	<ul> <li>Ryde ranks 106/132 for sexual assault crimes with an increase from 42 to 72 for sexual assaults in the last year, but many of the assaults were historic – being related to assaults investigated as part of the Royal Commission into Institutions.</li> <li>Council needs to work with the police to let the community know the local area is safe.</li> </ul>	peoples opinion about safety in the local area, places of particular concern, suggestions for improving			
	<ul> <li>More information about the services on offer and workshops being held etc needs to be conveyed to the community.</li> <li>Areas that need to be made safer should be identified: - perhaps through on line mapping, a walk to highlight particular locations or a change in Council policy to ensure that big trees are not planted in certain locations and that lighting is provided at bus stops.</li> <li>A survey could also be undertaken to gauge people's opinion.</li> <li>Suggestions for changes which could be made included: lighting an area</li> </ul>	website to report areas and incidents when people feel unsafe.
