## 2. Work Life Balance

Discussion on this topic was separated into three areas: Arresting vulnerability, caring for children with a disability and challenges in childcare.

#### Arresting vulnerability

Gunjan spoke on the booklet recently compiled by staff titles "Arresting vulnerability".

It notes that major issues in Ryde are homelessness and people on the verge of homelessness.

Many working families struggle financially.

Most families in the local area have both parents working and this places stress on the family group as it is difficult to provide child care, rent and food payments.

7.1% of families are jobless – this could be due to breaks in contractual employment.

13% of families are single parent families

6.2% of people are unemployed.

There are also a large number of people suffering mental illnesses.

This is partly due to the fact that Ryde is the home to many service organisations which assist people with mental illness.

Council is working on three main areas as a result of the above findings:

- A policy of affordable housing
- Advocacy and lobbying
- Innovation and program development

## Caring for children with a disability

Deb Maio provided the following information:

Most people with a disability are not on a disability pension

The Side by Side Advocacy Group is staffed with volunteers except for the coordinator.

It's role is to assist people with intellectual disabilities.

It assists people who may be in danger of losing their home, who have issues with the justice system

Families are most at risk when they are isolated.
