HISTORY



1870

The Municipality of Ryde was declared in November 1870 and held its first election in February 1871.

1903

The first purpose-built Town Hall was opened in 1903 at the corner of Tucker Street and Blaxland Road.

1922

Within a decade this was inadequate and in 1922 an additional building was constructed beside it.

1950

Both buildings had become inadequate by the 1950s.





1950

Council had a choice to re-develop its current location; go elsewhere away from the heart of Ryde; or build on the "Island Block".

1962

In 1962 the Council announced the design of the Civic Centre on the "Island Block".

1964

In spite of considerable controversy construction progressed and the building was opened on 15 August 1964.

1970

In 1970 the Civic Hall was opened due to the community need for facilities and included the Ryde Centenary Library.





2005

Redevelopment of the Top Ryde City shopping centre commenced.

2007

Council was prompted to look at redeveloping the Ryde Civic Centre site during the Top Ryde Shopping Centre redevelopment.

2010

The Top Ryde City Shopping Centre redevelopment was completed.

2011

The Ryde Library moved out from under the Civic Hall to a new innovative community space in Top Ryde City Shopping Centre.





SafeWork NSW deemed the Civic Centre unsafe as a result Council resolved to cease occupying the building.



201

Plans to develop the Ryde Civic Centre site commences, with concepts released to the public.

2011

The community were not supportive of increasing the height to 24 storey towers and selling the site to developers.

2016

Council launched an International Design Competition to undertake a creative re-imagining of the site.





2017

A feasibility study of the International Design Competition winner found the design was not financially feasible.

2018

Community Strategic Plan identified a need for additional community facilities and requested less residential development.

2019

The consultation for the cultural and social plans reiterated the need for community facilities, as our current City of Ryde venues are at capacity.

NOW

After looking at a number of options and the feedback received to date, 'The New Heart of Ryde' proposal meets the community and civic needs and is financially feasible.
