- Second fridges also tend to be kept in out of the way places such as garages, which are not insulated, making it even harder for the fridge to work efficiently in summer.
- An additional fridge is often only partially filled. A full fridge runs more effectively. Second fridges and freezers are usually kept switched on 24/7, adding to energy and environment costs.

One School A Band-Aid Fix For Education Needs In Ryde

City of Ryde Mayor Jerome Laxale has called on the Government to lift funding allocated to regional infrastructure in Ryde after the announcement that funds have only been allocated for one primary school in yesterday's budget.

The Mayor said: "Ryde Council has been lobbying for the Smalls Road site to be reopened for many years. However, this is really just a drop in the ocean when you factor in State Government's own modelling that shows the City of Ryde requires three new Primary Schools and one new High School to cope with future demand.

"Years of inaction have created this problem, and providing for only one school is like putting a band-aid on a bullet wound.

"If Mr Dominello was truly committed to helping parents and school aged kids in Ryde, he would have allocated funds for a high school as well," Mayor Laxale said.

The NSW Growth Centres Commission states that an additional Primary School is required for every 1500 dwellings and an additional High School is needed for every 4500 dwellings.

The State Government's two Priority Precincts at Macquarie Park and North Ryde will see the residential population in the immediate area increase from around 6,000 to more than 21,000 people, an estimated population increase of 15,000.

Clr Laxale continued: "Be it roads, hospitals or schools, the need for adequate regional infrastructure funding is critical. Time after time we see the State Government underfunding our infrastructure needs in Ryde and this budget again fails our City."

City of Ryde Mayor, Clr Jerome Laxale, said: "This prestigious Gold Award is confirmation, yet again, that Ryde Council continues to punch above its weight and that its reporting and governance processes are of the highest standard.

"This Award is peer reviewed in competition with much larger and more sophisticated organisations, with substantial budgets. Our Annual Report is created inhouse, by committed and talented staff, and proves that size does not matter when standards of excellence in accountability, openness and effective communications are the criteria," the Mayor said.

"It is always a challenge to present complex business and financial information in a clear, concise and interesting format that the reader understands, whilst meeting the

specific requirements of a formal annual report. This Award proves that we continually achieve these high standards.

"Congratulations to all who have worked hard to achieve this gold standard again in our reporting function as it is vital that the community has a thorough understanding of the business, finances and performance measures of its local council."

Ryde was also a finalist in the Work Health and Safety Special Award.

The Awards are run by Australasian Reporting Awards Inc., an independent not-forprofit organisation supported by volunteer professionals from the business community and professional bodies concerned with the quality of financial and business reporting. They are modelled on the Global Reporting Initiative and reflect the GRI Sustainability Reporting Guidelines.

To achieve an ARA Gold Award an Annual Report must:

- Achieve overall excellence in annual reporting
- Provide high quality coverage of most aspects of the Australasian Reporting Awards criteria
- Provide full disclosure of key aspects of its core business
- Address current legislative and regulatory requirements
- Be a model for other peer reports.
