants assessment confirmed that the area warranted listing as a heritage conservation area. It has been included in the city wide review and it is proposed to be processed as part of this Planning Proposal.

GML Heritage Consultants

In response to the Council resolution of the 28 November 2017 a *Request for Proposal* (RFP) for a heritage study was developed, which included the following:

- Identify pre-1940 buildings and places of heritage significance for possible inclusion as heritage items or heritage conservation areas in Council's planning controls. This is consistent with feedback from the community (via DA submissions, the Community Strategic Plan, and the Heritage Advisory Committee) relating to protection of heritage and local character generated by development applications.
- Review the Character Areas and Special Areas identified in the Ryde Development Control Plan (DCP) 2014 Part 3 Development Types and Part 5 Special Areas for consideration as potential Heritage Conservation Areas.
- Compliance with guidelines produced by the Heritage Council of NSW.
- Produce Heritage Inventory Database Sheets for all places agreed to by Council in accordance with the NSW Heritage Manual Guidelines, the State Heritage Inventory Database guidelines which are stylistically consistent with Ryde Council's existing Heritage Inventory Database listings.

The RFP was open to all appropriately interested persons and organisations.

Submissions were required to detail:

- the proposed approach and methodology;
- the experience and qualification of individuals proposed to undertake the project;
- examples of experience in similar projects in the last 5 years.



Evaluation of the RFP submissions was carried out by a panel, based on the selection criteria identified in the RFP. GML Heritage Consultants were appointed in late 2018.

GML demonstrated significant industry experience and expertise in the fields of heritage planning, heritage conservation and archaeology and have advised NSW government agencies, Councils and private sector development professionals for over 20 years.

City of Ryde Heritage Review June 2019

The report provided by GML is informed by the principles contained in *The Burra Charter: the Australia ICOMOS Charter for Places of Cultural Significance*, 2013 (the Burra Charter). The heritage significance assessments undertaken as part of the review draw upon the principles contained in the Burra Charter and adhere to the methodology provided within the NSW Heritage Office publication *Assessing Heritage Significance*, 2001 and the detailed process set out in the *NSW Heritage Manual* published by the NSW Heritage Office.

The review was undertaken in three stages:

Stage 1 – Identification of potential places of significance

- Review background documents such as previous studies and potential listings identified by Council's planning staff.
- Broad review of the Ryde Local Government Area (LGA) for contextual environmental and historical understanding.
- Inspect potential properties from the public domain.
- Update the Ryde Heritage Advisory Committee on methodology and progress to date.
- Submit a shortlist of potential heritage items and conservation areas to Council planning staff for comment.

Stage 2 – Assessments of Significance, Draft Inventory Sheets and Draft Review Report

- Complete assessments against the NSW Heritage Office standard criteria including statements of significance and draft inventory sheets for the new heritage items and conservation areas.
- Draft the review report, including inventory sheets for each potential item for inclusion on the State Heritage Inventory Database.

Stage 3 – Final Review Report

• Finalise the report with comprehensive recommendations for additional items for inclusion on Schedule 5 of the RLEP2014.



The final review report contains further details as to the shortlisted sites and the recommended listings. However, in order to protect significant items from threat while no protections are currently in place, the final report is circulated confidentially under separate cover. Proposed items will be published should a Gateway determination approve the exhibition of the Proposal noting that the Draft Proposal would ensure heritage is considered should Council receive a development application to one of the properties proposed for listing.

Ryde Local Planning Panel

The Proposal was reviewed by the Ryde Local Planning Panel at its meeting of 4 July 2019. The Panel has advised the following:

The Panel recommends to Council that the planning proposal be submitted for Gateway Determination under Section 3.34 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979.

The decision is unanimous.

REASONS FOR THE DECISION

- 1. The Panel supports the process that has been undertaken by Council, including the heritage study carried out by GML Heritage Consultants and known as the "City of Ryde Heritage Review" dated June 2019, which from the reported history is needed.
- 2. The Environmental Planning & Assessment Act 1979 requires the orderly development of land. The planning proposal will support that outcome by enabling a transparent process informed by expert advice and comprehensive community participation that will enable clear identification of heritage items, conservation areas and landscape & archaeological places in the Ryde Local Environmental Plan.
- 3. The Planning Proposal is consistent with the applicable strategic planning framework and policies.

Note: The Panel encourages Council to consider a process for protecting the interiors of Heritage items.

With respect to the Panel's advice relating to the protection of significant interiors, this could be addressed in the future should Council wish; it does not affect the merit of the current proposal. It is also noted that the listings proposed identify the entire lot, and applicants seeking to develop heritage items will be required to submit heritage impact assessments relating to the entire site, including the interiors.



Discussion

This report contains a description of the proposed amendments to RLEP2014 and an appraisal of the Proposal. This appraisal forms the basis of a recommendation to forward the Proposal to the Minister for Planning for a Gateway Determination and to undertake subsequent community consultation.

Ryde Heritage Assistance Fund

Council currently operates a *Local Heritage Assistance Fund*, whereby owners of Heritage Items listed in *Schedule 5 Environmental heritage* of RLEP2014 are able to apply for funding of up to \$5000 for works to conserve and enhance the significance of their properties. Applications are assessed against specified criteria and presented to the Heritage Advisory Committee for endorsement prior to approval. Currently, \$75,000 is allocated to fund this program over the next three years (\$25,000 per year, 2019/20-2021/22).

The program provides an incentive for owners of properties listed in *Schedule 5 Environmental heritage* of RLEP2014 to undertake maintenance and improvement works to protect and enhance items of heritage significance.

A one off increase of \$500,000 is proposed, with the additional funds to be subject to a maximum grant of \$15,000. The purpose of this increase is to ensure sufficient funds are available for owners of existing and newly listed items, should the Planning Proposal proceed. The proposed increases will encourage a range of works and are also anticipated to be manageable from an administrative perspective, noting it is anticipated the existing application process, including the referral of applications to the Heritage Advisory Committee, would continue. A further report detailing the process will be provided following exhibition, however, it is anticipated that only minor adjustments to the current process will be required.

Future funding for the program beyond the one-off increase proposed would be subject to future Delivery Plans.

Planning Proposal - Gateway Plan Making Process

The Gateway process has a number of steps as outlined below:

- 1. Planning proposal this is an explanation of the effect of and justification for the proposed plan to change the planning provisions of a site or area which is prepared by a proponent or the relevant planning authority such as Council. The relevant planning authority decides whether or not to proceed to the next stage to seek a Gateway Determination.
- 2. Gateway Determination by the Minister for Planning or delegate if the planning proposal should proceed, and under what conditions it will proceed, including the community consultation process and any additional studies.



- **3. Community Consultation** the proposal is publicly exhibited.
- **4. Assessment** the relevant planning authority considers public submissions. The relevant planning authority may decide to vary the proposal or not to proceed. Where proposals are to proceed, it is Parliamentary Counsel which prepares a draft local environmental plan the legal instrument.
- **5. Decision** the making of the plan by the Minister (or delegate).

1.1 Current Planning Controls

RLEP 2014 - Schedule 5 Environmental heritage currently contains:

- 173 heritage items a mix of private, council and state authority owned properties
- 5 heritage conservation areas comprising:
 - o Brush Farm Park, Eastwood
 - Eastwood House Estate, Eastwood
 - o Gladesville Shopping Centre
 - Maxim Street, West Ryde
 - o Ryedale Road, West Ryde
- 2 archaeological sites located at Gladesville and Putney.

Development Control Plan (DCP) 2014 identifies a number of Special Areas including:

- Coronation Avenue and Trelawney Street Eastwood Character Areas
- Tyrell Street Gladesville Character Area and
- Denistone Character Area

The DCP is a guide and non-compliance with a provision of a DCP does not in and of itself prevent consent. Further, complying development may be carried out in character areas. By comparison, a conservation area identified in a Local Environmental Plan is afforded greater statutory weight allowing Council to require sympathetic design with respect to heritage and providing less flexibility for non-compliance.

1.2 Proposed amendments to RLEP2014

GML Heritage Pty Ltd (GML) was engaged by City of Ryde in 2018 to conduct a detailed heritage review of the City of Ryde Local Government Area. The study is limited to pre-1940 development.

GML were also requested to review the Character Areas and Special Areas identified in the Ryde DCP 2014 for consideration as potential Heritage Conservation Areas.



The report recommends the listing in RLEP2014 - Schedule 5 Environmental heritage of:

- 44 heritage items
- 2 archaeological sites
- 6 heritage conservation areas

The report also recommends amendments to 8 currently listed items.

Proposed heritage items

The heritage items comprise:

- 35 built items The majority of built heritage items are Federation, Victorian and interwar style dwellings. There are a number of churches, shopfronts and a school building
- 6 culturally significant landscape items Landscape sites include foreshore parks and public landscapes where the course and pattern of the items history warrants listing.
- 3 street tree listings 10 road verges are identified as containing significant street trees

The individual proposed heritage items are identified in *Section 4.0 Explanation of Provisions* on page 10 of the Proposal which is **ATTACHED UNDER SEPARATE COVER – CONFIDENTIAL.**

Proposed Conservation Areas

The 6 proposed Heritage Conservation Areas (HCA) and their physical characteristics are identified and on page 13 of the Proposal which is **ATTACHED UNDER SEPARATE COVER – CONFIDENTIAL.**

Proposed archaeological sites

The 2 proposed archaeological sites are:

- Glades Bay baths remnants located at Glades Bay Park and
- Former Squire's Brewery and Halverson's Boat Yard located at 20 Waterview Street Putney.

Amendments to existing heritage items

The proposed amendments to the description of 8 existing heritage items within *Schedule 5 Environmental heritage* of RLEP2014 are provided in Table 2 below:

In summary, based on the *City of Ryde Heritage Review* prepared by GML, the Planning Proposal – Heritage Review (ATTACHMENT 2 – CONFIDENTIAL – CIRCULATED UNDER SEPARATE COVER) seeks to make the following amendments to *Schedule 5 Environmental heritage* of Ryde Local Environmental Plan 2014:

- Part 1 Heritage Items Add 44 new heritage items,
- Part 2 Heritage conservation areas Add 6 new heritage conservation areas
- Part 3 Archaeological sites Add 2 new archaeological sites
- Amend descriptions of 8 existing heritage items.

The Proposal also seeks to amend RLEP 2014 *Heritage Maps* to incorporate the additional heritage items, conservation areas and archaeological sites.

1.3 Intended Outcomes and Justification

The Proposal's intended outcome is to:

- Provide appropriate protection for built, landscape and archaeological heritage within the City of Ryde, through new heritage listings in *Schedule 5 Environmental heritage* of RLEP 2014 and to ensure current heritage listings are correctly identified, and
- To ensure greater certainty is provided for in the development assessment process.

The Proposal (an amending LEP) is the Council's only means of ensuring the protection of properties and places within the City of Ryde assessed as having heritage significance. While Council is able to place IHOs upon potentially significant sites, an IHO is a temporary measure; it is only via a Planning Proposal that Council is able to afford ongoing protection

The Proposal will ensure that the sites are recognised and protected from development that may adversely affect the significance of the sites and their contribution to the environmental heritage of the City of Ryde.

Documentation covering the justification and the need for the proposal is provided in Part 5 – Justification on page 17 of the Proposal which is **ATTACHED UNDER SEPARATE COVER – CONFIDENTIAL.**



1.4 Appraisal of the Planning Proposal

Relationship to strategic planning framework

The strategic planning context for the consideration of this Planning Proposal includes:

• A Greater Sydney Region Plan – A Metropolis of Three Cities, which states:

Conserving, interpreting and celebrating Greater Sydney's heritage values leads to a better understanding of history and respect for the experiences of diverse communities. Heritage identification, management and interpretation are required so that heritage places and stories can be experienced by current and future generations. Environmental heritage is protected for its social, aesthetic, economic, historic and environmental values (page 77).

• The North District Plan, which states:

Identifying, conserving, interpreting and celebrating Greater Sydney's heritage values leads to a better understanding of history and respect for the experiences of diverse communities. Heritage identification, management and interpretation are required so that heritage places and stories can be experienced by current and future generations (page 49).

 Local Planning Study (LPS) was the basis for the development of RLEP 2014, which states that an aim of the LEP is:

to identify, conserve and promote Ryde's natural and cultural heritage as the framework for its identity, prosperity, liveability and social development, (Ryde LEP 2014 Clause 1.2(d)).

- The City of Ryde 2028 Community Strategic Plan which states:
 - Ryde is a City of welcoming and vibrant neighborhoods...designed with a strong sense of identity and place (page 16),
 - that the community wants to "protect and maintain Ryde's character and heritage" (page 17) and
 - Our community sees... history and heritage, public art and facilities for people to get together as important, adding to our city's vibrancy (page 10).

It is considered that the Proposal, which aims to provide appropriate protection for built, landscape and archaeological heritage within the City of Ryde supports both the directions and objectives of the various Plans.



Documentation covering the strategic framework is provided in *Part 5.2 –Relationship to strategic framework* on page 18 of the Proposal, which is **ATTACHED UNDER SEPARATE COVER – CONFIDENTIAL.**

Ministerial Directions (s.117 directions)

A summary assessment of the Proposal in terms of the Directions issued by the Minister for Planning under Section 117 of the *EP&A Act* is contained in the Table 6 of the planning proposal and can be found on page 23 of the Proposal, which is **ATTACHED UNDER SEPARATE COVER – CONFIDENTIAL.** The directions apply to draft local environmental plans and relate to areas such as employment and resources, environment and heritage, housing infrastructure and urban development, hazard and risk and regional planning.

The Proposal is consistent with the Ministerial Directions.

Consultation – External

Under the gateway plan-making process, a gateway determination is required before community consultation on the planning proposal takes place. The consultation process will be determined by the Minister and stipulated as part of the gateway determination.

The Department of Planning's guidelines stipulate at least 28 days community consultation for a major plan, and at least 14 days for a low impact plan.

Given the level of public interest arising from the Proposal, the community consultation process is expected to be undertaken in the following manner for a 28 day period (SEE ATTACHMENT 3 – Consultation Program).

- o Written notice given:
 - in the local newspaper circulating in the area and selected multi-lingual publications;
 - on Council's webpage;
 - to all affected property owners where a change in heritage status of a property is proposed i.e. proposed heritage items, archaeological items, properties within heritage conservation areas;
 - to all properties within the vicinity of a heritage item or conservation area as defined by Part 2.1 Notification of Development Applications as 'extended adjoining land';
 - to local State Government representatives;
 - to relevant State and Commonwealth authorities considered necessary by the Gateway Determination.



- o The written notice will:
 - provide a brief description of the objectives and intended outcomes,
 - state where the Planning Proposal can be inspected,
 - indicate the last date for submissions, and
 - confirm whether the Minister has chosen to delegate the making of the LFP.
 - Proposed drop in sessions and information presentation times where relevant

For letters sent to property owners of proposed heritage items and within a heritage conservation area, a heritage inventory sheet relating to the property or area will be included.

- o Series of information/drop in sessions being no fewer than:
 - 6 drop in sessions (locations to include, Gladesville, West Ryde/Denistone, Eastwood, Top Ryde).
- The following materials will be placed on exhibition in within each library, and Council's Customer Service Centre:
 - the Planning Proposal, and
 - the Gateway Determination.
 - Council resolution and reports
 - Attachments to the PP including GML City of Ryde Heritage Review report

Note that where applicable the Body Corporate of a strata group is notified not the individual owners of strata units with respect to all letters.

Consultation – Internal

Council's Local Studies Librarian was consulted to ensure relevant previously published material was available for the purposes of the review.

Dr Peter Mitchel, Honorary Associate Professor of Physical Geography at Macquarie University and Council's Heritage Advisory Committee were also consulted and provided input into the initial identification of potential items for review.

Council's Parks Department have been consulted regarding the proposed PP and raise no objections.

Additional consultation with the Parks Department will occur during the official exhibition period.



A Councillor Workshop also is scheduled to ensure Councillors are briefed in detail with respect to the proposed items and the community consultation.

Critical Dates

Time periods for preparation of amending LEPs apply upon the issue of the Gateway Determinations by the Minister. There is usually a 6-12 month time period allowed. The timeline provided in the Proposal indicates that the notification of the changes on the government website should occur in late 2019/early 2020.

Financial Impact

An initial assessment of the 2018/19 financial year end result indicates an operating surplus sufficient enough to fund the \$500k one off funding requirement.

Implementation costs such as advertising and consultation expenses may be incurred during the establishment of the program.

These establishment costs will be funded from the existing budgets within the Urban Strategy operational budget.

Policy Implications

The Proposal is consistent with relevant State Government policy and the community's expectations of protection being given to built, landscape and archaeological heritage within the City of Ryde and greater certainty being provided for in the development process.

The Proposal is consistent with Council's Community Strategic Plan and Council's Draft Local Strategic Planning Statement (LSPS). Chapter 3.3 of the Draft LSPS is devoted to Heritage. This Planning Proposal progresses Actions HE1.1, HE1.2 and HE1.6 (see page 84):

HE1.1 Undertake a city-wide study of potential places of heritage significance from early settlement to World War II

HE1.2 Undertake a city-wide study of potential landscape items and places with natural heritage significance

HE1.6 Owners of heritage-listed properties are supported through a range of financial assistance, incentives and heritage advisory services to promote and facilitate effective conservation outcomes.



Options

Option 1: That Council supports submitting the planning proposal for a Gateway Determination and the allocation of additional funds to the Local Heritage Assistance Fund.

This is the recommended option. If a Gateway Determination is issued by the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment permitting the exhibition of the Proposal it will allow the community to consider the planning proposal and its desired intent to protect heritage in Ryde and provide greater certainty to the development process.

Should the Minister for Planning determine that the planning proposal can proceed to community consultation Council has another opportunity to decide whether to proceed, vary or reject the proposal after community consultation.

The additional funds will ensure there is an incentive for existing and new owners of Local Heritage Items to maintain and improve their properties to protect and preserve their significance. Endorsing the allocation of funds now, will ensure the community can be advised of the associated increase during the exhibition of the Proposal.

Option 2: That Council supports submitting the planning proposal for a Gateway Determination but does not progress the allocation of additional funds to the Local Heritage Assistance Fund.

If a Gateway Determination is issued by the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment permitting the exhibition of the Proposal it will allow the community to consider the planning proposal and its desired intent to protect heritage in Ryde and provide greater certainty to the development process.

Should the Minister for Planning determine that the planning proposal can proceed to community consultation Council has another opportunity to decide whether to proceed, vary or reject the proposal after community consultation.

However, not endorsing an increase in the *Local Heritage Assistance Fund* would lead to the dilution of the current incentive for owners to maintain and improve properties of heritage significance.

Option 3: That Council decides not to proceed with the planning proposal

This option would afford no protection to the identified heritage items and conservation areas and would enable demolition or substantial alteration to buildings and areas that have been identified as having local heritage significance.

7 ADOPTION OF THE GANNAN AND McCAULEY PARK MASTERPLAN

REPORT SUMMARY

The Greater Sydney Commission's *North District Plan* (March 2018) indicates the North District of Metropolitan Sydney is expected to grow by 196,350 people in the next 20 years. This Plan provides important Directions, Planning Priorities and Actions relevant to the City of Ryde's (CoR), open space, sport and recreation. The Plan forecast population growth in the CoR of 43.1% or an additional 51,700 people from 2016 to 2036. To continue to be the '*Place to be for lifestyle and opportunity at your doorstep'*, Council must plan for and provide the local infrastructure to meet the needs of tomorrow's community.

As is the case with many metropolitan Sydney Council's, there is an existing shortfall of sports grounds with sports field lighting as detailed in the City of Ryde's *Sport and Recreation Strategy 2016 – 2026* and the Northern Sydney Regional Organisation of Councils (NSROC) *Sports Ground Strategy* (2017). The CoR is strategically working to address the current and projected undersupply of sports grounds across the local government area. These City-wide strategies include masterplanning of identified parks to optimise use of the area, a sports field lighting expansion capital program and synthetic surface action plan.

Gannan Park and McCauley Park are located in Ryde and are a combined 5Ha in size. In addition to the passive and informal use made of the park, the site is currently used in summer for cricket and winter for baseball and for school sports. The Park includes a neighbourhood playground (upgraded in 2015), cricket nets, amenities building, car park and garden areas.

The Preparation of a Masterplan for Gannan Park (including McCauley Park) was prioritized within the *Sport and Recreation Strategy 2016 – 2026* (the Strategy). This Strategy guides Council on the development of sport and recreational infrastructure and policy. The Strategy's Action Plan includes multiple actions relating to reviewing the layout of Gannan Park and the potential to optimise the active recreation use of the site. This Park was identified as it provided an opportunity to upgrade the sporting infrastructure at the site to allow for rectangular fields and sportsfield lighting. It was considered optimising use of the space for active recreation would significantly increase the available hours of sportsfields to meet the current and projected demand. It was identified that it could be done and in a timely manner and at a comparatively lower cost compared to the alternative options for increasing the supply of sportsfields of land acquisition or converting sites to a synthetic surface.



Stage 1 community consultation was held between 15 November – 10 December 2017. This provided residents and users of the park with the opportunity to provide feedback on current issues within the site and how they would like to see the parks upgraded. Common themes through this phase of consultation were improved connections in and around the parks, retain the village common feel of the site, requests for outdoor fitness equipment, and that the masterplan should enhance the natural setting of the parks. These themes were used to generate a draft Masterplan for Stage 2 community consultation.

Stage 2 community consultation was held between 11 April – 25 May 2018. During this phase, a draft Masterplan was presented for community feedback, provided in **ATTACHMENT 3**. The main themes of this feedback related to further enhancement of the natural environment, and providing more passive and active recreation opportunities. Sports field lighting was not included in the Masterplan. This information was used to update the draft Masterplan.

A revised draft Masterplan was prepared including sports field lighting to address the undersupply of lit sportsgrounds in the City of Ryde. Further community consultation, Stage 3 was held between 25 March – 17 April 2019. During this stage, the revised draft Masterplan including sports field lighting was presented for community feedback, provided in **ATTACHMENT 2**. The main themes of this feedback related to sports field lighting/field upgrades; traffic and parking; general park upgrades, consultation and noise.

Following this consultation process, the recommended Final Masterplan has been amended to include 1 senior and 1 junior sized rectangular sports fields configuration (original proposal was for 2 senior fields) or 1 oval field. The number of light poles reduced from 6 poles to 4 poles. The sports field lighting will illuminate an area of approximately 1.5 senior rectangular sports fields. Fencing has also been identified to be included between the park and the private property boundary as has the inclusion of additional native garden beds. All other sporting elements of the Masterplan remain unchanged from that proposed for Stage 3 consultation. It is considered that these amendments to the Master Plan respond to the concerns raised by local residents, particularly around traffic, noise and access to the park for informal use by reducing the area to be used for active recreation. It still however provides a significant benefit to the wider community by providing a total of 45 hours per week of capacity for sporting group use.

The Masterplan recommended in this report is an effective solution for Council to increase sports field capacity and make a significant contribution towards addressing the existing shortfall of sports fields in the City of Ryde. Each field will be able to be booked for a maximum of 30 hours per week (total increase in capacity of 45hours per week across the floodlit area) and will greatly assist to meet the current and future needs of multiple sports. The area to the north of the defined sports fields will continue to be available for general community use at all times. Sports fields will be available for unstructured use by the general community outside formal bookings.



This report further recommends that Council prepare and lodge a Development Application (DA) for sports field lighting. Subject to the adoption of the Masterplan and determination of DA for sports field lighting, it is anticipated delivery will be staged over 20 years, however, the majority of the park upgrades are scheduled to take place during 2020-2023.

Should Council wish to maximize the future use of Gannan Park for active sporting activities, it has the option of adopting the Master Plan provided in **ATTACHMENT 2.** This is for the lighting of 2 senior fields with 6 poles. This would fully optimise the available space within Gannan Park for active sporting use, however not respond to the concerns raised by the local residents during the community consultation. Minor adjustments would be made to this Plan to incorporate some of the feedback received during Stage 3 consultation. These would be the inclusion of fencing between some residential properties and the sportsfield, and inclusion of additional native garden beds.

RECOMMENDATION:

- (a) That Council adopts the Gannan Park and McCauley Park Masterplan with sports field lighting for an area equivalent to one and a half senior rectangular sports fields or one oval sports field.
- (b) That Council thanks the residents that participated in the masterplanning process and inform them of this resolution.
- (c) That Council prepares a Development Application for sports field lighting at Gannan Park and notifies the residents that participated in the masterplanning process when the Development Application is placed on public exhibition.

History of Gannan Park and McCauley Park (the Parks)

Gannan Park is a former quarry and brick pit that was originally operated by *Marsfield Brick Works* and later *North Sydney Brick and Tile Company* until the late 1970's. The quarry has since been filled and turned into a park that is currently used in winter by baseball and in summer by cricket.

This site currently includes a neighbourhood playground that was upgraded in 2015, picnic shelter, car park, cricket nets and amenities building (constructed 1981). The amenities building does not meet Council's functionality requirements, is poorly located within Gannan Park and will not meet the future requirements of user groups.

The site offers the potential for configuration for 2 rectangular sports fields (eg. football, touch football, Oztag and Ultimate Frisbee) or 1 oval sports field (eg. cricket and AFL). Council has been engaging with the baseball user groups to best accommodate their sport specific requirements via future masterplanning projects in other City of Ryde parks.

Gannan Park community land classification is primarily "Sportsground" bordered by some "Parks" and "Natural Area" on the embankment. McCauley Park is primarily classified as "Parks" with some "Natural Area".





Forecast Increase in Population = Need for Local Infrastructure

The Greater Sydney Commission's *North District Plan* (March 2018), which includes the City of Ryde, is a 20 year strategic plan which informs local strategic planning and policies. The North District is expected to grow by 196,350 people in the next 20 years. The City of Ryde's population is forecast to grow by 43.1% or an additional 51,700 people from 2016 to 2036. The demand and shortfall of sportsgrounds in City will only increase with forecast population growth.

The *North District Plan* provides a number of Directions, Planning Priorities and Actions which are relevant to the City of Ryde and the Masterplan for Gannan Park and McCauley Park. Throughout the Plan, recognition is given to the importance of open space, sport and recreation:

"As the District grows, providing for and developing innovative ways to optimise open space areas for recreation, sport and social activity, as well as establishing physical links that support social networks and create a sense of community, will become increasingly important."

"Councils already identify innovative solutions for the shortfall of active open space, including making better use of existing sportsgrounds, converting existing open space into sports fields, and partnering with schools to share spaces outside school hours."

"Future open space planning relies on collaboration and innovative re-use of shared spaces in response to the rising demand for active open space."

Supply and Demand for Sporting Fields

Northern Sydney Region Organisation of Council's undertook a review of their *Regional Sportsground Strategy* in 2017. The purpose of the review was to update a 2011 *Sportsground Management Strategy*, with a focus on analysing future demand for the provision of sportsgrounds within the Region. The review quantified and confirmed the widening gap between demand and supply of sportsgrounds and found that the supply of sportsgrounds will need to increase by:

- 26% by 2026. This is equivalent to 62Ha or 7 soccer fields across the region.
- 40% by 2036. This is equivalent to 96Ha or 11 soccer fields across the region.

This undersupply of sportsgrounds can be alleviated by member Council's undertaking various actions such as expanding floodlit grounds, optimisation of land, additional feasible synthetic surfaces and gaining permanent access to school grounds. The creation of two soccer fields with sports field lighting at Gannan Park was identified in this list of actions. If Gannan Park was to have two soccer fields with sports field lighting, a shortfall of 15-20Ha in 2026 and between 50-60Ha in 2036 will still exist across the region.



Shortfall of Sportsgrounds and Sports Fields with Lighting

Analysis and modelling undertaken by the CoR indicates with forecast population growth the demand for sports fields is projected to increasing approximately 21 hours each year. As demonstrated in the graph below, each project that Council completes, be it either sports field lighting expansion, synthetic expansion or optimisation of fields, partly addresses the ever increasing demand curve due to population growth.




Image 6: Graph showing demand (red), existing supply (green) and Council strategies (blue) to meet demand for City of Ryde sports fields with lighting.

Council's Strategic Approach to Addressing This Issue

Council adopted the City of Ryde's *Sport and Recreation Strategy 2016 – 2026* (the Strategy) in July 2017. The seven goals within the Strategy guides Council as it designs, plans and manages the future of sport and recreation within the City. The Gannan Park and McCauley Park Masterplan addresses the seven goals of the Strategy in the following ways:



Gannan Park & McCauley Park Masterplan
- Optimises the layout of Gannan Park by increasing the field
area available for multiple sports.
- Balances biodiversity and sustainability outcomes with the
sporting and recreational outcomes.
- Provides an accessible and functional relocated amenities
building suitable for all users of the Parks.
- Addresses access, functionality, lifecycle and capacity
limitations of the existing amenities building.
- Includes walking and cycling opportunities by providing new
footpath connections through and around the Parks.
- Increases Council's sportsground capacity by increasing the
number of fields available for hire.
- Maximises the area available for sport ensuring the design can
adapt to future uses.
- The facilities proposed will support and encourage residents to
lead an active lifestyle.
- New amenities building will be designed for all members of our
community and located appropriately within the Parks.
 Provides appropriate and functional facilities for all members of our community.
- Increases facilities for passive recreation.
- Increases facilities for passive recreation.
- Increases areas for active recreation, allowing more programs
to be run.
- The community has been consulted and helped guide the
preparation of the masterplan.
- Supports the sustainable growth of sporting clubs by
increasing the number of fields available for hirer in Ryde.

The Strategy includes a number of high priority actions for Council in relation to Gannan Park. These include the preparation of a Masterplan for Gannan Park; investigation for two full sized football fields with sports field lighting; upgrade of ancillary facilities to accommodate new uses; and combining competition standard sports facilities with training capacity and flexible facilities to adapt to various sport needs.

The Strategy also recommended Council investigate the relocation of winter baseball from Gannan Park to ELS Hall Park Field 2. This would require soccer to be moved from ELS Hall Park Field 2. Council has investigated options. Ryde Panthers Football Club is unwilling to relocate from ELS Hall Park Field 2. Ongoing discussions have taken place with sporting user groups including Ryde Eastwood Baseball Club, Pacific Coast Baseball Club, North Ryde RSL Baseball, Ryde Panthers Football Club, Gladesville Ryde Magic Football Club and Gladesville Hornsby Football Association. Alternative solution investigated for Gladesville Ryde Magic to relocate from Magdala Park and baseball use to be consolidated at Magdala Park. Discussions with Gladesville Ryde Magic and baseball have been positive. Letters of support provided in **ATTACHMENT 7.**



Other projects the City is strategically working through to address the undersupply of sportsgrounds across the LGA include:

- Optimisation via Masterplanning: Gannan Park (in progress as recommended in this report), ELS Hall Park (plan adopted May 2019), Meadowbank Park (in progress), Westminster Park (in progress), Magdala Park (future), Santa Rosa Park (future).
- Sports field Lighting Expansion Program: Gannan Park (in progress as recommended in this report), Morrison Bay Park Fields 4 (completed), Waterloo Park (completed), Meadowbank Park Field 10 (completed), Marsfield Park (completed), Tuckwell Park (in progress), Meadowbank Park (future), Smalls Road (future).
- <u>Synthetic Surface Action Plan</u>: ELS Hall Park (completed), Christie Park (completed), Westminster Park (in progress for 2020/21) and Meadowbank Park (planned for 2022/23).

Communications consultant, *Flagship Communications*, was engaged in October 2017 to prepare a Community Engagement Plan and conduct Stage 1 and Stage 2 community consultations for the Masterplan.

Stage 1 community consultation was held in 15 November – 10 December 2017. The purpose of the first stage of consultation was to allow residents and users of the park an opportunity to provide their feedback on the existing design of the parks and what their thoughts are for the future of the site. This consultation was promoted via flyer, letterbox drop (250m radius of parks), park signage, local newspaper advertisement, stakeholder eNewsletter (89 emails distributed), Facebook (reach of 2,643) and Have Your Say webpage (195 page views). The consultation included two onsite drop in sessions (approximately 50 residents, 21 intercept surveys, 71 online surveys completed and 5 user groups were interviewed.

Stage 2 community consultation was held in 11 April - 25 May 2018. This stage of consultation allowed the community to review the draft Masterplan and provide feedback. This consultation was promoted via flyer, letterbox drop (250m radius of parks), park signage, local newspaper advertisement, stakeholder eNewsletter (136 emails distributed), Facebook (reach of 5,506) and Have Your Say webpage (484 page views). This consultation included two onsite drop in sessions with 50 residents attending and 137 comments provided, 10 intercept surveys, 66 online surveys and 8 submissions from user groups.

Council prepared a revised draft Masterplan including sports field lighting for a multiprogrammable sportsground (2 rectangular fields/1 oval field). The City of Ryde's Community Engagement team prepared a Community Engagement Plan and conducted Stage 3 community consultation.

Stage 3 community consultation was held in 25 March – 17 April 2019. During this stage, the revised draft Masterplan including sports field lighting was presented for community feedback. This consultation was promoted via flyer, letterbox drop (250m radius of parks), door knock of properties immediately adjacent to the Parks, park signage, local newspaper advertisement, stakeholder eNewsletter (138 emails distributed), other Council eNewsletters (5,551 emails distributed) and Have Your Say webpage (565 page views). This consultation included two onsite drop in sessions (approximately 65 residents and 186 comments), one resident workshop (59 properties invited, 17 properties attended by 23 residents providing 249 comments), online comments via Social Pinpoint (170 residents/stakeholders and 236 comments), online surveys (149 responses and 75 comments), written submissions from residents (29 respondents) and written submissions from community organisations (10 submissions).

Final Masterplan

The Final Masterplan, provided in **ATTACHMENT 1**, and recommended in this report, is for sports field configuration for 1 senior and 1 junior rectangular fields/1 oval field with sports field lighting. The sportsgrounds within the Masterplan has been prepared as a multi-programmable space to meet the current and future needs of multiple sports. Within this area 1.5 rectangular sports fields will be accommodated which could be used by sports including but not limited to football, touch football, oztag and ultimate frisbee or 1 oval sports field which could be used by sports including but not limited to cricket and AFL.

The main points of difference between the Final Masterplan and the revised draft Masterplan presented during Stage 3 community consultation is the reduction in sports field size to 1.5 rectangular fields, conceptual reduction of the quantity of light poles (4 poles from 6 poles) and repositioning of light pole locations (subject to detailed lighting design). This amendment has been made in response to the feedback received from local residents during the Stage 3 consultation for the project and still provides a benefit to the wider community by providing significant capacity for active recreation space.

Sports Field Use

The City of Ryde sportsgrounds operate to a maximum capacity of 30 hours of grass field use per week. This includes all club training sessions, competition games, school bookings, events and carnivals. Through Council's Sportsground Allocation policy and Wet Weather policy, Council strives to achieve operational sustainability of all sports fields in the local government area. Outside of these formal booked hours, the sports fields will still be available for general community use. The final Masterplan also includes an area for unstructured sport, recreation and passive use by the community.

Sports Field Lighting

Council has obtained two initial sports field lighting concept designs for LED light fittings and metal halide light fittings. The initial lighting concept indicated a 6 pole LED lighting configuration can achieve 100 lux of sports field illumination with vertical spill levels of less than half the Australian Standard. Noting the Australian Standards permits spill levels of up to 10 lux along residential boundaries.

By using LED fittings, the lighting concept demonstrates that the Australian Standards for lux levels (AS2560) and for spill levels (AS4282) can be achieved at Gannan Park.

The benefits of LED light fittings over metal halide include:

- Less light poles required.
- Significantly lower light spill levels.
- More controlled light distribution across sports field.
- Minimises glare.
- Longer lamp life.
- Lower maintenance.
- Energy saving and lower running costs.

A detailed lighting design will be obtained following the Masterplan adoption and will form part of the DA.

The proposed sports field lighting in Gannan Park will required Council to prepare and submit a DA. This report provides recommendation for adoption of the Masterplan and for Council to lodge the DA for sports field lighting. This will include obtaining an independent *Statement of Environmental Effects* report which will review and provide site specific recommendations relating to matters such as lighting, traffic and acoustics. Council will also need to demonstrate appropriate response, management strategies and mitigation measures to address the recommendations contained within the *Statement of Environmental Effects*. The community will be provided with the opportunity to provide further feedback during the DA process.



Onsite Car Parking

Gannan Park currently has an asphalt car park with 68 spaces. The Masterplan can achieve additional parking via reconfiguration of the existing car park. In addition, the Masterplan has identified extra space for car park expansion should it be required. This will be informed by the traffic study to be obtained as a component of the DA.

Environment and Stormwater Considerations

Through the improvement and expansion of the bush regeneration areas and garden areas in Gannan Park and McCauley Park, the Masterplan supports the intent of the Ryde *Biodiversity Plan* (adopted 2016). The new areas of bush regeneration, tree planting and garden areas will assist in the creation of a vegetated canopy link to North Ryde Common in the Buffalo Creek catchment.

The Masterplan also includes an investigation into the potential for the path network to address overland flow and stormwater harvesting. The potential for this infrastructure will be reviewed through the detailed design process.

Project Implementation and Financial Implications

Funding for the implementation for the majority of the Masterplan has been identified in the 2019 - 2023 Delivery Plan. The projects currently funded are:

- Amenities building,
- Sportsfield lighting,
- Primary pathway works,
- Fitness equipment,
- Passive infrastructure such as shelters and seating,
- Biodiversity improvements such as plantings,
- Expansion to the playground, and
- Cricket nets and sports field surface improvements.

The unfunded components of the Masterplan will be subject to future business planning processes. These include:

- Expansion to the carpark if required by the DA,
- Secondary pathway works, and
- Other minor improvements such as additional seating and garden enhancements.



Option

Should Council wish to maximise the future use of Gannan Park for active sporting activities, it has the option of adopting the Masterplan provided in **ATTACHMENT 2**. This is for the lighting of 2 senior fields with 6 poles. Minor adjustments would be made to this Plan to incorporate some of the feedback received during Stage 3 consultation. These would be the inclusion of fencing between some residential properties and the sportsfield, and inclusion of native garden beds.

If this is the preferred option of Council part (a) of the report recommendation should be amended to read:-

(a) That Council adopts the Gannan Park and McCauley Park Masterplan with sports field lighting for an area equivalent to two senior rectangular sports fields or one oval sports field.

Conclusion

The Masterplan recommended in this report is an effective solution for Council to increase sports field capacity and make a significant contribution towards addressing the existing shortfall of sports fields in the City of Ryde. Each field will be able to be booked for a maximum of 30 hours per week (total increase in capacity of 45hours per week across the floodlit area) and will greatly assist to meet the current and future needs of multiple sports. The area to the north of the defined sports fields will continue to be available for general community use at all times. Sports fields will be available for unstructured use by the general community outside formal bookings by community groups.

It has responded to the concerns raised during the consultation process by the residents surrounding the park. This has been done by reducing the area to be utilized for organized sport to 1 senior rectangular field and 1 junior field. This will reduce the amount of parking and traffic associated with the future use of the sports fields and ensure that are area of the park continues to be available for unstructured use at all times. The proposed area to be lit has also been reduced with a subsequent reduction in the number of light poles required from 6 to 4.

There is a forecast increase of 43.1% in the City of Ryde Population from 2016 to 2036, or an additional 51,700 people moving into the area. To continue to be the 'Place to be for lifestyle and opportunity at your doorstep', Council must plan for and provide the local infrastructure to meet the needs of tomorrow's community.



BACKGROUND

Gannan and McCauley Parks are located in Ryde, and are 4.51 hectares in combined size. The site is a former quarry, with steep embankments on two sides and residential properties on all boundaries. The playing field is currently used for cricket in summer and baseball in winter.

A masterplan is required to ensure Gannan Park and McCauley Park meet the growing needs of the community and sporting groups for the next 20 years.

TALKING TO THE COMMUNITY

Flagship Communications undertook consultation in late 2017 and May 2018. During the first round of consultation, Council listened to the community and during the second round, a draft masterplan was presented for feedback. People gave their feedback via online surveys, interviews and drop-in sessions.

The City of Ryde undertook a third round of consultation in March- April 2019. A revised draft masterplan including sports field lighting was presented for feedback. People gave their feedback via online survey, drop-in sessions, resident workshop and written submissions.



Executive Summary

The City of Ryde is developing a Masterplan for Gannan Park and McCauley Park to better meet the current and future needs of the community. This project began in late 2017 and includes two previous stages of community consultation. In early 2019, the City of Ryde's internal community engagement team carried out Stage 3 of the community consultation process to gather feedback from the community on the revised Masterplan to inform the final design which will be reported to Council for adoption.

Stage 3 community consultation was conducted from 25 March to 17 April 2019 during which the community could complete an online interactive map, online survey about the sports field lighting and ask questions or provide feedback at the residents' workshop or at one of the drop-in sessions.

The Stage 3 community consultation period was promoted through City of Ryde's Have Your Say website, flyers to surrounding residents, door knock, an eNewsletter to stakeholders, signage in the park and advertisements in the local newspapers.

In total 860 comments were received from the community with 187 comments from the drop-in sessions, 249 from the residents' workshop, 236 responses from the online interactive map, 149 responses from the online survey, and 39 email submissions.

Through the Stage 3 consultation it was clear that an upgrade to the park is welcomed and the need for additional sports fields in the area. There was support for the sports field lighting predominantly from sporting users, sporting organisations on behalf of thier local community and NSW Health. However, most respondents from the streets immediately surrounding the park were not supportive of sports field lighting and increased field use, citing concerns relating to traffic and parking in the area, light spill, noise and decrease in space for casual community use.

The feedback from this Stage 3 community consultation will be used to inform the final Masterplan which will be reported to Council for adoption. If adopted, a Development Application for sports field lighting is required and would include further community consultation.

City of Ryde

The City of Ryde is currently developing a Masterplan for Gannan Park and McCauley Park. A Masterplan provides the framework for how the park will be upgraded over the next 20 years. This strategic plan aims to meet the current and future needs of the community and user groups, while ensuring sustainable and efficient use and ecological outcomes.

Gannan Park currently includes sports fields, cricket nets, neighbourhood playground, amenities building, picnic facilities, car park, gardens and natural vegetation. McCauley Park is an open green space with natural vegetation.

In 2017, the City of Ryde engaged Flagship to undertake Stage 1 and Stage 2 community consultations for Gannan Park and McCauley Park.

Stage 1 community consultation was conducted from 15 November to 10 December 2017, during which the community could provide feedback on the existing parks and what they would like to see in the parks in the future. Council used this initial stage of feedback to develop a Draft Masterplan for the site which was presented back to the community through Stage 2 community consultation.


Stage 2 community consultation was conducted from 11 April to 25 May 2018 during which the community could provide feedback on the Draft Masterplan. Following the feedback received as part of the Stage 2 community consultation, the Draft Masterplan was revised to include fitness equipment, new cricket nets, additional seating, improved park entrances and signage, improved natural area and additional native trees, grass and ground cover plantings.

Council and the Northern Sydney Regional Organisation of Councils (NSROC) have identified a current and future undersupply of sportsgrounds in the City of Ryde, in particular grounds with sport field lighting. The community demand for sports fields will only increase with the forecast population growth. Therefore, the draft Masterplan was revised to include sports field lighting in Gannan Park.

Stage 3 community consultation was conducted from 25 March to 17 April 2019 during which the community could provide feedback on the revised draft Masterplan including sports field lighting. The feedback provided is presented in this report and will be considered when preparing the final Masterplan design which will be reported to Council for adoption.

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
Community Consultation Results

There were three main groups that provided their feedback: sporting users/community sporting organisations; residents living adjacent/near the Parks; and residents from Ryde/wider Local Government Area (LGA).

The majority of the residents that live in Ryde/wider LGA and members of sporting groups provided positive comments in support of the revised draft Masterplan including sports field lighting.

The majority of respondents adjacent/near the parks were not supportive of sports field lighting being included in the revised draft Masterplan. Council has maintained ongoing communications with representatives from a group of the residents adjacent/near the parks. During discussions, these representatives suggested that if the sport fields were to be reduced from two senior sports fields to one senior sports field and a half/small field for junior sports, reducing/changing the lighting requirements, may address a number of the concerns raised.

Below is an overall summary of the common themes across all consultation methods noting some respondents provided feedback via multiple consultation methods.

KEY CONSIDERATIONS

Based on the feedback received the key themes for consideration in the finalisation of the Masterplan are (in alphabetical order):

- AMENTITIES BUILDING: Respondents suggested the building should remain in the
 current location, with some positive feedback received in support of the relocation of the
 amenities building. Therefore, when considering the location of the amenities building in
 the final Masterplan, its placement should weigh up the cost and effort of its movement
 versus the community benefit and Council's accessibility requirements.
- BALL SPORTS: Some respondents queried the proximity of ball sports being played
 near the scooter track and some surrounding properties. The question was raised as to
 whether a fence would be required for safety reasons, however this was also noted as a
 visually unappealing option. Therefore, consideration should be given to some form of a
 barrier from ball sports in the final Masterplan that has a low visual impact.
- CONSULTATION PROCESS: Some respondents, particularly those living near the
 parks, questioned the consultation process. Comments included why sports field lighting
 was not previously identified during previous stages of community consultation and why
 Stage 3 community consultation was required. A number of respondents questioned the
 transparency of the process and why detailed reports relating to usage and sports field
 lighting would not be made available prior to a Development Application.
- ENVIRONMENTAL CONSIDERATIONS: Support was received in favour of the new and enhanced garden beds as well as the natural improvements to the embankment in Gannan Park and bush regeneration area in McCauley Park. Respondents would like to see more dense under and mid-storey native plants for habitat corridor values and more native plantings to provide shade, attract local wildlife and provide screening for some of the properties surrounding Gannan Park. However, some residents living adjacent to both parks have requested no additional planting behind their property or for low native shrubs to be planted in order to retain their park view and/or limit shade to allow for sun exposure for solar power generation. As a result the planting plan and species list for garden beds located adjacent to bordering properties should be reviewed.
- GENERAL PARK UPGRADE: A good level of support was received in favour of the
 general park upgrades with positive feedback relating to the scooter track, trails, picnic
 facilities, cricket nets, fitness equipment and the playground. Some respondents
 questioned the pathway and outdoor fitness equipment locations with specifically in
 regards to drainage, during and after rain events. Therefore drainage should be
 considered when finalising the placement of fitness equipment and pathways in the final
 Masterplan design.

- INCLUSION: A couple of comments requested investigation into opportunities for inclusive design elements for people with mobility needs. Suggested elements for consideration were the playground, amenities building, fitness equipment, access and communal spaces.
- LIGHT SPILL: Respondents living near the parks indicated the light spill levels into their
 properties was a concern. Some comments related to their general opposition to sports
 field lighting, proximity of the lighting to their property boundaries and some respondents
 questioned the health impacts and disruptions associated with LED lighting technology.

Therefore, a detailed lighting design is to be included in the Development Application for sports field lighting that will ensure the light spill levels are well within the Australian Standards. It should also review the layout of the sports field lighting, including pole placement based on the requirements. Access to this information should be available to the public when the Development Application is notified.

 LIGHTING AND FIELD UPGRADES TO MEET DEMAND: The comments collected in support for sports field lighting and upgrade of the sportsground came through the online survey (n=34), social pinpoint (n=88), drop in sessions (n=11) and written submissions (n=10) predominantly from sporting organisations on behalf of their community members.

The online survey identified "Access to night-time sports facilities in the local area" (49%) as the second most important consideration for the community after parking.

Comments emphasised that the need for additional sports fields with lighting was to meet the growing demand in the local area for training and competitions by local sports clubs, with some comments outlining the health and community benefits of participation in sport and recreation.

However, the comments collected from respondents living near Gannan Park were overall not in favour of the sports field lighting and increased park use associated with the upgrades.

Therefore, a detailed lighting design should be obtained and included in the Development Application for the sports field lighting with the intent to develop management strategies to minimise the impact of the lights based on the designs recommendations. Access to this information should be available to the public when the Development Application is notified.

 NOISE: Respondents living near the Parks indicated the noise levels associated with sports field use was a concern, as a result of general sport field use (e.g. whistles, shouting, spectators and unacceptable language), particularly in the evening. Some comments included concerns about potential noise generated by discussions in the park/car park by park users once the lights have been switched off.

Onsite noise levels associated with a sporting field should be investigated through an acoustic report with strategies developed to mitigate noise impacts as per the reports recommendations. This report should be included as part of the Development Application and when it is notified access to the acoustic report should be made available to the public.

- OTHER: Other general concerns raised by respondents living near the parks included the
 potential disruption to residents lifestyle, peace and quiet; anti-social behaviour; impact on
 sleep; drainage issues; devaluation of homes; loss of privacy; safety and security; and a
 desire for the parks to remain unchanged. There was also a suggestion received for
 McCauley Park to have an additional features such as picnic tables or playground.
- SPACE AND AVAILABILITY: Some respondents, particularly those living near the parks, indicated that Gannan Park is currently used by the local residents and some other visitors for casual/informal recreation. Some concerns were expressed that casual/informal use would not be possible with two sports fields. Therefore, when considering the sportsground usage, sports field layout and configuration, the design should also consider options for structured and unstructured sport and recreation.
- TRAFFIC AND PARKING: Respondents living near the parks indicated traffic and parking
 was a main concern including the availability of on-street parking for residents and
 visitors, especially during change over between games, and congestion in the local streets
 near the parks.

The online survey identified "Parking" (53%) as the most important consideration for the community.

Other comments reflected concerns about park users parking their vehicles incorrectly alongside comments that indicated a lack of support for a residential parking scheme or local parking management strategies.

Some respondents saw the need for the increased parking on site with some comments and questions were received regarding retaining the boom gate and lighting of the car park.

Therefore, a traffic report should be included as part of the Development Application to investigate the onsite parking requirements, local traffic management strategies and traffic flows. With access to this report made available to the public when the Development Application is notified.

Sports field lighting was not previously included in Stage 1 and Stage 2. However, recent modelling of supply and demand of sportsgrounds by the City of Ryde has identified a current and future shortfall of sportsgrounds in the City of Ryde, especially grounds with sports field.

Intensive and overuse of our existing sportsgrounds adversely impacts on the standard and usability of these facilities. To address this, Council is expanding the number of sports fields with lighting, including Gannan Park.

Without park upgrades and new infrastructure, such as sports field lighting, Council simply cannot meet the sports and recreation needs of the growing community. This would ultimately mean that some residents and local sporting teams may not be able to participate.

ABOUT SPORTS FIELD LIGHTING

The information provided in the Revised Draft Masterplan is only indicative. Should the Draft Masterplan be endorsed by Council a Development Application for sports field lighting will be lodged. The Development Application will include independent reports for lighting, traffic and acoustics. Specific details of the lights such as location, pole heights and hours will be stipulated in the Development Application when lodged. Council anticipates sports field lighting hours of operation in the Development Application will be 4.30pm—9.30pm Monday—Friday. Surrounding residents will be notified of the details and will have another opportunity to make a submission.

An initial sports field lighting concept has been obtained, which only indicates compliance with relevant Australian Standards (AS2560 and AS4282). A design of the light spill area would be required as part of a Development Application for sports field lights. This design would incorporate the use of modern lighting technology (LED light fittings) that provides more directional light and minimises light spill.





SURVEY RESULTS continued

75 open comments were received through the survey.

Comments demonstrated a level of support in favour of lighting and/or field upgrades in order to meet the growing demand for sport fields and provide local games and training for local sporting clubs in Ryde.

Similarly there were comments relating to the impact of the lights regarding the potential light spill on the properties immediately surrounding Gannan Park, concerns for traffic and parking impacts associated with additional sportsground use and noise.





SOCIAL PINPOINT RESULTS

192 comments were received online via Social Pinpoint.

There was a strong level of support for sports field lighting and field upgrades via Social Pinpoint from sporting organisations and members of sporting clubs as this will help to meet the growing demand within the Ryde area.

General park upgrades were well supported, specifically relating to the scooter track and trails; enhancement of environmental aspects; the upgrading of the amenities building; fitness equipment and cricket facilities.

DROP-IN SESSION RESULTS

In total 186 comments were received during the two drop-in sessions.


Traffic and parking was the main concern expressed during the drop-in sessions included:

- · Availability of parking for residents and guests.
- · Increased traffic and congestion particularly during game change over times.
- · Requests to expand the car park to provide additional spaces.
- · Parking in local streets and parking restrictions may be needed.
- · Noise and lights for cars leaving the area and the car park.

General park upgrades were seen as favourable specifically relating to the scooter track, trails, picnic facilities, fitness equipment, cricket nets and playground.

Some respondents living near Gannan Park raised light spill as a concern, with other comments noting the lights being too close to their property boundary.

During the Stage 3 consultation Council indicated their intention for the proposed permissible hours of operation for sports field lighting to be from 4.30pm – 9.30pm, Monday to Friday, should the project move towards a Development Application. Only some comments regarding the lights referred to the proposed hours as being too late with the suggestions for the turn off time ranging up to 8.00pm.

RESIDENTS WORKSHOP

23 residents representing 17 of the 59 properties adjoining the parks attended the workshop and provided 249 comments on the revised draft Masterplan including sports field lighting.


The majority of comments expressed concerns around traffic and parking, including:

- Lack of parking availability and illegal parking, creating issues for residents
- Concerns over parking scheme or parking management strategies as this will restrict parking further, while others did suggest a parking scheme
- Additional traffic and congestion, especially during game change over times
- Concerns regarding cars exiting the car park (e.g. lights and driveway safety) and questions about the car park being locked overnight



Noise was another major concern as this will increase with additional sporting use (particularly late in the evenings) and some users may continue to socialise after the lights have been switched off.

Some comments were received regarding the consultation process or provision of information. This included requests for detailed technical specifications and sports usage. Some residents felt they were inadequately informed (e.g. door knock and invitations to residents' workshop was only made to residents bordering the park).

WRITTEN SUBMISSION RESULTS


39 respondents sent written submissions to Council during the consultation. Submissions were received from 9 sporting organisations on behalf their membership, 29 local residents and 1 submission from NSW Health Northern Sydney Local Health District - Health Promotion Unit.

The submissions received from sporting associations and user groups on behalf of their community members expressed a high level of support for the revised Masterplan including sports field lighting in order to better meet the growing demand.


The submissions received from local residents identified traffic and parking as the most common concern including increased traffic and congestion in local streets, particularly during changeover of competition games, as well as availability of on-street parking for residents and guests. There was a lack of support for a resident parking scheme or local parking management strategies such as line marking of driveways. Some submissions expressed concern about light spill levels into their properties and increased noise levels. Some residents questioned the suitability of the park for upgrades as it is surrounded by residences on all four sides. Some submissions expressed concerns about the availability of the park for general community use. Other comments queried the consultation process, particularly as sports field lighting was not previously included in Stage 1 or Stage 2 community consultation.

The submission from NSW Health Northern Sydney Local Health District - Health Promotion Unit:

- Commended Council on the proposed features in the Masterplan
- Highlighted the net-positive impact on the health and well-being of individuals and the wider community.
- Noted the Masterplan including sports field lighting contributes to healthy place-making including getting people active, connecting and strengthening communities.
- Provided feedback on the design elements.

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Executive summary

The City of Ryde engaged Flagship Communications, a specialist stakeholder engagement company, to lead the community consultation process for the development of a masterplan for Gannan and McCauley Parks, Ryde.

From 15 November to 10 December 2017, an initial stakeholder engagement period was open for stakeholders to provide their feedback on the existing park and what their thoughts are for the future of the site.

This engagement process resulted in ten key areas of feedback from the community. These included:

- Getting to the site
- Thoughts on the site
- Impact to residents
- Sports activities
- Facilities
- Playground
- Dogs
- Night activities
- Site maintenance
- Natural environment

Council used the feedback to develop a draft masterplan for the site which was presented back to the community through a second stage stakeholder engagement period.

From Wednesday 11 April to Friday 25 May 2018 the stakeholder engagement period was open for feedback on the draft masterplan.

The engagement period was promoted through Council's Have Your Say page, social media and DL flyers to targeted stakeholders and residents and posters in the park.

Stakeholders had many opportunities to provide their feedback including an online survey, intercept surveys and drop-in sessions.

A dedicated phone number and Council's email address were also promoted as methods for stakeholders to provide input to the project.

Engagment interaction included approximately 50 one-on-one interactions at drop-in sessions with over 137 comments provided by participants; 10 intercept

surveys of park users and 66 online surveys completed. There were no calls received through the dedicated 1300 number however eight emails were received. Key user groups and Council staff were contacted for comment, with two Council representatives providing feedback on the draft masterplan.

During the exhibition period, participants were asked their opinion of specific areas of the draft masterplan, what they liked and what they didn't like about the plan and if there were any elements that were missing.

The plan itself proposed no significant change to the landscape or usage of the park, however included elements of improvement to existing facilities at the site. This seemed to resonate with the community with a generally positive response to the draft plan.

Some miscommunication via an anonymous flyer distributed to residents caused community concern that Council intended to install floodlighting at the site as part of the masterplan. This resulted in several emails sent to Council and the submission of a petition signed by 14 residents from Buna Street.

There were mixed opinions on the experiences with dog use at the site and this is possibly the most difficult issue for Council to find common ground with the community. However, the provision of dog bins is provided as a partial solution by many participants.

Participants were generally in favour of the usage of the site remaining unchanged. There was a fear that there would be an increase in parking problems, traffic and noise from an increase in intensity at the site and overwhelmingly the community did not support night games. However, there was a strong response for some lighting around the perimeter path.

Overall, with small amendments, the draft masterplan should be well supported by the community.

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Background

City of Ryde delivers a wide range of sport and recreation services to both its 117,000 residents and visitors who work or play within the local government area. These services are provided through a network of regional, district, neighbourhood and local open space, parklands, sportsgrounds and indoor and outdoor facilities.

The overall purpose of the project is for Council to better understand the current and likely future sporting, recreational and leisure needs of the Ryde community and to develop a masterplan for Gannan and McCauley Parks.

The draft masterplan includes the effective future provision, conservation, planning and development of facilities and services within the parks.

As outlined in the Project Brief, City of Ryde's aspirations for this project are to identify the provision of facilities over the short to long term (2-15 years) to

ensure sustainable and efficient use and importantly that the parks meet the needs of the community and sporting and user groups.

Council engaged Flagship Communications, a specialist stakeholder engagement company, to lead the community consultation process for the development of the masterplan for Gannan and McCauley Parks, Ryde.

In late 2017, Council undertook the first phase of consultation with the community to determine what stakeholders liked and didn't like about the existing site and what they would like to see at the site in the future. As part of this, participants were also asked about their thoughts on intensifying the use of the site with the installation of floodlighting for night games.

The feedback from this consultation period formed the basis of a draft masterplan, developed by Council. This draft was exhibited to the community in April and May of 2018. This report reflects the outcomes from this exhibition period.





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Consultation objectives

The overall goal of our team during the consultation phases of the project was to: work with stakeholders to ensure they are informed and engaged, potential issues are identified and effective two-way communication is developed and maintained throughout the project.

The objectives of the consultation were to:

- create stakeholder awareness of the Gannan Park and McCauley Park Masterplan and the associated consultation process
- · encourage stakeholder participation in the consultation process
- establish and maintain effective two-way communication between the project team, City of Ryde Council
 and stakeholders
- · ensure stakeholder issues are identified and recorded
- ensure appropriate consultation tools and activities are used, taking into account demographic elements such as language, literacy, disability and access to the internet
- provide timely feedback to the stakeholders about engagement outcomes
- ensure opportunities are identified and recorded


Sport and Recreation Strategy actions

The following actions from the Sport and Recreation Strategy 2016 - 2026 are relevant to this project:

- · Prepare a Master Plan for the redevelopment of Gannan Park which incorporates:
 - Consideration of field layout, lighting, parking and extended passive recreation opportunities (eg bbq, circuit path, landscaping, additional shade, seating etc).
 - Consultation with sporting groups and neighbouring residents.
- · Progressively implement the outcomes of the Gannan Park Masterplan.
- Investigate to convert Gannan Park into two full size football pitches with lighting.
- Investigate to relocate winter baseball from Gannan Park to ELS Hall #2.
- Upgrade ancillary facilities at Gannan Park to accommodate the new use.

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Engagement approach

Principles






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Respondents of online survey

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Response themes

The following themes were identified with the aggregation of all the data collected from the online surveys, intercept surveys, emails received and drop-in centres. The aggregated data can be found in appendix C.

Theme 1 | Favourite elements of the plan

Scooter Path:

There was overwhelming support for the scooter path around the perimeter of the site with many users commenting (64% online support) on how this will provide children with a safe place to learn to ride a bike away from traffic. This element of the park appears to be one which will be highly utilised by site visitors. There was the occasional request for the addition of little street signs (ie, stop signs or roundabouts) for kids to practice their road sense, similar to Ryde Park.

Paths

There is support for the proposed paths throughout the site (70% for granite path on the embankment, 85% for grassed trails on the upper emabankment and 64% for the scooter track) and for those paths connecting the site to the surrounding streets (75% support for connection to Boyce Street and 72% support for a connection to Buna Street).

The paths are seen to provide better access to and around the site, but also will encourage more opportunities for walking and cycling. The different range of path types is also highly commended with positive comments about the grassed as well as paved path options.

Playground:

The playground is currently seen as lacking in a range of activities for various age groups. The proposal to expand the playground area to include more activities was highly regarded by respondents. However there were a few respondents who did not want to see the playground extended (13% of online respondents did not support the extension). The main motivation to this seems to be that it would attract more people to the park.

Sports field:

Many respondents liked the plan to keep the large field space to allow for more than one activity at a time on the site (ie, play a casual game of frisbee while other's play cricket). Responses were received that wished the current sports field usage to remain.

Embankment:

The response to the embankment having additional planting (77% online support for extended bush regeneration area and 80% support for new ground covers) and maintaining the running tracks (85% online support) was very positive. The embankments are seen as neglected and there were many comments in the first round of consultation that would like to see the area bush regenerated. This has been reflected in the draft masterplan with the proposed landscaping which has been received positively.

Landscaping:

There is a positive response to the inclusion of greater landscaping - particularly shade trees throughout the site. There is an overwhelming response for "more trees" with 67% of online support. The new picnic shelters received 63% online support.

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Theme 1 | Favourite elements of the plan continued

Amenities:

An additional water fountain is well received (80% online support) as well as the picnic facilities (68% online support) however some respondents objected to the proposed picnic facilities (see theme 2 for more detail) (18% strongly disagree). The seating throughout the site is also well supported, particularly the range of seating options.

There was support for the relocation and upgrade of the amenities block (59% of online respondents), however during the drop in events support for the relocation of the amenities was low.

Drainage:

There was strong support for an upgrade of the drainage through the initial consultation period. Respondents were happy with the inclusion of drainage upgrades to the park in the draft plan.

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Theme 2 | Elements to change in the plan

Many respondents were happy with the draft plan and did not see the need to make any changes. However the following is a list of items that were raised throughout the exhibition period.

Sports fields:

Several respondents did not like the idea of increasing the intensity of sports on the site. Especially sports such as soccer. However, the North Ryde Soccer Club would like the sports field to include two new soccer fields with lights. Baseball players are also wary of moving the local club to another site after having Gannan Park as their home ground for many decades.

Landscaping:

Some respondents would like to ensure that plantings are not only native, but also endemic to the area. There is mixed feelings regarding street planting along Buna Street and near to the amenities block with some approving of the idea and others saying this should be changed to keep some visual surveillance from the street.

Seating:

Although in general, additional seating around the site was seen as a positive addition (68% of online respondents in support), there were some respondents who associated additional seating with encouraging people to loiter after dark which may lead to illegal activities. There was a request to move the seats to the inside side of the scooter path, further away from residents.

Paths:

Generally the pathways are well received however some would like them scaled back to reduce attracting people to the park. Some would also like to see some of the grassed embankment paths made out of granite instead. There was also a request to move the scooter track further back from the houses on the northern boundary.

Amenities building:

The upgrade and relocation of the amenities building was supported by the community (59% of respondents strongly agreed or agreed), however, some respondents expressed concerns about the cost of relocating the existing facilities from the current location. One suggestion was to install additional covered tables in-lieu of relocating the amenities block.

Lighting

Floodlighting was not specifically identified in the draft masterplan. However, comments in relation to floodlighting of the oval were received from the community. Should Council propose floodlighting, Council will undertake further community consultation and follow a Development Application process. Some local sporting clubs and sporting users were advocating for the installation of floodlighting. Some residents expressed concerns about the installation of floodlighting. An anonymous letter was distributed to residents in the surrounding streets which erroneously stated that Council was including floodlighting in the plan. See Appendix D for copy of letter.

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Theme 2 | Elements to change in the plan continued

Parking:

Some respondents wished for more parking onsite. It is noted that some respondents expressed concerns about increased intensity of the site and park users parking in the surrounding streets.

Cricket nets

Note: The cricket nets were inadvertantly left off the draft masterplan. There was no intention by Council to remove the existing nets, There were many requests to reinstate the cricket nets. However this was based on the oversight in the plan.

Playground:

Some residents raised concerns regarding the proximity of the playground to the car park.



Weekend drop-in session

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Theme 3 | Elements missing from the draft plan

Overall, the plan was well supported with many respondents suggesting that there are no additional elements required in the masterplan.

Access:

Respondents wished to see improved paths and access in the surrounding streets to improve the safety of travelling to the site. This is outside the scope of the project, however the comments have been included for Council's consideration.

Parking:

A few respondents wished to see more parking at the site.

Dog off-leash area:

There were some requests to include a dog off-leash area at the site. However based on the feedback from the initial consultation period, there was stronger support for no fenced dog area at the site. In addition, there was a request for the exact location of the dog bins to be included in the masterplan.

Cricket nets:

NOTE: The cricket nets were inadvertantly left off the draft masterplan so there were a high number of respondents wishing to see them reinstated. There was a very strong response to include the cricket nets back into the masterplan.

Lighting:

Floodlighting was not specifically identified in the draft masterplan. Concerns from some residents about the installation of floodlighting were received. Should floodlighting be investigated further in the future, Council will undertake further community consultation and follow a Development Application process. The installation of low level lighting along the access paths to allow for some evening exercise (ie, walking or jogging along the paths in winter) was suggested by some respondents.

Exercise stations:

Some respondents requested exercise stations to be included around the parks or a dedicated outdoor workout area.

Playground:

There were some suggestions to include a slide that follows the slope of the hillside into the playground design and to also reinstate a playground at the other end of the park.

Landscaping:

There was a suggestion to include bird and possum boxes throughout the trees. There were also several suggestions for additional shade trees, however this may be due to a misinterpretation of the plan which already includes several additional shade trees around the perimeter of the sports field.

A comment was received to review landscaping and soil profile at the rear of Numa St.

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Theme 3 | Elements missing from the draft plan continued

Baseball:

There were requests to reinstate baseball facilities into the masterplan and include an upgrade to include nets and dugouts.

Bins:

There is a request for more bins at the site. One suggestion is for an additional bin near the drainage area next to the cricket nets and another suggestion is to install a bin at each entrance to the parks.

Sustainability:

It is recommended that solar is used for the amenities blocks and picnic shelters and a rainwater tank be installed at the amenities block. It was also suggested that there could be interpretive signs around the rain garden to improve knowledge of water sensitive urban design.

Lights and night activities:

Lights were not included in the draft plan and in general this is supported by the community. NOTE: There was an anonymous flyer (see appendix D) distributed to residents which indicated that Council would be installing floodlights. This was not the case and many misinformed emails and a petition (appendix E) were submitted to Council objecting to floodlights.

The concerns of the local residents in relation to floodlighting, noise and traffic have been noted. Should Council determine floodlighting is required in the future, Council will undertake further community consultation and follow a Development Application process.

Other:

Other less common requests included a water feature near to the playground and the inclusion of a canteen or cafe at the site - either as a separate amenity or included in the amenities block. Based on the significant amount of commentary on reducing the attractors to the site, the proposal for a cafe would most likely be strongly opposed by the local community. There was also one request to duplicate the amenities block for the other side of the sportsfield. Some respondents requested CCTV and regular security patrols of the site.



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Recommendations

Based on the information received throughout the draft masterplan exhibition stage of stakeholder engagement for Gannan and McCauley Parks, the final masterplan for Gannan and McCauley Parks should include the following:

Embankment

- Retain existing embankment and grass trails with minimal changes.
- Expand bush regeneration area from McCauley Park along the embankment.
- Plant shrubs, groundcovers and trees on the slopes of the embankment with consideration to be given to the adjacent landowners.

Landscaping

- Expand and enhance garden beds within the park.
- Expand garden beds along Buna Street frontage giving consideration to good passive surveillance from the road with the provision of shade trees for park users,

Picnic facilities, seating and shade

- · Include picnic facilities, seating and shade on site.
- Ensure picnic facilities and seating is located an adequate distance from residential boundaries to reduce noise impacts on adjacent landowners.
- Install water stations with dog bowls.

Site access and paths

- · Install new park entrance signage.
- Improve pedestrian access and signage to site.
- Improve pedestrian access around the site and consider design of path edging to reduce trip hazards to players on the oval.
- Investigate options to optimise and consider expanding the car park to reduce impacts on adjacent landowners.

Amenities building

- Undertake a cost/benefit analysis for relocating the existing amenities block.
- Consider installing energy and water efficiency upgrades.
- · New or updated amenities block to be inclusive and provides access for all abilities.

Sustainability and Environment

- Utilise energy and water efficiency solutions.
- Use plants for native habitat onsite and enhancing the existing garden beds.
- Enhance the embankment by removing weeds and replanting with grasses, shrubs and trees.
- Investigate water sensitive urban design solutions for car park run off.
- · Investigate potential for stormwater harvesting for irrigation.

Lighting

Should floodlighting be proposed for Gannan Park, Council will need to undertake further community
consultation and follow a Development Application process.

Sportsgrounds and sporting activities

- · Retain sportsground as grass open space for use by the community for multiple sports.
- Keep the village common feel of the site.
- Include and expand the cricket nets.
- · Improve sportsfield drainage and irrigation.

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Playground

- Consider enhancing playground design to include slide.
- Better integrate the playground with the natural surroundings of the park.

Bins

Include additional bins in the parks.

Dogs

- Include dog bag dispensers at the park.
- Include dog bowls with water stations.

Exercise stations

Include a range of exercise stations around the parks.



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



Theme 1 | Favourite elements of the Plan

- Maintain the large oval space so people can have their little corners for activities
- The two soccer fields as we can use the fields to allow kids to play and get fitter.
- Additionally to the increasing population and units being built more sporting fields are required.
- The proposal to install 2 new soccer fields, lighting and amenities. North Ryde Soccer Club and other club in the area are struggling with space for weekend games, weekday training and preseason trial games. Clubs are completing with each other for training space during the week and for preseason activities. Our club is growing with over 500 members now and will continue to grow as units are constructed in the North Ryde area. There has been talk of upgrading Magadala oval and the RSL oval but no progress has been seen at these locations and hence we would support any proposal to increase the number of grounds and facilities in the area
- The proposal to establish two new football fields with lighting would greatly assist the Association in scheduling weekend matches for clubs in the Ryde Area. At the moment, there is a severe shortage of fields which will only get worse with continued growth in the local population and this has led to the rapid degradation of the fields we do use. In the Ryde area this year we have already been forced to discontinue use of 4 fields due to their poor condition, which only adds to the load on the remaining fields

Seating

- Scooter track like at Ryde Bowling Club Site. Keep it separate from dogs
- Move scooter track further back from the houses on the northern boundary.
- Proposed natural decomposed granite path leave as natural turf, no need for decomposed granite
 Not keen on the scooter track. A huge appeal for the Park is the vast expanse that it has. It feels natural though in a
- metropolitan area. Putting a boundary around it (a concrete scooter path) limits the vast scale of the Park, and creates an unpleasant sense of restriction. This goes against the main purpose of the Park for so many, where they can be surrounded by a piece of nature, away from the busy Sydney life."
- North Ryde Common is a larger area and is not designated as a sports ground. The Common is a great spot for scooter tracks, picnic areas and BBQ areas.

Amenities building:

- Moving amenities building. Waste of ratepayers money and team have not thought about safety aspects of moving this building closer to the playing area. Cricket balls may hit building and persons using the building, it is already unsafe to walk around the park when cricket games in progress. Not enough room for cricket pitch and amenities block in the space available.
- "The proposed new amenity site takes up precious park space. The amenity building is seldom used except for the toilet. I do not think moving it to the proposed location will increase it's use. Currently baseball players have adequate seating and shelters behind the net and people who attend cricket events bring portable tents and seats and they prefer sitting around the field. I do not think they need the amenity building to put their equipments

- The amenities block will be too close to the BBQs. Toilet will be right next to where you want to eat.
- Huge expense to relocate toilet block for minimal gain. Also negatively impacts play area with line of sight from sport
 area. Cuts off play area from the main grounds. (x2)
 - "Please do not move amenities block.
- Shop never been used while I have been using park 15 years. Players bring their own drinks (usually beer)council would have to have liquor licence to provide what the players want."
- "Do not relocate the amenities building, just upgrade it. It's a huge cost for little benefit, actually make things worse. It would separate the kids' playground from the sports fields, creating child safety concerns from lack of view.
- I am not sure if it is a good idea to relocate the amenities building. The current shelters are great for family and friends gathering, and for those who attend sporting events as it provides a wide open view of the park.
- I really don't think having a new amenities building there will promote its use.

Lighting:

- Absolutely no floodlights or soccer fields
- · Don't increase the lighting
- To whom this may concern.

This is to voice my objection in regards to installing flood lights at Gannon Park. As a resident of Minga street there are many reasons why this should not go ahead and main one being there will absolutely be parking chaos. As Minga street isn't a big street as it is, having any sporting events being training or actual sport games will cause many problems for residents parking in their own street let alone infront/near their houses.

A perfect example - movie night held here in April at Gannon Park. People desperate for parking and parked anywhere and everywhere. A parking ranger would have had a field day booking everyone had they known. Residents even were knocked back from driving into their own street - ridiculous.

Obviously a big No for the flood lights unless council wants complaints from residents. We need the street to stay as it is, we are many growing families who live here and priority for parking should go to us and our growing children! The last thing we need are issues with parking on this quiet and peaceful street.

Unless council wants to go around installing parking for residents signage please don't go ahead and install lights for soccer at this park. There are many other parks that can be used for this purpose that are currently for that.

· Dear Top Ryde Council,

I am writing to voice my concern with proposed lights being installed at Gannan Park and question why proposed evening games were not advised in the mail correspondence provided a number of weeks ago?

My main concern is with poles, street parking, and increased traffic through the street.

My main concern is with noise, street parking, and increased traffic through the street.

Parking: There have been issues raised in the past where limited street parking results in people park across residential drive ways. If this happens as a result of evening games, residences will quickly become extremely frustrated. Noise: I have witnessed groups of people congregating on the footpath outside peoples homes after games to drink alcohol. This is not ideal.

Increase in Traffic: It is not uncommon for players to speed down the street at excessive speeds after games. This makes the street unsafe for children.

I am not trying to oppose people using the park or enjoying themselves, however the Minga street residences are concerned with adverse changes which will directly affect their quality of life.

Just in regards to this survey - it is actually about the upgrade of Gannon Park which there aren't any mention of flood lights - no point completing if the residents are objecting to the flood lights. But we have been informed that there may be flood lights installed which we are strongly objecting to.

I have previously completed this survey but to advise that I am happy with the other changes being made ie, scooter
track and other kid friendly changes - definitely would not have been happy with changing to a weekend training/game
soccer field that would affect the traffic and parking in our street.

I wanted to confirm that our emails (and I'm sure you will be receiving many from Minga St) are taken into considering and not put to the side. A neighbour actually is confirming with a member of parliament which will hopefully help as

well. Assuming all correspondence and opinions from residents are usually taken into consideration.

Dear Officer.

Our family lives on Berripa Close and has recently received a notification that the Ryde Council has created a draft masterplan installing two floodlight soccer fields at Gannan Park.

We would like to raise our objection to the draft plan. We live close to Gannan Park and appreciate the peace and quiet environment. We do not want to see our street became a car park.

Appreciate your consideration.

I wish to object to your draft masterplan regarding the installation of floodlights in Gannan Park.

Will you please advise me who came up with the idea and why the Council would even want to consider such a plan.

I can presume the installation of lights for sports clubs is only a cash grab and vote getter at Minga St and surrounding residents expense.

I have lived in Minga St since 1978 and I have always felt safe and secure due to the fact we have had minimal thefts and I believe zero brake and enters, this will now be threatened by you encouraging use of Gannan Park in the evenings, more strangers introduced into the area.

Parking has been at a premium in the street for quite some time due to the fact most families have more than one car, at approximately 1730 onwards a minimum of 30 residents vehicles are parked in the street.

When the park is used on weekends/weekdays for sporting events visitors to the street have no regard for residents parking they park over driveways, on the corner of 20 Minga St and in the cul-de-sacs, the best example of no parking in the street was when you used the park for a Saturday evening movie, my family could not visit us, again your idea had no regard for the residents.

To add insult to injury, upon returning home from shopping that evening I was asked by the Security Officer positioned at the entrance to Minga St to prove I lived in the street, the street was full of strangers vehicles, why were they allowed in if they were not residents?

 I refer to a letter dated 30th April 2018 distributed by the Mayor regarding Traffic and Parking around Ryde Secondary College.

Cir Jerome Laxale obviously has family going to the college and wants us to express our concerns, he is not worried about Minga St residents or the children in the street as he does not live or have family in the street, very one sided. A suggestion, should this go ahead, is to place parking restrictions in Minga St and the surrounding streets advising persons using the park, no parking will be available from 1700 on the nights the park will be in use. Permits can be issued to residents so as we can have visitors.

All the residents know Council will push for this to go ahead with no regard for our concerns, however we do have a vote in the next council elections and we have agreed East Ward will do our best to remove the current councillors.

I am writing to you regarding the upgrade of Gannan/McCauley Parks.

We are residents of Minga Street which is small and quiet cul-de-sac. Minga Street is a narrow street therefore the upgrade of Gannan Park is of great concern to us.

We are a family that enjoys playing all sports and love that we live in such a peaceful area with this beautiful park. We recently had a film night on the 14th of April and the parking situation was horrendous. My husband along with other neighbours were stopped at the entry to the street and told he could not enter as the street was completely full. Another neighbour had to ask visitors to move their car so they could get out of their own driveway. There were a number of cars unsafely parked on the bend of the street outside number 20, in the cul-de-sac and blocking driveway access.

We have workmen in the street at the moment adding electoral cables there is enough room for one car on each side of the street and one car to drive through. During the evening and weekends our street is at capacity, I would hate to think that we as residents are having to leave our cars in other streets or having to park on our median strip or across our own driveway and be fined. Before this upgrade is considered more parking must be made available and parking restrictions in our street put in place. I understand you are looking at having soccer training at the moment however as our population is expanding therefore down the track there may be evening. Saturday and Sunday games. This needs to be catered for. I don't believe 2 hour parking limit will be satisfactory, due to the length of time of the games. We are a street that doesn't have street signs which we love and I would be very unhappy to have the large painted white crosses outside of each driveway as you do in Callaghan Street and Warwick Street this is extremely

I don't believe that I will be personally affected by the lighting however I am concerned you have submitted a map with all of the new facilities, equipment and trees however I do not understand why you don't have any lighting mentioned or a diagram on your map of where the lights will be. In conversation with a neighbour he attended one of your meetings in the park and said that nothing was mentioned to him regarding the lighting. You have also emailed me information that was sent out to the residents and again nothing mentioned. I do not understand why you are not be transparent with this?

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There are some elements of the upgrade I will enjoy. The expanded playground, grass trails on the upper level embankments, new scooter tracks. Perhaps you could also consider the exercise equipment you have put in the park at Meadowbank a cycling and walking track. This will be a real asset to the park especially if you are looking at putting the lights in.

Thank you for this consideration I will be looking forward to hearing from you regarding what you propose for our street parking and where you will be installing the lights.

· To Whom This May Concern,

We are residents from 37 Minga Street Ryde and are responding to your letter regarding installing floodlights in Gannan Park due to creating a Soccer Field.

We are not happy with proceeding with your request and not because of the actual soccer games as we don't mind sport activity in the park, but as we

reside right across the park just one house down from the colder-sac side, having cars parked on our street and large floodlights, & noise will affect us and all our neighbourhood.

 We are a family of 6 at home with teenage kids all, which have cars, we only have a double garage and a small drive way, therefor the rest of our cars are parked on

way, therefor the rest of our cars are parked on our front street, hence this will be a problem if the street will be occupied with other cars due to sports activity. Given

there is an existing car park area already allocated for Gannon Park, on the back street we, cannot approve our street to become a car park area, as we are very sure this will cause problems & conflict not only for us, but for the rest of the street.

Minga street is a beautiful, peaceful, friendly & family orientated street, we all know each other and most of us have pretty large families, so you will find most of the street is already occupied with its own residential parking.

We are also concerned about the noise, given soccer training will be till late at night during the week, we are concerned as most of us in the street are young families

who are working full-time and some of us get up early, so having noise till late at night during the week, is quiet a concern. We already have sport activity in the park, on the weekend

but don't mind that as this at least is during the weekend and as we mentioned prior we don't mind sports activity in the park duringappropriate times.

We totally appreciate that you wish to use a beautiful park like Gannan Park for sports activity but given you are requesting for week night activity we have to object to this, and hope you will understand and consider our decision.

I am a resident and rate payer of Minga Street in Ryde. I have reviewed the Gannan and Macauley Park materplan and I note that there are potential plans to install two floodlit soccer fields in Gannan Park.

I am very concerned about this proposal from a number of points and I wanted to voice my thoughts and request that the observation that retention the open space is a priority is the option adopted.

I do not believe that the area will support the increase in traffic and demand for car parking.

The car park for the facility is completely inadequate. When the open air cinema was staged earlier in the year, Minga Street was very congested. The road is so narrow that when there are a large number of cars parked it makes getting out of your drive a challenge. One of my neighbours was completely blocked from his own drive. That is an unacceptable situation.

Ausgrid are installing new electrical cabling in the Street. This has involved a number of diggers and areas fenced off for approximately 25% of the street at a time. This has caused huge disruption and inconvenience. Getting out of our drive was a huge challenge and only the help of the workers helped avoid accidents.

These two events are proof that Minga Street cannot sustain or support any further cars parked in the street. If the strategy was adopted and both pitches were used they would be demand for parking from 44 players plus spectators. There is a change over when the next games players etc arrive while the game before is being played. That could mean as many as 88 cars plus spectators possibly exceeding 100 cars in the area. The car park can accomodate about 50 cars. Minga Street is the main overflow option and I do not believe it can support even 10 more cars let alone 50, it is just not sustainable. Getting in and out of the driveway will be problematic, adults and children crossing the road safely will be an issue, all this disruption all mean that this option is flawed.

In addition there will also be huge disturbance by the noise and floodlights at night which will affect our quiet enjoyment which I am sure many others will adequately cover.

As an alternative wouldn't it be more appropriate to take advantage of the current fit for purpose facility at Meadowbank with the existing infrastructure and in particular car parking to support the facility and adopt a relatively cost effective strategy of simply adding floodlights.

I am happy to discuss this further if required.

We totally appreciate that you wish to use a beautiful park like Gannan Park for sports activities but given you are requesting for weeknight activities we have to object to this, and hope you will understand and consider our decision. If you wish to discuss this further please feel free to contact me via email.

- As teams have begun to use the oval more, consider adding lights for night training. Could also expand garden at northern end of Gannan park
- Floodlighting of the area is required to enable night time sporting activities. This is in line with Council's Sport and Recreation Strategy which details the outcome, in Goal 1 "To make the most of what we have"
- We support the intensification and maximisation of use of the space to meet the future demand for sports fields
 detailed within Council's Sport and Recreation Strategy, subject to an identified user group wanting to take up the
 space. This includes incorporating 2 full size rectangular fields.
- The 2018 NSROC Sportsground Management Strategy also identifies a shortage of sportsgrounds in the Ryde area for the projected demand into the future. Floodlit rectangular grounds at this location will assist in meeting this demand.
- The boxed interpretation of the community consultation accords with the feelings of local residents; I Strongly oppose
 night soccer lighting and craetion of 2 soccer fields in the space; high useage, overlapping crowds, field degradation

Hoping that Ryde Council take our objection and comments into consideration,



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Executive summary

Council engaged Flagship Communications, a specialist stakeholder engagement company, to lead the community consultation process for the development of a masterplan for Gannan and McCauley Park, Ryde.

From 15 November to 10 December 2017, a stakeholder engagement period was open for stakeholders to provide their feedback on the existing precinct and what their thoughts are for the future of the site.

The engagement period was promoted through Council's website and dedicated Have Your Say page, social media and DL flyers to targeted stakeholders and residents and posters in the park.

Stakeholders had many opportunities to provide their feedback including an online survey, stakeholder interviews, intercept surveys and drop-in sessions.

A dedicated phone number and Council's email address were also promoted as methods for stakeholders to provide input to the project.

Council received significant feedback from many stakeholders including local residents, park users, and relevant council staff.

Engagment interaction included approximately 50 one-on-one interactions at drop-in sessions with over 130 comments provided by participants; 21 intercept surveys of precinct users; 72 online surveys completed; four feedback interviews through the 1300 number; and 4 staff members and stakeholder groups interviewed.

The following key themes were identified during the stakeholder engagement process:

Theme 1 | Getting to the site

The preferred method of getting to the site is walking. Parking is not currently a major issue at this site.

Theme 2 | Thoughts on the site

The site is well-loved by the local community who like the site to remain as a predominantly passive recreation site. The site is predominantly used for passive recreation, with a Village Green feel at the site.

Many users walk, exercise or take their dogs or children for unstructured recreation.

Theme 3 | Impact to residents

The site is surrounded by low denisity residential properties with a steep embankment where both noise and visual amenity can be heavily impacted in the surrounding area.

Theme 4 | Sports activities

The site is currently used for cricket and baseball competition and training for day use only. There are mixed feelings from sports clubs on relocating to or from Gannan Dayle.

Theme 5 | Facilities

There is a need for more spectator and passive recreation facilities at the site including shading, seating and BBQ facilities.

Theme 6 | Playground

The playground does not provide enough equipment for various age groups. There is a request for more to be included.

Theme 7 | Dogs

The site is used a lot by off leash dog owners, however this causes conflict with other users of the parks.

Theme 8 | Night activities

The site is not currently lit or used at night. Predominantly, users and adjacent landowners would like it to remain this way.

Theme 9 | Site maintenance

The site is considered to be maintained in an average state with no major maintenance issues raised.

Theme 10 | Natural environment

There were many requests for more trees at the site, especially throughout McCauley Park.

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Background



The objectives of the consultation are to:



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Engagement approach




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
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Respondents of online survey

The majority of the online survey respondents were within walking distance of the parks, with a few exceptions throughout the Sydney metropolitan area. The survey was completed by predominantly females aged 40-59.

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Response themes

The following themes were identified with the aggregation of all the data collected from the online surveys, intercept surveys, stakeholder interviews and residents' workshop. The aggregated data can be found in appendix C. It seems that the respondents were generally passive site-users with only limited responses provided by organised sports participants. This may impact the types of responses received on particular topics. Feedback provided by sports clubs are hgihlighted in bold in the aggregated data in appendix C.

Theme 1 | Getting to the site

Overwhelmingly the preferred method of getting to the site is walking (71%). Driving a car was the only other notable option (25%).

There were some comments on the lack of appropriate pedestrian walkways in the surrounding streets, with some road crossings perceived as difficult.

Generally, the amount of car parking did not seem to be a significant issue at the site. Although some nearby residents did not like on-street parking, based on the existing level of usage of the site, this is not considered an overwhelming problem.

There did seem to be some concern that car parking may become an issue if the intensity of the park usage was increased.

The carpark is locked on occasions. This seems to be mainly at night and this is seen as a positive approach by respondents because it has lowered the crime rate at the park where there have been previous problems with drug dealing. However it seems that sometimes the car park is not reopened during daylight hours, leaving park users to park on the nearby streets instead.

Theme 2 | Thoughs on the site

The parks are currently used for organised baseball and cricket however the predominant use of the site is for passive, unstructured recreation. The park has a village "commons" characteristic with a strong focus on passive recreation.

The site is used for predominantly unstructured activities including: outdoor exercise (74%), play with kids (53%), walk or sit in the bushland (49%), use the playground (42%), play with dogs (37%), use the picnic area (21%) and play with my friends (16%).

Activities related to organised sports had a much lower participation rate: watching sports or events (33%), cricket training and competition (13%), baseball training and competition (10%).

These usage statistics validate the sense of a village commons atmosphere at the parks.

The site is used for walking and running with users enjoying both the wide, flat, grassed areas of Gannan Park and the tiered inclines through the bush in McCauley Park. Local schools use the site for running carnivals and take advantage of the tiered paths throughout McCauley Park for cross country events. There is at least one school that relies heavily on the park for sports activities with no field of their own at the school site.

The site is used for social gatherings including local residents using it for end of year functions, family gatherings, BBQs and picnics. Exercise and play for both children and dogs is a prominent activitiy at the site. Although the site is not an official off-leash site, most dogs seen at the site during engagement events were not on a leash.

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Theme 2 | Thoughts on the site continued

Overwhelmingly, participants commented on the vast open space and their positive experience with the natural characteristics of the parks. Users like the wide open space and parkland characteristics of the site and love the proximity to their homes. They appreciate having a space to play and exercise within a relaxing, peaceful and low noise environment.

Although the majority of the site is used for unstructured activities, users appreciate that the site is also used for organised sports, but agreed that both baseball and cricket were seen as low-key, low-noise sports that fit in well with the overall characteristics and use of the site.

Site users regularly described the parks as more of a village common with a strong community feel, rather than a sports field and wanted to keep this characteristic of the parks - especially in light of the parks' location within a quiet, residential setting.

Respondents did not want the park to have any residential development with most remarking how lucky they were to have the park so close to their homes and appreciated the facility without the need for any changes.

Theme 3 | Impact on residents

Many of the residents who live in close proximity to the parks remarked on how much they enjoyed the park. It was their view that their positive experience was because of the low intensity use of the park, where the organised sports chosen for the site (baseball and cricket) were low-key and low-noise with not many players (not many cars). Most residents did not want activity on the site after dark due to noise, light pollution and perceived criminal activity.

They enjoyed the amenity and outlook over the park, with most adjoining landowners not wanting their view of the park blocked by any vegetated screening.

Some trees were dropping branches into adjacent properties so there were some comments about improving the maintenance of trees along the boundary.

There are some instances of players jumping over residents' fences to retrieve balls.



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Theme 4 | Sports activities

There were some specific comments related to existing and requested sports for the site.

There were not many comments about the baseball at the site, with most users reasonably happy with the facilities. However, some other park users would like baseball users to be more careful with their balls with other users on the site.

The cricket users like the practice nets, but would like more of them. It gets very boggy next to the cricket nets after rain. Cricket players tend to lose balls in the long grass at the base of the tiered embankment.

Some park users would like to have hard courts for volley ball or basketball, but most comments were for more casual play - rather than competition (ie, a half court with a wall to hit a ball against).

The comments on having soccer in the park were very mixed. Many did not want organised soccer games in the park, citing that it is too intensive and noisy for the site. However, there were some requests to have some soccer goals installed "just for fun".

Comments on oragnised sports within the park varied. Some would like to see more sports introduced such as, rugby or soccer, others would like some equipment installed for casual sports use and others do not want any intensification of sports on the site at all.

Key sporting clubs who use the site have been consulted to ascertain their thoughts on relocating some sports between Gannan Park and ELS Hall Park. The following are summaries of their comments:

Ryde Hunters Hill Cricket Club:

Gannan is currently one of the top cricket grounds for Inner West Harbour Junior and Senior cricket. If it is turned into two soccer pitches, the club requests that there are no burning of lines into the grass (which happens at other grounds) as they create trenches and trip hazards for our players. Also they request that there be very strict finish dates to allow the ground time to repair for the cricket season and most importantly that the cricket pitch cannot be moved

Ryde Panthers Football Club:

The Ryde Panthers Football Club would need to be a very compelling concept and offer on the table to get their support to move to Gannan Park. Their concerns include:

- ELS Hall Park has been their historic home and heartland for over 70 years
- With current growth projections, the Ryde Panthers Football Club will be too big by 2027 to occupy a more
 contained and less accessible space with no area to expand.
- Regardless of the upgrades to Gannan Park, the Ryde Panthers Football Club will be worse off being removed from multifunctional facilities at ELS Hall Park which we already use to capacity.
- The population of our club and football activities would have a negative impact on traffic flow, parking and therefore on the quality of life of local residents. They are active on their home field 5 - 6 days a week.
- Given the proximity to local residents of the fields, the need for flood lighting, the impact on traffic, parking and a predicted increase in noise generated from training and game day activities would potentially alienate the club from the locals.

The club suggests the following for consideration:

- Move AFL to Gannan, move Ryde Panthers Football Club to ELS Hall No.1 with ELS Hall No.3 as our second field and keep baseball on ELS Hall No.2.
- AFL could possibility get a full-size oval at Gannan as ELS Hall No. 3 is in fact not big enough to accommodate senior AFL games.

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Theme 4 | Sports activities continued

North West Women's Football Club

There are currently not enough sporting fields in the City of Ryde and one proposal (from the consultants) was that both clubs and associations cap membership at both grass roots level and elite.

The second proposal – which will currently be enforced in 2019 – is to restrict usage to 30 hours per week for each field including match days. This will seriously limit the club's training capacity at a time when the club is looking to grow women's football on the back of the Matilda's success.

The ability to have two full sized football fields with sports lighting year round is a benefit to all forms of football/training/clinics etc. Gannon is a well designed field with a good amenities block that is clearly looking to be upgraded.

Pacific Coast Baseball League:

The PCBL currently operates 4 baseball seasons per year. Under PCBL they have affiliated three Ryde Council base clubs: Ryde Eastwood, Macquarie Saints and North Ryde RSL. Between the three clubs there are over 32 senior teams each year during the summer and winter seasons with a total of 14 different skill graded team groups. Grounds are required, due to location and size to be rated to suit from the top to lowest level of baseball skills, as per team grading.

Currently the needs for senior baseball in the Ryde Council area are being adequately serviced. Note that Junior baseball season competition only operates in the Summer season. However, during winter, there are several weekend invitational tournaments, and the only current ground is Pioneer Park. Having ELS Hall Park available in winter would enable a better field and parking. Although Gannan Park has served well for over 25 years the senior baseball in the Ryde Council area, a move for Winter season to ELS Hall Park would be a significant step. This is because, the ELS Hall Park facilities will continue to provide a ground for the higher level of baseball grade as Gannan Park does.

There are 3 significant advantages:

- Will provide the Ryde Council with a permanent all year round baseball ground, bringing substantial maintenance and infrastructure cost savings;
- Will provide a second, with Pioneer Park, exclusive use baseball ground catering from the highest to lowest grade of baseball, thus accommodating the widest range of players; and
- 3) Will provide the baseball clubs based in the Ryde Council area with a clear focussed field identity.

We strongly support the move of winter baseball from Gannan Park to ELS Hall Park.

Theme 5 | Facilities

There were requests for more facilities at the site, with most facilities requested being for passive recreation or spectating sports on the site.

Overwhelmingly, respondents wanted more shaded seating provided around the site, not just for spectating games but also for casual picnics and BBQs. The provision of BBQs for sports players and casual users of the site and drinking fountains was also requested by many respondents. Although there were a few respondents who did not want BBQ facilities because it was perceived that it would attract undesirable people to the park.

Facilities to enhance the existing fitness and recreation uses of the park were also requested including, exercise stations, bike trails for kids and walking paths looping around the site and having access through McCauley Park.

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Theme 6 | Playground

Overwhelmingly, the new playground equipment was given a poor review. Although the equipment tries to cater for a range of ages and abilities, it also only provides limited play equipment for each group. The equipment is considered boring, with many parents describing the metal train and other equipment as unsafe due to how hot it gets on sunny days.

Also many park users were disappointed that the playground was removed from the other side of McCauley

There were many requests for a greater amount of play equipment giving more range for each age/ability group. There was also a request for more natural play equipment, incorporating the natural features of the sites, ie, rocks and logs to jump over or a slide incorporated into the natural slope of the hills.

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Theme 7 | Dogs

Although the parks are not official off-leash areas, it is certainly used as one. This is to the delight of dog owners, but it does cause some problems with other users of the park. Many people described the nickname of the park as "dog sh** park" because of the amoung of dog faeces left on the site from dog owners.

There was mixed feelings of having a fenced dog area. Some liked the idea, but many did not like the idea of fencing in their dogs.

There was strong desire for doggy bins and bags to be provided at the site to alleviate some of the existing problems.

Some parents did not take their children to the playground any more because their kids were scared of dogs which regularly approach children around the playground equipment.

Theme 8 | Night activities

Night activities are actively discouraged at the site. Currently the carpark gates are locked after dark to reduce the incidence of the park being used as a drug selling spot (a previous problem at the site).

Many participants did not want the site floodlit due to the adverse impact on the surrounding residential areas. It was considered that night activities would create noise (the parks being part of a natural ampitheatre overlooked by residential properties), light pollution and unsavoury behaviour.

Some (but not many) local residents did understand that sports grounds were at a premium and that some intensification may be needed to help alleviate this across the district - although this view was not shared by many.



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Theme 9 | Site maintenance

The site is considered to be reasonably well maintained. There are some areas of the park where improvement would be preferred.

The irrigation of the sportsfield is relatively poor with the under surface irrigation system only partially working. This is possibly not a major issue at the site because no high impact sports are played on the site and the surface can recover without too much active irrigation.

The practice cricket nets are well used however some maintenance of them is desired, especially where there is poor drainage along the side of the nets which becomes very boggy after rain.

Carpark users and adjacent landowners would like to see more active maintenance of the trees with the ocassional tree branches dropping.

The most significant area for maintenance is throughout McCauley Park where respondents wanted greater maintenance of the bushland and more active bush regeneration.

Theme 10 | Natural environment

The natural environment of the site is well regarded and is considered integral to the identity of the parks. Many commented on the amount of birdlife in the park with Tawny Frog Mouths, Galahs, Corellas frequenting the parks.

Participants would like more trees for shading, however adjacent landowners do not want their view of the parks obscured by trees.

There was a significant amount of support for greater bush regeneration throughout McCauley Park to build on previous regeneration and to reduce the weed growth.

There was also a request for greater recognition of the waterways that have been piped through the site and even a request for some of it to be reinstated as the natural overland flow.

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Recommendations

Based on the information received throughout the initial stage of stakeholder engagement for Gannan and McCauley parks, the following recommendations are provided for the development of the draft masterplan.

Theme 1 | Getting to the site

Investigate improvements to pedestrian walkways to the site.

Theme 2 | Thoughts on site

Retain the village commons profile of the site

Theme 3 | Impact on residents

- Sustain the existing level of use intensity at the site
- Maintain the trees around the perimeter of the site

Theme 4 | Sports activities

- · Consider continuing the baseball and cricket at this site
- Any inclusion of additional sports at the site should be low-key and low-impact

Theme 5 | Facilities

- · Increase the amount of seating and shading around the site
- · Install BBQ and drinking fountain facilities
- · Consider installing exercise stations around the site
- Consider increasing the number of cricket nets

Theme 6 | Playground

- · Consider expanding the playground to include a larger amount of equipment.
- Incorporate play equipment into the natural setting of the parks (ie, a slide aligned with the park slopes)

Theme 7 | Dogs

- Install doggy bins and bags around the site
- Consider fencing some areas to segregate dogs from children and/or players

Theme 8 | Night activities

- · Do not increase night activities at the site
- · Consider alternate locations for night games
- Continue to lock the carpark gates in the evenings

Theme 9 | Site maintenance

- · Consider upgrading the irrigation system if the playing field intensity is to be increased
- · Develop a regular maintenance program for the trees across the site

Theme 10 | Natural environment

- · Undertake bush regeneration throughout the parks including the upper embankment area
- Encourage habitat for local fauna
- · Improve profile of local waterways and consider reinstating open drainage channels



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Theme 4 | Sports activities continued

Ryde Hunters Hill Cricket Club:

- Gannan is currently one of the top cricket grounds for Inner West Harbour Junior and Senior cricket. If it is turned into 2 soccer pitches, we wish to ask that there are no burning of lines into the grass (which happens at other grounds) as they create trenches and trip hazards for our players. Also that there be very strict finish dates to allow the ground time to repair for the cricket season and most importantly that the cricket pitch cannot be moved.
- · Its a beautiful ground that we dont wish to see lost to cricket.

Ryde Panthers Football Club:

- To be honest, after reviewing this idea [to relocate sports clubs based on Council's recreation strategy] and data ourselves, there would need to be a very compelling concept and offer on the table to get our support to a proposal like this. We have concerns and would like to discuss the points below.
- Our traditional club entering its 7th decade may be moved from its historic home and heartland.
- With current growth projections, the Ryde Panthers Football Club will be too big by 2027 to occupy a more contained and less accessible space with no area to expand.
- Regardless of the upgrades to Gannan Park, the Ryde Panthers Football Club will be worse off being removed from multifunctional facilities at ELS Hall Park which we already use to capacity.
- The population of our club and football activities would have a negative impact on traffic flow, parking and therefore on the quality of life of local residents. Not just on game day. We are active on our home field 5 6 days a week.
- Given the proximity to local residents of the fields, the need for flood lighting, the impact on traffic, parking and a predicted increase in noise generated from training and game day activities would potentially alienate our club from the locals. Given our good standing in the community currently, that would be a disaster for our club.
- During our review of the Sports and Recreation Strategy, an idea was put forward that we would like to be considered.
 - The suggestion being, to move AFL to Gannan, move Ryde Panthers Football Club to ELS Hall No.1 with ELS Hall No.3 as our second field and keep baseball on ELS Hall No.2.
 - We would then relocate to use the top canteen & storage facilities.
 - AFL could possibility get a full-size oval at Gannan as ELS Hall No. 3 is in fact not big enough to accommodate senior AFL games.
 - Moving AFL to Gannan rather than Ryde Panthers Football Club would cause less disruption to the local residents surrounding Gannan Park, as they are a smaller club than us.

Pacific Coast Baseball League:

- The PCBL currently operates 4 baseball seasons per year, these are: PCBL A League Summer (Sep-Mar); PCBL A League Winter (Apr-Aug); PCBL Masters Spring (Sep-Dec) and PCBL Masters Autumn (Jan-Mar). Under PCBL we have affiliated 3 Ryde Council base clubs: Ryde Eastwood, Macquarie Saints and North Ryde RSL. Between the 3 clubs we have over 32 senior teams each year during the 2 seasons per year (summer and winter). The PCBL grades teams into 7 grades, each with 2 levels, making a total of 14 different skill graded team groups.
- Grounds are required, due to location and size to be rated to suit from the top to lowest level of baseball skills, as per team grading. The current baseball grounds for Summer are ELS Hall Park and Magdala Park rated for all levels; Waterloo Park and Pioneer Park, rated for level D and below. Note in the summer season ELS Hall Park, is also shared with the Ryde Hawks state senior and junior competition and the Women's League. Also operate on Monday nights, the Masters League, for ages of 35 years of age and older. The current baseball grounds for Winter are Gannan Park rated for all levels; and Pioneer Park, rated for level D and below. Plus by arrangement with the North Ryde RSL, also have the use of the North Ryde RSL cricket field, inside the North RSL Club.
- Currently the needs for senior baseball in the Ryde Council area are being adequately serviced. Note that Junior baseball
 season competition only operates in the Summer season. However, during winter, there are several weekend invitational
 tournaments, and the only current ground is Pioneer Park. Having ELS Hall Park available in winter would enable a better field
 and parking.
- Proposed move of Winter season from Gannan Park to ELS Hall Park: Although Gannan Park has served well for over 25 years the senior baseball in the Ryde Council area, a move for Winter season to ELS Hall Park would be a significant step. This is because, the ELS Hall Park facilities will continue to provide a ground for the higher level of baseball grade as Gannan Park does.



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Theme 4 | Sports activities continued

- · There are several issues for which we can draw a parallel analysis:
- Parking
- Parking at Gannan Park is exclusive to baseball users, however it is not as numerous as for other sports. But the parking at
 ELS Hall Park, when taking into account the series of events at the indoor centre could become a problem. However, as the
 car parking for baseball is not as large nor is the hourly turnover, ELS Hall Park is amply suited for baseball. On the other hand
 soccer would gain significantly with the parking facilities at Gannan Park
- Loss of baseballs
- This has been a continuing and costly problem at Gannan Park due to the high density vegetation on the home plate corner
 of the park.
- Toilets and change rooms
- · Both grounds have the same facilities, however at ELS Hall Park, these are significantly closer to the playing field.
- · Warm up area
- Gannan Park has a larger and open area for players warm up in preparation to the game, whereas ELS Hall Park does not
 provide on open area. This is compensated by the use of the indoor batting cage and the pitcher's bullpen.
- Storage area
- ELS Hall Park now provides a ground equipment room adjacent to the ground and a secured lockup area. Whereas Gannan
 Park storage area is well away from the field, although the lock up security box adjacent to the ground, does assist.
- Ground lighting
- It must be remembered that the Ryde Eastwood Baseball Club, addressed the funding and work on the installation of the
 current level 3 baseball field lighting. This project was done before the current DA regulations, whilst most of the funding
 was undertaken by baseball, it was always as property and control of the council. Baseball is a committed partner to ground
 improvements, enjoyed by other sports.
- A move for baseball to ELS Hall Park will provide much needed night training facilities not available to baseball in the winter
- Currently many Ryde Council based baseball clubs accommodate night training at other council locations such as Cumberland, Canada Bay, Hornsby, Kuringai, Baulkham Hills. A move for winter to ELS Hall will have all teams training at their local ground. By having a top level baseball field available all year, the Ryde Council will have a local facility which will benefit all residents.
- Expanded competition
- Another huge benefit would be the re-establishment of the PCBL Masters League for the winter season, played on Monday
 nights. The league ceased the winter league about 4 years ago because the only ground with lights suitable for games was
 the state baseball centre at Blacktown International Sports Park, and the traveling time was a major deterrent for players thus
 the league was abandoned.
- The capacity to undertake a Winter Masters League will provide over 34 year olds to play in a save and supported
 environment. At this age bracket it is expected that many would join, providing an avenue for physical activity and
 camaraderie.
- Ground maintenance
- The current shared use of ELS Hall Park between baseball and soccer has resulted in significant maintenance issues and costs for the council. Particularly during the season start in September, after soccer concludes, the field has been dangerous to play. Usually taking 3-4 months for the ground to settle after the high use of soccer cleats. The change for ELS Hall park to become a full year baseball facilities will significantly reduce maintenance costs. Another important feature is that by having a single sport at the ground, maintenance work can be more productively targeted to suit the needs of one particular sport.
- The current hirer of Gannan Park, for the past 20 odd years, has been the Ryde Eastwood Baseball Club, however the ground has been allocated to all Ryde Council based baseball clubs,
- · There are 3 significant advantages:
- Will provide the Ryde Council with a permanent all year round baseball ground, bringing substantial maintenance and infrastructure cost savings;
- Will provide a second, with Pioneer Park, exclusive use baseball ground catering from the highest to lowest grade of baseball, thus accommodating the widest range of players; and
- 3) Will provide the baseball clubs based in the Ryde Council area with a clear focussed field identity.
- We strongly support the move of winter baseball from Gannan Park to ELS Hall Park.



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Theme 4 | Sports activities continued

North West Women's Football Club

- NSW Department of planning has approved 30 000 new units in the Herring Road precinct alone. Increased units targeted for this part of the city and along the public transport corridor are looking to increase our population by another 20%.
- There are currently not enough sporting fields in the City of Ryde and one proposal(from the consultants) was that both clubs
 and associations cap membership at both grass roots level and elite.
- The second proposal which will currently be enforced in 2019 is to restrict usage to 30 hours per week for each field and that includes match days.
- This will seriously limit our training capacity for our grassroots club at a time when we are looking to grow women's football
 on the back of the Mathilda's success.
- The ability to have two full sized football fields with sports lighting year round is a benefit to all forms of football/training/clinics etc. Gannon is a well designed field with a good amenities s block – that is clearly looking to be upgraded.
- There are no greenfield sites in the city of Ryde and the current price of land will prohibit the council buying any land for sporting use.
- Disclaimer: I was a member of the Ryde Sports Advisory Committee that also sat on the committee that was part of the 10
 year development plan for the city of Ryde.
- This suggestion came from the consultants who were independent of the process. This suggestion came as quite a surprise
 to those of us on the committee who had never considered an additional field could be found within existing resources.

In very wet weather, there are large amounts of waterlogged, sloppy grassed area that takes weeks to dry. In addition, at the top of the hills at the western end, there seems to be either a pipe leak underground, or an under ground creek running (maybe part of Buffalo creek??) that floods the area for weeks at a time after rain. Also, the irrigation system that was input at GREAT expense, simply does not work. In dry weather, there are small patches of green lush grass amongst all the chaff coloured grass. We think the green patches are where there is some sort of leak. I have seen guys come to 'repair' these areas over the years without any apparent success. In the 12 months after the system was input, it was the envy of the district, very green through the summer now it is barren and the parallel trenches that were dug to house the pipes are still evident, as if they were never filled in properly. One of the trenches is very wide and dangerous. The reason for this was that the trench had to be dug with a front end loader, rather than the narrow 'trench digger' as it broke down and weeks past until a front end loader came along. Again, the irrigation is hopeless and

does not cover the entire field.

RE: Gannan Park & McCauley Park Masterplan including Sports Field Lighting (Northern Sydney Local Health District)

Thank you for the opportunity to contribute ideas on the Gannan Park & McCauley Park Masterplan including Sports Field Lighting. We commend the City of Ryde Council on the upgrade of this recreation space to better meet the needs of the growing community support and provide more opportunities to lead physically active lifestyles.

Northern Sydney Local Health District (NSLHD) Health Promotion is committed to ensuring that the built environment has a net-positive impact on the health and well-being of individuals and the wider community.

We commend the proposed features in the master plan, in particular:

- The inclusion of drinking fountains at the playground which encourages water consumption.
- · Adult fitness equipment at two locations to encourage physical activity for all.
- · Increased connectivity with new pathway connection to Buna St and Boyce St to the park
- Retention and relocation of cricket nets, expansion of the playground with nature play elements.
- Seating and park furniture throughout the park including spectator seats.
- · Scooter track looping around the park and enhanced vegetation.
- · Picnic shelters and upgrading the amenities building.
- Lighting which has minimal light pollution for surrounding residents and allow extended use-of the
 park into the evening for both structured and unstructured activity.
- · Grass trails on each level of embankment to encourage walking.
- Multi-programmable open grass area retained with additional lighting.

It is also noted that this upgrade is in line with recommendations made in the Regional Sportsground Management Strategy undertaken by Northern Sydney Regional Organisation of Councils (NSROC)¹. This identified that the reconfiguration of Gannan Park and incorporation of lighting would enable the park to be fully utilised and help to address the shortage of sportsgrounds for structured and unstructured physical activity.

This master plan therefore contributes to healthy place-making which include: getting people active, connecting and strengthening communities and providing healthy food options, which is identified in the Healthy Urban Development Checklist². This is also consistent with the Council's Community Strategic Plan³ to 'create active places and spaces in town and neighbourhood centres and well-connected open spaces that encourage active lifestyles and social interaction' and the North District Plan⁴ which aims to 'increase use of public resources such as open space and community facilities'.

To support the council's aspirations, we have made some additional recommendations.

Getting People Active - Active Transport

A concern expressed by nearby residents is the impact of increased traffic to the area. Therefore, adopting strategies which support active transport such as walking and cycling could help address traffic and parking issues and would be in line with council's Bicycle and Integrated transport plans. ^{5,6}

Recommendations:

- End of Trip Provision provide bicycle parking at the playground, outdoor fitness area and water fountains.
- Install sufficient way-finding signage to guide pedestrians and cyclists to the park entrances via trail paths particularly from Beripa Close, Minga St, Numa Rd, Boyce St and Jones St to Buna St across Quarry Rd.
- Consider traffic calming features e.g. traffic islands, pedestrian crossing along Quarry Rd at Jones St and Buna St intersection to enable walkers and cyclists to cross this busy road safely.



- Incorporate way-finding signage (including distance/time/steepness) to the surrounding bike network and public transport hubs.
- Consider time-limited or restricted parking on streets surrounding the field to ease car congestion and ensure safe passage. This will be safer for pedestrians, particularly children and encourage active transport.
- Consider vegetation which is less likely to form a slip hazard with fallen leaves and flowers along the shared paths.
- Ensure that vegetation around the new shared paths will not have lifting root systems which can damage the path and pose a trip hazard.
- Ensure that the floodlights do not reduce neighbours' amenity. Hence the time of night the lights are (automatically) switched off will be an important consideration.

Strengthening Community - Recreation and Play

Creating a local space where there are opportunities for incidental neighbourhood interaction can help to reduce social isolation, improve mental wellbeing and create a sense of community². There is strong evidence that increasing green space and vegetation provides physical and mental health benefits.⁷

Open spaces which encourage intergenerational play can attract users from all age groups and promote physical activity. Co-locating the playground and the proposed fitness gym, will cater for younger and older children. Furthermore, with the recently released 'Everybody can play' guidelines⁸, there is an opportunity to make the recreation area more inclusive and meet the needs of a range of users, including seniors and people with a disability.

Recommendations:

- Ensure outdoor fitness equipment caters to a range of users including seniors and people with disabilities. Provide shading and protection from the sun and heat.
- Provide seating surrounding playgrounds which is suitable for the needs of a diverse range of users such as providing seating with arm rests and picnic tables suitable for wheelchair users.
- 11. Ensure paths around the park are suitably wide for prams and wheelchairs.
- 12. Provide waste disposal bags for dog walkers.

Community Health and Safety

In addition to legislative compliance, smoke free and alcohol free public spaces contribute to community safety and wellbeing. A well planned public environment can reinforce positive social behaviour and discourage antisocial behaviour and crime.²

Recommendations:

- 13. Follow Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED)⁹ guidelines by ensuring adequate lighting, eliminating dark and secluded sections and planting either low-lying shrubs or high canopy trees that maintain sight-lines and maximise passive surveillance.
- 14. Ensure that there are measures such as signage to minimise noise and reinforcement of policies which ensures amenity for surrounding residents.
- 15. Ensure adequate lighting along shared paths to cater for evening users.
- That a Smoke-Free Policy under the Local Government Act 1993 will continue to be enforced by council.
- 17. That Alcohol Free Zones will continue to be enforced by council.

Providing Healthy Food Options

The built environment can influence healthy food and drink choices. The provision of spaces such as edible gardens can encourage people to grow some of their own food. It also raises awareness about healthy eating.²

Recommendations:

- 18. Provide additional water drinking fountain at the northern end fitness node.
- 19. Ensure water drinking fountains are suitable for adults and children.
- Consider incorporating edible gardens as a part of the vegetation plan to encourage healthy eating in the recreation areas.
- 21. Provide space which could allow for a future community garden for the local community.

Re: Gannan Park and McCauley Park Revised Masterplan

Football NSW is the state governing body of football (soccer) in New South Wales. A member-based organisation we currently have 31 associations throughout the state – 17 of which are in metropolitan Sydney and 14 which are in regional NSW. Recent Federal Government research, 'AusPlay' has put football as the largest team participation sport with some 1.3 million players nationally and over 600,000 players in NSW.

Football is a sport for all ages, with 19% of children aged 0-14 in NSW playing football, a greater number than the other winter outdoor sports combined, e.g. AFL, Rugby League, Rugby union and Hockey. Almost one-quarter of players in NSW are female (AusPlay, 2018).

Ryde is a large football region in terms of participants in NSW, it therefore brings enormous benefits to the community. In fact, our recent analysis shows that the economic contribution of football is valued at over \$8.6 million in the state electorate of Ryde. Our full report on the Community Impact of Football in NSW can be found here.

As stated above, the number of Australians playing our game is soaring, making it the most popular team sport among children and adults in the country.

Gladesville Hornsby Football Association (GHFA) and North West Sydney Women's Football Association (NWSWFA) are 2 of our 31 local football associations across the state and are responsible for governance, competition management and the development of grassroots football in the Gladesville Hornsby region. GHFA and NWSWFA has over 15,000 registered participants (2018). Team registrations for GHFA in 2019 have grown again by 6%

Football is active in every corner of NSW, football transcends race, religion, and gender to create community connections. Football plays an unrivalled role in bringing together the different cultures in Australia. Most pleasingly, the growth of female football in recent years across the state has been remarkable, since 2015 women's participation in football has grown by 21%. Today we see female footballer's make up almost a quarter of all participants across the state.

Research evaluating the first year of the NSW Government's Active Kids program showed that almost 167,000 children redeemed the \$100 registration voucher for football- almost three times the next ranked sport. On a participation basis we are growing at more than 5% per annum strengthening our position as the number one participation sport in the state and country, and the sport of choice for many families.

To address the future of the game Football NSW, Northern NSW and Capital Football have undertaken a comprehensive NSW/ACT facilities audit to determine the current state of play, develop a plan and provide decision-makers with a clear picture of where there is the greatest need.

A key finding of the 10-month audit was that, based on current participation and annual growth rates, by 2030 Football in NSW will be 700 pitches short and will need to work with Councils and Governments to find additional fields of play for an additional 120,000 participants.

The findings demonstrated that 45% of all pitches had no irrigation and/or drainage, resulting in pitches becoming unplayable. Loss of training nights and match days in some areas is as much as 25% resulting in a less enjoyable football experience and uneven competitions when many matches are cancelled.

The audit results for the City of Ryde highlighted the following:

- · 48% of playing fields have no lighting
- · 47% of playing fields do not have irrigation and drainage
- · 48% of playing fields are below playing standard
- · Only 19% of amenities are female friendly

A high level snapshot of the state-wide facilities audit can be seen here.

The Audit revealed the challenges that Footballs growth is putting on our facilities. Pitches across NSW have an average of 155 players per pitch - in some pockets of Sydney this level is as high as 280 players per pitch. Built up areas are facing the highest stress on pitches. In the GHFA/NWSWFA footprint, the player to pitch ratio is 1:166, which is above the state average and one of the highest players to pitch ratios in NSW.

The population of NSW is expected to increase to an estimated 9.9 million in the next 20 years with the population Ryde expected to increase by 58%, which equates to over 62,000 residents. This projected population increase once again highlights the need to increase the capacity of sporting fields across the City of Ryde.

Football NSW fully supports City of Ryde's Gannan Park and McCauley Park Revised Masterplan particularly the inclusion of sports field lighting. The addition of lighting at Gannan Park will allow this sporting field to be used after the hours of 5pm during the winter season where currently it isn't. New lighting at Gannan Park will add 20 hours of potential usage during the week which is greatly needed for the local football community.

We strongly urge City of Ryde to allocate Gannan Park to local football clubs particularly in the winter season to assist the demand for local football clubs. Opening additional sporting fields will certainly play a large part in reducing the strain across the LGA but also provide much needed facilities for the community in the future.

Football certainly requires additional football facilities generally across NSW as our recent facilities audit unveiled. We urge City of Ryde to continue increasing the capacity of all sporting fields across the LGA as the population steadily grows over the next 20 years.

Congratulations to the City of Ryde for developing the draft masterplan for Gannan Park and McCauley and we look to forward to the redevelopment of Gannan Park into football fields with floodlighting.

Gladesville Hornsby Football Association is responsible for the management of Football (soccer) competitions in the North West area of Sydney and has 12 clubs located in the City of Ryde area with a total of 4,924 registered players in 400 teams in 2018. Whilst registrations are not finalised for 2019, the number of teams entered from Ryde clubs has grown this year by 6% and we expect a corresponding increase in player registrations.

We run competitions for all ages from U6s to Over 45s and have introduced initiatives such as Walking Football and Masters Football to provide playing opportunities for people over 50 years of age.

In conjunction with our parent body Football NSW, we completed an audit of facilities in 2018. Amongst other findings it revealed that on average, pitches in the GHFA area have 166 players per pitch which is in excess of the state average of 155 players per pitch.

This shortfall is also demonstrated at club level, with a number of Ryde clubs not being able to accommodate all of their teams for training and weekend home matches on their allocated fields, which forces them to play home matches outside the City of Ryde area.

GHFA appreciates the recent support of the City of Ryde in providing the synthetic fields at Christie Park and ELS Hall Park. These fields have enabled many matches to be shifted away from grass fields and has assisted in addressing the shortfall in fields – for example in 2018, a total of 127 local club matches were played at Christie Park, where previously only finals were played when there were grass fields there.

The synthetic fields have also enabled us to cater for an ever-increasing demand for mid-week summer competitions, and in its first year we had 70 teams and 341 players at the Christie Park competition.

It is obvious the potential population growth in the City of Ryde area with the high-rise residential developments occurring around us. This will only add to the pressure on the number of sports fields required in the area in the future.

Therefore, GHFA fully supports the Gannan Park and McCauley Park Masterplan and the inclusion of Gannan Park sports field lighting. The inclusion of lighting will allow this field to be used after hours and add 20 hours of potential usage during the week. For the reasons outlined above, we also urge City of Ryde to allocate Gannan Park to local football clubs in the winter season to assist the training and playing demands for local football clubs.

We appreciate the ongoing support provided by the City of Ryde for our playing community through recent field and lighting upgrades at a number of venues and look forward to the implementation of the draft masterplan for Gannan Park and McCauley Park.

North Ryde Soccer Club is writing in support of the proposal to install two football (soccer) fields at Gannan Park. We note in the Master Plan that the site has capacity to fit two fields.

Our membership is currently 623 and has grown 44% in 9 seasons or, a 4% annual increase year on year. This is natural growth. At this rate, disregarding the increase in high density property development, we will have 1000 players in the next 10 years.

With access to North Ryde Oval and the occasional use of Magdala, as at 2018, we are unable to cope with the training and playing demands of our current membership. North Ryde Oval is overloaded and as a result, quickly deteriorates early in the season to the point where, visiting clubs this year petitioned the GHFA to have the ground deemed unplayable. To alleviate this, a club working bee (comprised of the usual few volunteers) was established to fill in the holes, on a weekly basis. For lunchtime recreation, the workplaces near North Ryde Station also use North Ryde oval on a daily basis and to a lesser extent, contribute to the deterioration of the playing surface.

If we factor in natural growth as well as the multiple high density property developments, especially along Epping Road with our club closest to that growth corridor, we anticipate that applications for short to medium term club membership will hasten our growth significantly.

The need for further playing fields is now critical and as there is a severe shortage of fields with quality lighting in the area, the installation of lighting at Gannan Park is encouraged.

The Ryde Eastwood Baseball Club has been a hirer of Gannan Park for over 25 years, the ground is hired for senior afternoon baseball for both Saturday and Sunday from 12 noon to 5 pm during the Winter season which is run by the Pacific Coast Baseball League Inc, and operates from April to August each year.

The RE is a senior club which runs over the 2 seasons operated under the PCBL Summer and Winter, during Summer RE hires ELS Hall park Oval 2 and over the past 3 years Waterloo park.

The club operated in senior baseball only and currently has 9 teams, with around 350 registered player of which 105 are currently participating in the PCBL Winter 2019 Season

The start of the hiring of Gannan Park was when there was no set playing field, the diamond was placed in the mid-west side of the park. Later the ground was repositioned to its present location south-west and the club members erected the current back net and dugout areas. The Ryde Council in around 2005-2010 completed an side fencing extension and rebuilt the dugouts. Gannan Park has served very well the needs for baseball in the area, being the main winter ground. The club enjoys a very good relationship with all park residents. However due the council's policy over the recent past 10 years on increased vegetation it has become a problem with an increasing amount on the cost expended on baseballs being lost.

About 2-3 years ago the Ryde Council began to address a masterplan for Gannan Park for an alternate sport use.

Our baseball club was approached and a solution to surrender the ground was put, this encompassed 2 changes:

- Improve and increase the baseball facilities at Magdala Park by building a second senior diamond on the far south west side, plus extended toilets, storage room; and
- 2) Enabling Magdala Park as a full year use for baseball.

Over recent years due to the increased number players our club took over the Summer Season weekend afternoon hire of Waterloo Park. The ground was previously hired by another local club Macquarie Saints Baseball Club, who has full year exclusive hire use of Pioneer Park. However our club has found that Waterloo Park is not suitable for senior baseball, mostly due to the location chosen by council to accommodate a fitness training unit and children play ground, plus the increased number of resident users of the park.

Note our club along with the Ryde Hawks Baseball Club shares the use of ELS Hall Park Oval 2 during the Summer season.

Please note that I am also the President of the Pacific Coast Baseball Club, local clubs Ryde Eastwood, Macquarie Saints and North Ryde RSL are the 3 clubs in the Ryde Council areas. These clubs jointly have 822 playing members of which 210 currently participate in the Winter season. The Ryde Council is also the hub for the area representative junior and senior state league baseball, thus participation is growing. It is the aim for the PCBL to support any move towards full year baseball facilities. Baseball fields require a much larger infrastructure that most other sports and as such it becomes costly for clubs and council if ground cannot have the capital works necessary which a fully dedicated ground would have. The PCBL Executive Committee is fully briefed on the proposed master plan.

It is for the above reasons that the Ryde Eastwood Baseball Club and Pacific Coast Baseball Club fully supports the Gannan Park and Magdala Park master plan which will provide us with an alternative full year use of a new (replacement) baseball ground. Plus provide a full time ground per sport thus major economies for both Users and council with no change over issues, leading to lower maintenance costs. We will continue to work with Council and are happy to relocate baseball from Gannan Park which we believe will help to achieve a better long term outcome for the sport of baseball.

Our club and PCBL is always pleased to participate and cooperate with officers of the Ryde Council with respect of sporting grounds usage. I personally assist in several committee groups and have found utmost understanding and cooperation, and trust we will continue to improve the facilities the City of Ryde provides the baseball sporting community. Whilst we acknowledge that this will see the removal of a dedicated baseball diamond in the council area, we support the afore mentioned proposal on condition on the following:

- Soccer will be moved from Magdala Park in winter season which will allow for a year-round dedicated baseball facility. 8 CHILDREN'S PLAY PLAN - 2019 Update - To Place on Public Exhibition

REPORT SUMMARY

In 2013, Council adopted the Children's Play Implementation Plan (the Plan) with the aim of ensuring the provision of safe, accessible and sustainable high quality playgrounds, equitable distribution across the City and play value for all residents. The recommendations of the Plan assists Council with budget planning and programming for playground improvements, replacements and maintenance – all guided by a strategic approach.

In July 2018 Council resolved to review the Plan. This resolution coincided with the NSW Department of Planning and Environment (DPE) releasing the Everyone Can Play Guideline (ECPG) in 2018. The aim of EPCG is to ensure as many people as possible, despite their age, ability or cultural background, feel invited and challenged by playgrounds in their community. It moves beyond the traditional notion of an All Abilities playground, which is largely focused on accessibility compliance and catering specifically for children and adults with disabilities. The ECPG is based on three principles; Can I get there, Can I play and Can I stay. By ensuring these principles are utilised during the design phase of a new playground, all new play spaces can be inclusive to all members of the community.

Council engaged AECOM to undertake a 5 year update (the 2019 Update) and to incorporate the ECPG into the document. The Update encompassed revision of the following areas of the Plan; strategic framework, design framework, playground distribution and plan. A Project Control Group (PCG) was established, comprising members of the Mayor's Play Panel, Councillors and staff. The PCG met 3 times during the project and have assisted in guiding the development of the document.

The review has resulted in the following adjustments to the Plan;

- Incorporating inclusion within the priorities for the Plan, to reflect the ECPG.
- The design framework has been revised, incorporating that all regional playgrounds are to be fully inclusive, district playgrounds have inclusive elements, that all new playgrounds have 50% shade over the playground area, incorporation of a formal enclosure adjacent street/hazard if playground is within 30m of road (full enclosure if playground within 30m of ≥60km/h road) and easily trafficable surfaces to key play experiences.



- Playground distribution has been adjusted to address the rapidly increasing population of the City. The 2013 Plan recommended a total number of playgrounds of 88 out of 110 be retained. By 2019, the City had closed 13 playgrounds, reducing the total number to 97. The Update proposes to retain all remaining existing playgrounds and add 2 new playgrounds, totaling 99 playgrounds. Of these, 8 playgrounds will be maintained until the end of their functional life and not upgraded or replaced when they are determined to be unsafe. The distribution analysis considered the impacts of high density residential by reducing distribution from 400m to 200m within these areas and analysed barriers to walkability such as main roads and train lines.
- The implementation of the Plan has been updated, considering level of service, distribution of population, the distribution of inclusive play and equitable upgrades across the City. Where multiple playgrounds are closely located, the playground that offers a preferred location, better surveillance opportunities, access, existing features, and facilities has been prioritised.

Other changes of note identified in the Update are;

- Reducing the future Magdala Playground upgrade from a District to a Local Playground. This is justified as North Ryde Park and Blenheim Park are nearby and contain Destination Playgrounds.
- Monash Park playground will be become a District Playground.
- Incorporation of Lachlan's Line playgrounds into the document.
- Expansion with new playgrounds within Helene Park, Meadowbank (local, future delivery) and in Kings Park, Denistone East (neighbourhood, delivery 2019/20).

At its meeting on 26 February 2019, Council resolved to include the investigation into the feasibility of a new water play park in the Ryde LGA within the Review of the Play Plan. In response to this resolution, Council is advised that the northern playground within Putney Park has been identified for a major refurbishment as a High priority and will be included in the next iteration of Council's Four Year Delivery plan, with Water Play components considered as part of the detailed design. Additionally, within the 2019-23 Delivery Plan the budget for Meadowbank Park Regional playground has been increased to allow for the investigation of water play.

The financial implications of these recommendations of the Update are explored within this report. These are summarised as;

The total number of playgrounds maintained by Council will increase by two –
one local and one neighbourhood. This has a total impact of ~1% on the total
asset value of playgrounds. This is considered within Council's financial
capacity.



- The changes to the design framework result in an increase of ~8.3% of the overall asset value for playgrounds. Over 75% of this increase is due to changes to Regional (now all abilities) and District (some inclusive elements), where the construction costs for these playgrounds will increase. This increase is outside of Council's currently identified funding for Playground Renewals. Therefore, delivery of these playgrounds to the full design principles of the Children's Play Plan will require external funding such as government grants.

As such, this report recommends that Council place the draft Children's Play Plan 2019 on public exhibition for a period of 28 days. If no objections are received, Council should adopt the updated Children's Play Plan. Should any objections be received to the Update, a report on the public exhibition be brought back to Council.

RECOMMENDATION:

- (a) That the draft Children's Play Plan 2019 be placed on public exhibition for a period of 28 days.
- (b) That Council thank the members of the Project Control Group for their participation in the project.
- (c) That should no objections be received during public exhibition, Council adopt the Children's Play Plan 2019.
- (d) That Council seek funding for upgrades to the existing Destination Playgrounds to improve their accessibility and inclusiveness through the NSW Department of Planning and Environment's Everyone Can Play grants.

History

Council commissioned the 2013 Children's Play Implementation Plan (the Plan) to guide its approach to the provision of play. The need for this study was highlighted as a high priority in the recently completed Integrated Open Space Plan 2012 (IOSP) for addressing the community's recreational needs.

The Plan was prepared when Council maintained 110 playgrounds within 96 parks scattered across the City without consideration of accessibility or equitable distribution. This resulted in areas of oversupply and undersupply. As such, decommissioning's were identified to strategically consolidate the total number of playgrounds, ensuring all residents had equitable access to a variety of playgrounds.

The Plan demonstrated that Council understood the importance of playgrounds, as places for play and social interaction as reflected in their Play Vision which advocates "supporting and nurturing child friendly communities through play". The City is committed to ensuring that there are sufficient and suitable spaces and facilities for children to play freely and opportunities for the community to engage socially.

The Plan defined two types of playgrounds: Everyday and Destination. An Everyday playground typically caters for a younger age group (0 - 12 yrs), is small, easily accessible and within walking distance of local residents. Destination playgrounds cater to all ages and abilities, are larger, more diverse and complex and supported by infrastructure such as car parking and toilets. These playgrounds draw residents from the broader City catchment and beyond, often by car or public transport.

At its meeting on 24 July 2018, Council resolved, in part, the following;

- (a) That the Play Panel Members be included in the consultation process for the delivery of Playgrounds during the 2018/19 Program and the scheduled review of the Children's Play Implementation Plan.
- (c) That the Children's Play Implementation Plan give particular consideration to site conditions to ensure suitability for any proposed upgrade.
- (d) That as part of the Children's Play Implementation Plan review, Council staff and the Play Panel suggest modifications that can be made to incorporate some inclusive play elements into existing regional and district level playgrounds. Funding for these modifications to be sought through the State Government's Open Spaces and Greener Sydney program.
- (e) That Council support the Panel's recommendation that all future regional playgrounds be all inclusive and that district playgrounds have inclusive elements and that this be addressed in the Children's Play Implementation Plan.



5 Year Update (the Update)

In accordance with section 5.2 of the Plan, Council scheduled a 5 year update of the Plan in 2018/19. This was coupled with the Council resolution of 24 July 2018 and the release of the ECPG by the NSW Government. Council engaged AECOM to undertake the update.

The Update was structured in the following manner;

Strategic Framework

The Strategic Framework was reviewed and updated to incorporate the ECPG. The existing priorities for the plan (safety, distribution, site suitability and cost efficiencies) have now been expanded to include Inclusion.

Design Framework

The Design Framework has been adjusted so that all future Regional playgrounds are fully inclusive and District playgrounds have inclusive elements. In addition, the ECPG have been incorporated. Changes made include the incorporation that all levels of new playgrounds have;

- Shade: 50% shade prioritising for sand, rubber softfall and slide areas. Natural shade from existing tree canopy should be utilised where possible, with additional trees planted to supplement.
- Boundary enclosure: all playgrounds now have a sense of boundary enclosure by using mounds, boulders, trees and plantings. If any playground is within 30m of a ≥60km per hour road it must be fenced.
- Transitions: Easily trafficable surfaces should be provided to key play experiences.
- Seating: Back and arm rests required on the majority of seats.

Other minor adjustments to the priority of provision for each playground level have been made to address discrepancies in the 2013 Plan.



Playground Distribution

The 2013 Plan was prepared prior to the creation of the North District Plan and the identified population increase within the City of Ryde of 43.1% by 2036. In addition, it was developed in the context of addressing the burgeoning playground asset base, increasing operational expenditure and the context of Council preparing for a Special Rate Variation (SRV) application to IPART. This SRV was in part to meet the identified shortfall in funding needed to renew Council's Assets including playgrounds. The Update incorporates the impacts of the increasing population and how residents in high density developments live. This is reflects in a 200m walkability catchment for playgrounds within high density areas.

The Update also reconsidered the radial 400m walking catchment area of playgrounds and applied a new walkability catchment. This change utilises the road network and considers barriers such as railways and major roads to truly reflect walkability/accessibility. The catchment for each level of playground remains unchanged. In effect, this change now truly represents walkability catchments.

The Update maintains two distinct types of playgrounds, Destination and Everyday. Destination playgrounds draw residents from the broader City catchment and visitors to the City often by car or public transport, and offer diverse play facilities and greater supporting infrastructure such as car parking and toilets. Everyday playgrounds are easily accessible, and within walking distance of local residences.

The distribution of inclusive playgrounds has also been considered in the Update. By selectively incorporating some inclusive play elements in two neighbourhood playgrounds (Janet Park and Heatley Reserve), the vast majority of the City is serviced by an inclusive playgrounds on an equitable basis.

Playgrounds beyond the Ryde LGA have also been identified, recognizing the fact that these are utilizes by residents from within the Ryde LGA..

The distribution of playgrounds now reflects the resistance associated with playground decommissionings. The 2013 Plan included recommendations for 22playgrounds to be closed. Of the 22, 13 have been decommissioned over the last 6 years, with 9 remaining. The Update no longer contains decommissionings, rather recommends these playgrounds to be retained until the end of their functional life. These playgrounds will not be upgraded or replaced when they are deemed unsafe, through the annual audit undertaken by an external contractor.

The revised total number of playgrounds recommended by the Update is 99, comprised of 5 Regional, 18 District, 31 Neighbourhood, and 45 Local. The financial impact of this change is explored further within this report. The 2013 Plan recommended 88 playgrounds.



Other changes of note identified in the Update are;

- Reducing the future Magdala Playground upgrade from a District to a Local Playground. This is justified as North Ryde Park and Blenheim Park are nearby and contain Destination Playgrounds.
- Monash Park playground will be become a District Playground.
- Incorporation of Lachlan's Line playgrounds into the document.
- Expansion with new playgrounds within Helene Park, Meadowbank (local, future delivery) and in Kings Park, Denistone East (neighbourhood, delivery 2019/20).

Implementation Plan

The purpose of the Implementation Plan is to guide Council's capital renewal of playgrounds in an equitable way. This has been updated with a new prioritisation matrix for playground upgrades. Safety remains the driving force for playground renewals. In addition, new considerations have been made regarding whether the works fill a walkability distribution or an Everyone Can Play gap. Works are prioritised as High (0 -4 years), Medium (5- 7 years) and Low (>8 years).

Additionally, new actions have been identified to refine the intention of the Plan. Projects are now grouped into 5 categories;

- Expansion: new playground where no current playground exists.
- Replace: Complete replacement of an existing playground within a park. The location of the new playground is subject to detailed site assessment.
- Major adjustments: Replacement of more than 50% of the playground.
- Minor adjustment: Minor upgrade to existing playground without significant changes to the playground.
- No changes: No changes to existing playground.

The Update identifies 67 actions for Council to undertake. Of these 36 are High, 20 Medium and 11 Low. Of the High priority actions, over 66% are minor adjustments to be made to existing playgrounds. These works include the installation of seats, arm rests on existing seats, connection of playgrounds to footpaths and planting of trees to improve shade. All identified actions will increase the accessibility and inclusivity of Council's playgrounds.

Project Control Group (PCG)

A PCG was formed with 4 members of the Mayors Play Panel as well as 3 member Councillors. During these meetings, the PCG provided direction on various aspects to be considered during the Update including distribution of playgrounds, refinement to the Design Framework and the Implementation Plan. The PCG meet 3 times during the course of the Update.



Inclusive Adjustments to Existing Regional and District Playground (Resolution Part D)

As part of the Update, AECOM undertook site audits of Council's existing Regional and District Playgrounds and identified works required to install some pieces of inclusive equipment. These recommendations have been incorporated into the prioritisation matrix associated with the Implementation Plan. As identified in the resolution, these projects require grant funding to be implemented.

All future Regional playgrounds will be inclusive and District playgrounds will include inclusive elements. All playgrounds will be design to align to the ECPG.

Play Provision for Young People

During the Update process, the issue of play provision for young people was raised. Through discussions with the PCG and with the consultant, it was agreed that due to importance and scope of this matter, Council should prepare a separate report focusing purely on play for young people. As such, the Update identifies existing facilities that provide for young people but does not provide recommendations on the type of infrastructure, expansion or distribution of these spaces.

Response to Notices of Motion

At its meeting on 26 February 2019, Council unanimously resolved;

- (a) That Council include in the current review of the Children's Play Implementation Plan an investigation into the feasibility of a new water play park in the Ryde LGA.
- (b) That the results of the investigation be reported back to Council with the draft of the Children's Play Plan.

In response to this resolution, Council is advised that the northern playground within Putney Park has been identified for a major refurbishment as a High priority. Additionally, within the 2019-23 Delivery Plan the budget for Meadowbank Park Regional playground has been increased to allow for the investigation of water play.

Delivery Plan Integration

The Plan's revised implementation matrix will be used during the business planning process for the 2020/21 Operational year and beyond. This will result in changes to the planned renewal projects. Due consideration will be given to existing planned projects of community interest.



Financial Implications

As identified above, the financial implications of the adjustments to the number of playgrounds results in a 1% increase to total asset value which is considered within Council financial capacity.

The proposed adjustments to the design framework for playgrounds requires an additional ~8.3% (~\$2.47m) increase to the total asset value. This is beyond the financial capacity of the existing playground reserve. Over 75% of this required additional funding is due to the adjustments to Regional and District playgrounds. The additional budget required funds the 50% shade to playgrounds, make an allowance for boundary enclosure, and easily trafficable transitions between pathways and equipment.

As such, to deliver the full scope of the design framework recommended in the Update, Destination projects will become reliant on grant funding to be fully realised. An overview of the funding difference is provided in the table below;

An alternative approach would be to reduce the spatial size of each level of playground or to readjust the design framework. Neither of these changes are recommended due to the increasing population of the City and that the design framework now aligns to the ECPG.

Council applied for funding through the Everyone Can Play grant for ANZAC Park playground but was unsuccessful.



Public Exhibition

To ensure the wider community has the opportunity to provide input in the Update, it is proposed to place the Update on public exhibition. Notification will be placed within the local newspaper and advertised on Council's Have Your Say webpage.

Should no objections to the Update be received, it is recommended that Council adopt the updated Children's Play Implementation Plan. Should objections be received, a further report will be presented to Council after the conclusion of the exhibition period.
