Council endorses COVID-19 support package

The City of Ryde has endorsed a new COVID-19 support package that will assist local residents, businesses, sporting clubs and community groups that are adversely impacted by the ongoing Greater Sydney lockdown.

The extensive support package is similar to the one implemented last year and is designed to direct assistance to those who need it most. It also contains components which will help economic activity rebound once the lockdown lifts.

Highlights of the support package include:

- A one-off \$400 rate rebate for eligible ratepayers who receive a Commonwealth COVID-19 Disaster Payment, Small and Medium Business Support Payment or a Federal/State Grant for Micro Businesses
- Eligible pensioners to receive a \$50 one-off rate supplement against their domestic waste rates
- Zero percent interest rate on overdue rates until 31 December 2021
- The waiving of more than 30 fees for small businesses and library members, including outdoor dining fees, cancellation fees and library overdue fees
- Refunds to customers impacted by the current COVID-19 restrictions
- Rental relief until 31 December 2021 to community and commercial hirers that demonstrate financial hardship (to be done on a case by case basis).

In addition to the support measures, Council endorsed the development of a new promotional campaign to promote the City of Ryde's town centres and support small businesses once lockdown measures ended.

"The current lockdown has hit us all hard. More than 18 months after the COVID-19 pandemic first emerged, we once again find businesses shut and our movements restricted to ensure the health and safety of everyone in our community," City of Ryde Mayor, Clr Jerome Laxale, said.

"The COVID-19 support package that Council has endorsed will help those in our community who are currently doing it tough and help them navigate their way through the immense challenges that this lockdown has created.

"From residents to businesses as well as community groups and sporting clubs, the support package will help everyone that needs it.

"The promotional campaign that Council will also develop will help reinvigorate our town centres and small businesses, helping ensure that we can bounce back quickly from the seismic shock that this lockdown has created."

As is required, the \$400 rate rebate and \$50 rate supplement proposals will be placed on public exhibition for 28 days.

Ryde to stage group online citizenship ceremonies during lockdown

Hundreds of residents in the City of Ryde will become Australian citizens during lockdown after Council received permission to stage online citizenship ceremonies with multiple attendees.

Previously during the 2020 lockdown, online citizenship ceremonies were only allowed to take place one resident at a time, but the Federal Government has now given permission for the City of Ryde to stage them with multiple attendees.

As a result, the City of Ryde will stage three ceremonies on 6 August, which will enable 72 residents to become citizens. This will be followed by an additional six ceremonies on 13 August, which will mean a further 288 residents will become citizens.

City of Ryde Mayor, Clr Jerome Laxale, said the ongoing COVID-19 restrictions over the past 18 months had meant there was a large number of people in the City of Ryde who are waiting to become Australian citizens.

"In the doom and gloom of the current lockdown, this is finally some positive news that we can look forward to," Clr Laxale said.

"As the son of migrants, my parents always told me how special a moment it was on the day they became Australian citizens, so I am delighted that we will be able to stage these online ceremonies and see hundreds of local residents receive their Australian citizenship.

"I would like to thank the Department of Home Affairs for its assistance to allow us to stage these online ceremonies with multiple attendees."

COVID-19 Service Update - Waste Collections

Based on COVID-19 restrictions, the City of Ryde will pause non-essential waste collection activities while the current stay-at-home orders are in effect.

During the pause, contactless kerbside services will still be operational, but all other waste services will not be available.

Waste collection services that will continue are:

- Television and Computer collection (Essential bookings only)
- Chipping and mulching service

The following services will not be operational during the pause:

- Clothing bins
- Community Recycling Centre
- Problem Waste Drop-off Stations
- Second Hand Garage Sale
- The Bower Collection and Rehoming Service
- Compost Bin and Worm Farm deliveries

NSW Government reforms benefit developers at the expense of ratepayers

Planning reforms being proposed by the NSW Government will slash a local tax paid by developers and shift the cost onto ratepayers.

The tax currently paid by developers on large-scale projects – known as developer contributions – are used by councils such as the City of Ryde to build vital infrastructure such as new libraries, sporting facilities, car parks, outdoor spaces as well as community halls and facilities.

But under reforms put forward by the NSW Government, the type of community projects that will be eligible for funding from developer contributions will be reduced. In addition, the requirement for contributions for developments greater than \$10 million to be paid upfront would be deferred until projects were completed.

If implemented, the changes will result in an estimated loss of \$60 million for the City of Ryde over the next five years. Combined with seven other northern Sydney councils, the losses will amount to \$171 million over five years.

"These reforms will do nothing but line the pockets of developers and shift the real costs of new infrastructure to mum and dad ratepayers," City of Ryde Mayor, Clr Jerome Laxale, said.

"Instead of allowing Council's to tax developers, they want us to tax ratepayers. It's a disgrace.

"In a growing city like ours, where development is forced upon us, taxing developers is essential to ensure our infrastructure continues to meet the needs of the community.

"It is only right that developers – who reap huge profits from these developments – pay for new infrastructure and not ratepayers.

"I call on the NSW Government to withdraw these reforms immediately and ensure developers continue to pay their fair share."

Rate relief for those impacted by lockdown

City of Ryde Mayor, Clr Jerome Laxale, has announced that he will seek for Council to provide rate relief to those in the community who have been adversely impacted by the current Greater Sydney lockdown.

Options being considered include a rate rebate for those who qualify for financial hardship as well as Council not charging interest or commencing debt recovery on overdue rates.

Clr Laxale said it was important to act quickly to implement rate assistance to provide support and reassurance to those in the community who have lost their jobs or had to temporarily close their businesses.

"The COVID-19 situation has escalated rapidly in Greater Sydney, with experts now forecasting that we will be in a lockdown situation for weeks more, possibly months," Clr Laxale said.

"While it is essential that we all abide by the stay-at-home orders to protect the health and safety of everyone, the impact this prolonged lockdown will have on businesses and residents who may find themselves out of work will be devastating."

Last year, Council approved a Financial Hardship Policy which provided approved JobSeeker and JobKeeper applications with a \$400 Council rate rebate.

Clr Laxale said the latest rate assistance provided would be similar and tied to those eligible for Federal and State Government subsidy programs.

"I understand the NSW Government is working with the Federal Treasury to develop a new assistance package which will be announced later this week, and it would make sense to apply our financial relief to those recipients," he said.

The latest assistance measures from Council will be included in a report being prepared this month that also outlines the support that City of Ryde will provide local small businesses as well as sporting and community groups that have been adversely impacted by the current Greater Sydney lockdown.

The report will identify and provide information on the financial impact of small business fee waivers and rental relief for Council's commercial tenants on the 2021/22 budget.

In addition, it will provide costings for fee refunds for sporting and community groups that were unable to use grounds and facilities during the current lockdown.

These measures were also previously implemented by the City of Ryde during the 2020 lockdown.

Creative Spotlight | Gavin Bridge

Tell us a bit about who you are and what kind of creative work you make

Ever since childhood I've had a creative impulse and fascination with capturing landscapes and a drive to produce large and, hopefully, interesting paintings! At a turning point in my life, I chose the steadier pace of regular income via a career in IT and opted to pursue painting in my free time. This has enabled me to enjoy the freedom to explore subjects that interest me and not worry about fitting into existing market trend or academic frameworks.



I spent many years experimenting with oil paints, but the fumes and drying times proved impractical. I now mostly work in watercolour and pastels and tend not to worry about convention and rules. I usually work in the evenings and like to refer to myself as a 'Suburban Kitchen Artist'. I enjoy entering local exhibitions and am a member of the Drummoyne Art Society.



Whereabouts do you look for creative ideas? Who or what inspires you?

As a landscape artist, I'm fortunate to have the Blue Mountains and NSW coastline on my doorstep. I enjoy taking long walks with my camera to source inspiration and reference photos. I'm attracted to strong form and contrast and any opportunity to use unusual colours. I see the world as a mix of order and randomisation and I like to interpret this as a theme in my art.



Are there any special processes, techniques or tools you use to make your creative work?

I have a preference for highly granulating mineral pigment watercolour paints, I work with a mix of printing and lifting techniques to bring out the random. I balance this with careful detailing in areas of focus to highlight order.

What is a creative project that you've worked on that you're really proud of? Why?

When I was learning how to use watercolours, I had this one gumtree scene that captured my attention. Before arriving at the finished product it took many evenings over a year, practicing and tailoring techniques and numerous versions. The end result was a finalist in the Royal Easter Show, which was a rewarding experience.



Having an artwork published on a book cover was another proud moment.

What creative project are you working on at the moment?

I'm currently working on a commission for a two-metre watercolour on canvas, depicting a Sydney Harbour scene (another favourite subject of mine). I'm also working on some abstracts of bush regrowth after the Blue Mountains fires of 2019.



What's your favourite part of working as an artist / creative?

Seeing something develop that is unique. Also, it really can be fun watching paint dry! With watercolours it helps you to understand their properties and characteristics.

What's the most challenging part of working as an artist / creative?

Finding the time and committing yourself to embark on something that may or may not work out.

Do you have any top tips for emerging artists and creatives just starting out?

Keep at it. Do not get distracted by trying to mimic what others do. Allow your own unique, quirkiness to come through.

Tell us a bit about who you are and what kind of creative work you make

I am a freelance illustrator, an art tutor, and a Ryde-district mum. I received a Master of Art, majoring in Drawing, from UNSW School of Art & Design. I've been working on children's illustration, custom portraits, and picture books ever since. During the lockdown period in early 2020, I started teaching drawing workshops for local kids online. I fell in love with this new role immediately as I just love inspiring young minds with creativity.

Whereabouts do you look for creative ideas? Who or what inspires you?

My main source of inspiration are the things and people in my everyday life. Whenever I feel the need to look for inspiration, I just go for a walk -taking pictures of things that I see or observing people that I meet (not in a weird way, of course). Before the pandemic, I used to just sit in cafes and sketch strangers or make up stories about their lives in my mind for practice.





Since I have started working with children more and become a mother, I realised that children's imagination inspires me a lot as well. Sometimes I just try my best to think like a child by adding some silliness or more vibrant colours to my work.

What is a creative project that you've worked on that you're really proud of? Why?

If you asked me this question before, I would have said the project I worked with Penguin Random House New York. It was a book jacket illustration and a few interior illustrations for *You May Already Be a Winner*, written by Ann Dee Ellis - a heartwarming and engaging story for young adults. Working with a big publisher like Penguin really opened my eyes, as I was amazed by how comprehensive the professional process could be. But now I feel my art classes are what I'm really proud of.



Truly, nothing is more rewarding than seeing the sparkles in the children's eyes when they are inspired by what I have taught them.



Do you have any top tips for emerging artists and creatives just starting out?

I guess in addition to "Don't give up", I'd say: "Take your time and have a plan". Especially at the beginning, being an artist often doesn't pay well. Many artists may have to get a day job or work long hours. To find a balance between money and time can be very challenging, for me at least. So for that, we need a plan and a strategy. It can be a five-month plan, or a five-year one, it doesn't matter. What matters is that it

has to be sustainable, so that it can keep you moving in the creative world -doing what you love and making art in your own style. One can always be an artist until the day they die. There is no retirement for artists, so why the rush.

"This latest lockdown will be yet another setback for many just as it looked like we were on the road to recovery. I can assure every local small business, sporting club or community group that this Council will continue to support you until the end of this pandemic, and will do so in a financially sustainable and responsible way."

Updated - Changes to Council operations

Customer Service

The Customer Service Centre will be closed until further notice.

Ryde Libraries

All five branches of City of Ryde Libraries will be closed until further notice. The after-hours book return chutes will be open at all branches during this period.

The <u>Library2U service</u> will continue to operate during this time, allowing library members to reserve up to 10 items that are delivered directly to their home as a contactless service.

The Home Library Service is also available for those aged over 60 years who are living independently.

Library members are also encouraged to use the online library resource and access the extensive eBooks and eAudiobooks available, as well as a number of other services.

Ryde Aquatic Leisure Centre

The Ryde Aquatic Leisure Centre will be closed until further notice. All events scheduled during the closure have been cancelled.

Community Services

All of Council's community facilities will be closed until further notice.

Council's Home Modification and Maintenance Service will continue to operate during this period as it is deemed as an essential service, however, clients will be given the option of postponing any scheduled works set to take place.
