Christie Park Scores New Synthetic Surface

The City of Ryde is about to get more all-weather sports fields, with installation about to commence on two fields at Christie Park following a ‘turning of the sod’ ceremony this week.

Ryde Mayor Clr Bill Pickering and Chair of the Ryde Sport and Recreation and Wheeled Sports Advisory Committee, Clr Roy Maggio, shared the honours at the ground-breaking event, described by the Mayor as ‘a game changer’.

Mayor Pickering said: “The Christie Park project is part of Ryde Council’s \$5.5 million commitment to meet the current and future needs of multiple sporting codes with access to high quality facilities.

“Council’s investment in all-weather facilities secures year-round consistent playing surfaces and is a real game changer for Ryde and the sporting community. I am delighted that we got the ball over the line.”

The \$3.5M Christie Park Fields 1 & 2 Synthetic Turf Field upgrade includes:

- New synthetic turf surface uses a 100% ‘cool’ cork infill system with shock and heat absorbing resistant properties for player comfort
- New 1.1 metre high chain mesh perimeter fencing to both fields with improved field access points
- 4.3 metre wide path alongside Field No.1 for emergency vehicles
- Seating for 250 spectators.

Chairman of the Ryde Sport and Recreation and Wheeled Sports Advisory Committee, Clr Roy Maggio said: “Football is the most popular sport in NSW and as demand grows we need to keep one step ahead to future-proof our great community assets.

“I’ve been involved in local sports all my life and I know how valuable strong clubs with great fields and facilities help build a strong sense of community and their benefit to health and wellbeing.”

The two new Christie Park synthetic turf fields will conform to FIFA Quality 1 Star requirements. The recently completed ELS Hall Park facility conforms to FIFA Quality 1 Star requirements, as well as AFL and Cricket Australia community surface requirements.

Future stages of the Christie Park Master Plan include a centralised amenities building, additional synthetic turf fields and an increase in car parking capacity.

Disability Inclusion Action Plan - Have Your Say

A Letter To The Community - Ryde Civic Centre & The Civic Hall Facts

On 8 and 15 March 2017, The Weekly Times newspaper (TWT) published two damaging and completely unfounded articles, regarding the Ryde Civic Centre and the Civic Hall.

The Council completely refutes in the strongest terms the claims by TWT that:

1. Councillors are “wasting” ratepayers’ money on “insane” leasing of offices at North Ryde to accommodate some 400 Council staff;
2. they (the Council) could have repaired the Ryde Civic Centre for less than \$100,000 according to expert Mr John Smolders; and
3. are planning to demolish the Civic Hall.

Here are the facts:

The Weekly Times has completely ignored the facts and circumstances that led to the Council taking actions to ensure a safe environment for working staff and the public.

- In October 2015 SafeWork NSW served two Improvement Notices (defect notices) on the Civic Centre detailing unsafe conditions. The situation was triggered by failing ceiling tiles (8-12 kgs in weight). This was an unacceptable Work Health and Safety issue that put both staff and the public in danger. An inspection of all seven floors of the Civic Centre revealed multiple zones that required immediate attention.
- On 20 October 2015, Council met to consider the unacceptable safety risks to staff and public and the cost of repairs, acknowledging that the building would continue to deteriorate.
- A key issue was that any change to the internal structure of the building would trigger full compliance with Building Code of Australia requirements (lifts, stairs, disability access, toilets and new fire detection systems, etc). Independent costing of this very extensive work had been calculated at \$30 million.
- Councillors had no option but to vote for relocation.
- Alternative accommodation was secured at competitive market rates at the Binary Centre in North Ryde and a well-planned transition with no interruption to Council services was carried out.

Repaired for “less than \$100,000”

TWT articles quoted their “expert” Mr John Smolders, had stated that repairs to the Civic Centre could be carried out for “less than \$100,000”. Council wrote to Mr

Smolders of Newcastle University, to establish when he had inspected the Civic Centre building upon which he had based this assessment.

On 16 March 2017, the Acting General Manager received a response from Mr Smolders, confirming the following;

"Please be assured that I was surprised (as much as you may have been) when I read the article published in the Weekly Times last week. I was not interviewed by the Weekly Times for that article nor do I agree with the cost of the repair work stated by the paper. I wrote to the editor advising him of the error last week."

Therefore, based on this statement from Mr Smolders, the articles published on both 8 and 15 March 2017 quoting Mr Smolders as the expert advisor, have no credibility, are fictitious and are completely devoid of facts.

Civic Hall

- There are no plans to demolish the Civic Hall. The Hall was not subject to the SafeWork NSW Improvement Notices affecting the Civic Centre.
- Council intends to carry out maintenance to the Civic Hall and staff will continue to investigate alternative sites where a new, modern Civic Hall/performance space could be constructed. This is a number of years into the future if progressed and would be undertaken on the basis of minimising the impact on users.

Design our Ryde

- In April 2017 the Ryde Civic Hub Committee, will consider the results of the economic viability analysis of the winning design of the 'Design our Ryde' International Architectural Competition for the Ryde Civic Hub site that resulted in 175 entries from around the world. It was conducted under the rules of the Australian Institute of Architects and widely supported by the community through voting and public exhibitions.
- Beijing Institute of Architectural Design submitted the winning design and the jury chair, Peter Poulet, who is also the NSW Government Architect, said: "*... The design is a realistic and well considered concept that demonstrates a comprehensive understanding of the urban context.*" Additionally, Clr Jerome Laxale, who was Mayor at the time, said: "*The winning entry from Beijing Institute of Architectural Design has responded with a design that will ensure that this site will remain iconic in our City.*"

All of the information relating to the condition of the Civic Centre and the Civic Hall are on the public record and available on Council's website. The Weekly Times, and in particular its Editor Mr John Booth, owes his loyal readers and the City of Ryde Council a public apology for making untrue statements in his newspaper. This has significantly damaged Council's reputation and severely diminished the professional work undertaken by the City of Ryde Council.

Letter To The Editor

Published on 14 March 2017

The City of Ryde Council rejects the TWT article that was on the front page on 8 March 2017, titled '**\$2,000,000 \$CANDAL**', based on the claim that the TWT had an expert opinion that the cost to repair the Civic Centre could be completed for less than \$100,000.

This claim by the TWT is unfounded, lacks detail and is an insult to the readers of the TWT.

The following chronology of decisions and facts is provided to allow the community to understand and assess for themselves, the complex issues and facts relating to the Ryde Civic Centre site:

- **July 2011** – An independent assessment by WTP Partnership's estimated the refurbishments of the Civic Centre and Civic Hall to make them fully Building Code of Australia (BCA) compliant to be \$38.4 million.
- **Between 2010 and 2012** – Council developed a detailed proposal to develop the Civic Centre site (the Ryde Civic Precinct Development Proposal). The proposal was endorsed by Council on 12 June 2012. This proposal would have returned at minimal cost to Council, a new multi-purpose facilities valued at \$79 million including new administration offices, performance space, community meetings rooms and Council Chambers.
- **October 2011** – Council allocated \$0.69 million to address air conditioning at the Civic Centre and various matters at the Argyle Centre.
- Following the Local Government Council elections in **September 2012**, the Mayoral election was held on **25 September 2012**, when former Clr Ivan Petch was elected as Mayor.
- At this meeting, the new Mayor, Clr Petch moved an Urgency Motion to rescind Council's June 2012 decision relating to the Ryde Civic Precinct Development. The rescission motion was carried.
- As a result, on **14 May 2013** Council approved a Maintenance Schedule for the Civic Centre building, at an estimated cost of \$4.85 million.

Following this resolution, a comprehensive building assessment was undertaken resulting in a further report to Council on 13 May 2014. This detailed maintenance and refurbishment options ranging in cost from \$4.3 million to \$11.91 million. Council deferred its decision on this matter pending feedback from the Office of Local Government (OLG), due to the level of estimated expenditure.

This matter was then considered on **11 November 2014**, with Council allocating \$1 million in each of the next four years to meet any essential maintenance.

On **14 April 2015**, Council resolved to establish a Ryde Civic Hub Committee to develop a new vision for the Ryde Civic Hub site (this resulted in the Design our Ryde architectural design competition).

After an inspection of the Ryde Civic Centre, on 12 October 2015 SafeWork NSW issued two Improvement Orders on the Ryde Civic Centre. The main issue centred on falling cement based ceiling tiles, which posed the biggest safety risk to staff and the public.

At the request of five Councillors, an Extraordinary Council meeting was held on **20 October 2015**, relating to Health and Safety issues and unacceptable safety risks faced by staff and the public, together with the substantial costs likely to comply with BCA standards. At this meeting, Council resolved to relocate from the Civic Centre, and authorised the General Manager to secure alternative accommodation. As a result, Council secured alternative accommodation that was available at the time in North Ryde. This option provided, for the first time in many years, the opportunity to accommodate the majority of staff in one location. The pending merger was also taken into consideration when making this decision.

Council has a five year lease with options for additional periods. The current lease costs are \$1.519 million p.a. for staff accommodation, plus car parking at \$0.51 million, which is partially offset by staff contributions.

In relation to the status of the current Civic Centre site, Council is due to consider the results of the Economic Viability Analysis of the winning entry of the Design our Ryde project at the **April 2017** Ryde Civic Hub Committee Meeting. Council will then be in a position to determine the next steps in this process.

Inside - A new production in Sydney's newest and possibly smallest theatre

On Friday March 17, Ryde Youth Theatre (RYT) will open a brand new play in their brand new home at the City of Ryde's Westward Cottage. Built sometime around the 1860s, this heritage workers' cottage is having its basement transformed into Sydney's newest, and possibly smallest, theatre. The new space will be called The Underground and will be Ryde Youth Theatre's place for emerging young artists to try out their voices, test out their ideas and take supported, glorious risks.

The first play to be performed here will be Louis Regan's *Inside*, developed as part of RYT's Underground Playwright's Workshop in 2016 when Louis was just seventeen and working on his HSC. Nineteen-year-old Thulitha Senevirathne directs a cast of suburban young women; Sangeetha Gowda, Isabella Dib and Elen Attard.

"This is about staying alive! If you screw up, that's you dead, and that's me dead. That's the last seven years of being trapped in here amounting to nothing."

In a small bunker, in an empty city, in a dried up world, live two sisters who have been barely looking after each other as long as they can remember. Until the day a stranger knocks at the door.

When this intruder makes them an offer that could lead to either safety or death, the sisters realise how differently they feel about one another and how hard it can be to tell the difference between protecting someone and caging them.

Inside is a play about trust, the consequences of our actions, and whether looking after someone can do more harm than good.

Inside opens on Friday March 17 at The Underground, 10 Turner St, Ryde. Tickets are \$21.50 and \$11.50 and are available from [Sticky Tickets](#).

Inside includes some coarse language and is not suitable for young people under the age of 13.

Ryde's \$15billion Economic Output Leads the Nation

The City of Ryde's Macquarie Park Business Corridor is the nation's No. 1 economic powerhouse according to data just release. It outperformed all districts including the Sydney CBD/Inner South which grew by 4.8% compared to Macquarie Park's 6%.

Further, Ryde/Macquarie Park's 6% growth, combined with Sydney's CBD and the inner northern suburbs delivered 24% of the nation's gross domestic product growth in 2015-16.

City of Ryde Mayor, Cllr Bill Pickering, said: "This is a fantastic result for Ryde and Macquarie Park.

"The SGS data analysis shows that the Ryde/Macquarie Park hub is not only driving Sydney's booming economy, but is in fact driving the national economy.

"With a \$15billion output, Ryde/Macquarie Park is performing better than any other economic district in the country and we intend to build on that momentum."

Mayor Pickering said the SGS Economics & Planning report is a clear endorsement of Council's expert management of Macquarie Park as a world-class innovation precinct. "I call on the State Government to give Macquarie Park the highest priority by providing the critical infrastructure and revenue needed to support the outstanding growth forecast for this expanding strategic centre.

"In particular, Macquarie Park must have further improvement to its transport system. A light rail connection to Parramatta; additional bus services to strategically link to key parts of Sydney, including the Northern Beaches; and a modern, underground bus interchange are all required.

"We need to protect and enhance Macquarie Park's commercial core. This needs to be the major focus for the Department of Planning.

"All the signs of improvement, optimism and a district moving in the right direction are there - and we want to keep Ryde moving, for the State and the Nation," Mayor Pickering said.

Macquarie Park's credentials as a research, education and communications hub are supported by the number of organisations based there. These include Macquarie University, Optus, Foxtel, Cocklear, CSIRO, Oracle, Microsoft, Johnson & Johnson, BOC Gases, Sonic Health, Fujitsu, Siemens, 3M, Astra Zeneca, Goodman Fielder and George West Foods.

Kids go full S-T-E-A-M ahead at West Ryde Library

One of the first things you notice when visiting West Ryde Library is a curious group of big, green cubes containing a range of curious collectibles. And kids love them.

The Curiosity Cabinet is the centre piece of STEAM, an interactive learning program for children that uses visual and hands-on activities to engage them in a fun way with technology and discovery. Other STEAM fixtures include large touchscreens, a giant chess set, novelty mirrors and science kits.

STEAM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics, and links directly into the NSW school education program and is suitable for children from 3 to 12 years of age.

STEAM innovative elements include:

- Curiosity Cabinet with drawers and light boxes containing a changing installation of natural history and technology themed objects
- Integrated iPads with ten educational apps including Beebots and Mathletics
- Steampunk wall mural incorporating large touchscreens
- Interactive science and maths themed software
- Lending collection of STEAM kits for 6 – 12 year olds
- Coding workshops, eg ScratchJr
- Museum style digital microscopes with wall mounted large screen displays for group use
- Ongoing activities – Little Bang Discovery Club and Curious Kids Club held monthly

City of Ryde Mayor, Cllr Bill Pickering, said, “Public libraries play a very important role in shaping young minds to be inquisitive and creative and STEAM cleverly uses the power of play to lead them to technology and learning opportunities.

“STEAM helps prepare children for study by opening up a world of secrets and wonders through a combination of interactive installations, special lending kits, workshops and events.”

If you want to nurture your child’s inquiring minds, creativity and collaborative skills, then take them to West Ryde Library (2 Graf Avenue) and help them discover through STEAM.
