Bushland areas provide habitat for native wildlife, cool our city, filter air and water, support biodiversity and reduce impacts of flooding and erosion.

They are special places to explore and relax. We encourage you to discover our bushland areas, as regular bushwalking can help improve health and wellbeing.



We recommend the walking tracks at:

- Brush Farm Park
- Field of Mars Reserve
- Kittys Creek reserves
- Terrys Creek reserves

Bicycle tracks are not permitted in bushland areas. They cause significant damage to native vegetation and to the safety of the walking track users. Cyclists may use one of the many shared cycle paths connecting our City.

- Keep your dog on a leash and remain on established tracks in Category 2 Wildlife Protection Areas
- Always pick up after your dog and dispose of waste responsibly
- Utilise one of Council's designated off leash areas.

BUSHLAND IN RYDE

Bushland areas are among the great natural attractions of our City and residents are encouraged to connect with these wonders of Ryde and help protect these parks and reserves for everyone to enjoy.

HOW YOU CAN HELP PROTECT OUR BUSHLAND

- Remove weeds from your property regularly before they seed or spread to neighbouring properties
- Compost and use environmentally friendly pesticides and fertilisers
- Ensure the things in your property don't extend beyond your boundary e.g. BBQ area, shed, fence or vegetable garden etc.
- Do not collect firewood from the bushland
- Keep native wildlife safe never feed native birds or animals
- Do not undertake any works in Council reserves or parks without approval
- Report vandalism, illegal clearing and pollution incidents to Council.

_____ CREATE HABITAT

Backyards can be important stepping stones for native animals, connecting them to bushland areas.

Help attract wildlife to your garden with these tips:

- Provide native plants for food and shelter
- Install a frog pond, bird bath or nesting box and retain tree hollows
- Use mulch, leaf litter, rockeries and logs to create habitat
- Visit The Habitat Community Nursery at 251 Quarry Rd, Ryde to source locally indigenous plants.



CONTROL ENVIRONMENTAL WEEDS

- Control environmental weeds on your property as they can significantly degrade bushland, waterways and impact our economy
- Always place weeds and lawn clippings in your green waste bin
- Never dump weeds in bushland areas where they can spread further and cause more harm.
