

FAQ's Natural Areas Generic Plan of Management

What is a Natural Area?

Under the Local Government Act 1993, community land must be categorised as either a natural area, a sportsground, a park, an area of cultural significance or general community use.

Land that is categorised as a natural area is to be further categorised as one or more of the following:

- bushland,
- wetland,
- escarpment,
- watercourse,
- foreshore,

Under the Local Government Act 1993 the Core objectives for management of community land categorised as a natural area include:

- to conserve biodiversity and maintain ecosystem function in respect of the land, or the feature or habitat in respect of which the land is categorised as a natural area, and
- to maintain the land, or that feature or habitat, in its natural state and setting, and
- to provide for the restoration and regeneration of the land, and
- to provide for community use of and access to the land in such a manner as will minimise and mitigate any disturbance caused by human intrusion, and
- to assist in and facilitate the implementation of any provisions restricting the use and management of the land that are set out in a recovery plan or threat abatement plan prepared under the *Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995* or the *Fisheries Management Act 1994*.

Crown Land

As some of the parks that will be covered in the Natural Areas Generic Plan of Management are Crown Land Reserve Trusts under the care control and management of the City of Ryde, this plan of management is also required to comply with the requirements of the recently introduced Crown land Management Act 2016. This requires all Crown land to have a plan of management applied to it by 1 July 2021. Prior to the plan of management being publicly exhibited, it must be approved for exhibition by the Minister administering the Crown Land Management Act.

Which parks are included?

The Generic Plan of Management for Natural Areas will include all parks with natural areas except for Field of Mars Reserve, Parramatta River Parklands, Meadowbank Park, ELS Hall Park and Putney Park (which have their own individual Plans of Management).
