FROM BOWLS TO PARKS: **CITY OF RYDE UNVEILS** NEW PARK

The City of Ryde has a brand new state-of-the-art open space with Kings Park now open to the public to enjoy.

Located at the former site of the Denistone East Bowling Club, the park features a range of attractions for people of all ages.

This includes:

- A neighbourhood playground with shade sail and custom-made play features
- Walking paths and seating
- A large sheltered area providing a space for small gatherings
- Multi-purpose hard court for basketball, futsal and pickleball
- Passive relaxation areas for picnics and other outdoor activities
- Extensive landscaping and new tree plantings.

The design and features of the upgraded Kings Park were based on the feedback Council received from the community.

City of Ryde Mayor, Clr Jerome Laxale, said: "Providing more, high-quality open spaces for the public is a key goal for this Council. The new Kings Park has been designed to appeal to as many people within our community as possible and is a wonderful addition to the City of Ryde landscape."

NEW SHOPPER CAR PARK IN EASTWOOD TO BE COMPLETED BY NEXT YEAR

Work has commenced on a new shopper car park on Rowe Street East In Eastwood after the tender to construct the car park was awarded to Belmadar Pty Ltd.

The new multi-storey shopper car park will be located at 53-71 Rowe Street. It will be able to accommodate 146 car spaces and include a small pop-up retail space once completed.

The final design for the new car park incorporates feedback that was received during Council's community consultation, including sustainable features such as electric vehicle chargers.

The new shopper car park is expected to be completed in mid-2021.



CITY OF RYDE HELPS LAUNCH PODCAST FOR LOCAL MUSICIANS

A new podcast has been launched to help local musicians amp up their live performances and maximise the potential of their music career.

The Get Gig Ready podcast is a collaboration between the City of Ryde. Lane Cove Council, the Live Music Office, MusicNSW and local community station 2SER, with support from Macquarie University, as part of efforts to support and strengthen the live music scene in the local area.

The seven-episode series features exclusive interviews with topics ranging from the basics of music business, to marketing, putting on a glg, getting music played on radio and much more. In addition, each episode also features a track by a local musician.

BLENHEIM PARK MASTERPLAN ENDORSED

Blenheim Park in North Ryde will be expanded and have a greater range of diverse and inclusive facilities that will cater to the entire community under a new masterplan endorsed by Council.

The masterplan was developed following extensive community consultation and is part of the City of Ryde's commitment to creating well-connected and modern open spaces for the City's growing population.

Key features of the masterplan include new multi-use courts, a small skate park, a major upgrade to the existing playground and a new fenced dog off-leash area. A new radio control car track will be also be installed along with new picnic areas, pathways and a biodiversity corridor.

The Implementation of the masterplan will occur over a number of stages as funding becomes available. Funding for the first three stages has been identified in Council's Four Year Delivery Plan.



OUR COMMON GROUND RETURNS

The City of Ryde is delighted to confirm that the popular Our Common Ground program is making a much-anticipated return.

Our Common Ground is focused on sustainable food gardening by encouraging residents who live in apartments to increase local food production, reducing waste and creating collaborative communities.

Applications are now open for this year's program in which five groups of neighbours will be invited to work together to establish and maintain a food garden and share the produce in autumn next year.

Successful applicants to the program will receive horticultural training from Toni "the Veggie Lady" Salter and gardening material to establish a shared vegetable garden bed in their apartment complex.

Our Common Ground was launched by the City of Ryde in 2019 with more than 40 applications received in the first year.

DEVELOPMENT APPLICATIONS TO BE NOW LODGED THROUGH THE NSW PLANNING PORTAL

There are changes to the way customers are required to lodge their development applications within the City of Ryde, with all applications now to be done through the NSW Planning Portal.

Customers will need to register with the Planning Portal website and then submit their application via the portal. Council will then review the application for acceptance, with customers also able to track the progress of their application via the Planning Portal.

If additional information is required to complete the lodgement, the applicant will be notified via the Planning Portal.

The introduction of the new Planning Portal means Council will no longer be able to accept physical applications by post or in person.

COUNCIL AND MACQUARIE UNIVERSITY TEAM UP FOR PEOPLE OF RYDE

To learn more about the heart and soul of our wonderful community, the City of Ryde has teamed up with Macquarie University's Department of English to produce the People of Ryde project.

People of Ryde involves local residents as well as those with a close connection to the City to tell their stories in their own words.

Edited by Dr Michelle Hamadache from Macquarie University's Department of English, each of the stories offer a sense of connection and belonging, giving everyone in the community the chance to celebrate what makes the City of Ryde so diverse.

The stories featured touch on different themes such as personal development, cultural identity, community service and overcoming adversity, while being told in an engaging and personal way.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS' EXPERIENCE OF RACISM: A CITY OF RYDE REPORT

The City of Ryde has partnered with Macquarle University to produce a report on the experience of international students when it comes to racist behaviour.

The report – International students' experience of racism: A City of Ryde report – is a key component of the City of Ryde's commitment to stamp out racism through all facets of the local community.

More than 13,000 international students live in the City of Ryde, with the five most common countries of origin being China (47 percent), India (19 percent), Nepal (10 percent), Vietnam (8.5 percent) and Bangladesh (7 percent).

The report's authors conducted focus group interviews and street surveys of more than 400 young students prior to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

Based on these interviews and surveys, the report found:

- International students are likely to experience one incident of racism during their time in Australia, which is most likely to be casual or verbal.
- More than 90 percent of the surveyed students reported hardly ever or never having been called names or insulted because of their language, cultural or religious background.
- Casual racism was a more common experience with 12.9 percent of students reporting that some people act as if they are not to be trusted.
- Nearly 20 percent said they were treated with disrespect often or very often because of their background.

In addition, the report maps where racist incidents have occurred around the City of Ryde. It also makes recommendations for better involving international students in community and civic life.

The report's co-author, Dr Alice Chik, who is Associate Director of Macquarle University's Multilingualism Research Centre, said the research also found that students were unsure what they should do, reporting wise, if they experienced a racist incident.

"A lot of international students mention they are wary that if they report any kind of crime, their visa may be revoked. Depending on their own personal experience and background, a lot of students may be fearful of police, or they may not actually know racism is not acceptable and that it is not legal in Australia," Dr Chik said.

In response to this, the City of Ryde has commissioned the Multilingualism Research Centre to produce pamphlets explaining what racism is, the reporting mechanisms available and what bystanders can do they if they witness racist behaviour.

City of Ryde Mayor, CIr Jerome Laxale, said: "We want to encourage people to speak out against racism. As a community, we need to all denounce racism and ensure everyone understands that is never acceptable."

NEW ARTWORKS BRIGHTENING UP THE CITY OF RYDE

Council has been busy in recent months installing eye-catching new artworks around popular public spaces.

The artworks are part of efforts by Council to beautify public areas and complement other street art projects, including the new artwork that now adorns the Eastwood pedestrian underpass.

Here is a snapshot of some the new artwork to keep an eye out for around town:

8 Sager Place, East Ryde

Council engaged artist Nick Fintan to design and install artwork at 8 Sager Place in East Ryde, which is the home of the Fox and Bird Café.

The mural design was developed through consultation with the local community and was selected by Council's Arts Advisory Committee. It features a number of elements, including:

- A ballet dancer, which is a reference to Peggy Sager (namesake of Sager Place)
- A jacaranda blossom, based on community feedback in relation to the highlights of the local plant life
- A rainbow lorikeet, which was also highlighted several times as a feature of the local wildlife.

Ryde Park, Ryde

Developed through community consultation and selected by Council's Arts Advisory Committee, this mural was designed and installed by artist Elliott Routledge (also known as Elliott Numskull or Funskull).

Titled 'Move & Shake', the artwork features traced outlines of the classic jacaranda flower and gum trees, combined with bold and dynamic colours. And if you look closely, you may be able to make out the words 'Ryde Park', which have been subtly woven into the design.

Ryde Aquatic Leisure Centre, Ryde

Visitors to the Ryde Aquatic Leisure Centre (RALC) can enjoy new artworks that are now on display at the venue.

The artworks were designed and installed by RALC staff members, Children's Party Host Erin Hackelton-Smith and Lifeguard Patrick Peristone. Both Erin and Patrick designed and installed the artworks while the RALC was closed to the public due to coronavirus (COVID-19) restrictions earlier in the year.

The mural that Erin designed features a mermald and her sea-creature friends, with the aim to help children's minds at ease during swimming lessons.

Patrick's background as a scenic film artist helped him create an eye-catching design that reflects elements and colours found at the RALC. The artwork spells out S-T-A-D-I-U-M using an array of imagery including soccer balls, basketball nets and badminton shuttlecocks.

A visit to a Korean elderly care group more than a decade ago inspired Yung Shim Lee Kim to dedicate her spare time to helping those most in need within the local community.

Ms Kim was named the Volunteer of the Year at the 2020 City of Ryde Volunteer Recognition Awards in August for her work with the Australian Korean Art Therapy Association.



For Ms Kim, her volunteer work all began with that decisive visit to the Korean elderly care group.

"I saw that the group members were not able to take advantage of community programs due to language and cultural barriers. Coming to a new country as an older person already very challenging so I wanted to help them engage with their community and enjoy their life in Australia," Ms Kim said.

Ms Kim soon joined the Australian Korean Art Therapy Association, helping it grow and providing assistance and support for those who need it.

YOUNG VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR - CLAIRE SELLAR

Claire Sellar was named the 2020 City of Ryde Young Volunteer of the Year for her work with helping others over the past five years.

During that time, Claire has volunteered for more than 10 different community organisations including youth leadership development group Max Potential, Christ Church Gladesville, St John Ambulance and the City of Ryde.

For Claire, volunteering allows her to help others.

"I enjoy seeing the impact that my actions, small or big, can have to others. I do not volunteer for my own gain but rather helping others have a fulfilling life and utilise their gifts," Claire said.

"To win the City of Ryde Young Volunteer of the Year award I am significantly touched to think that my work has been recognised. I hope that more and more volunteer's work will be rewarded."

HOUSEHOLD CLEANUP COLLECTIONS

Pre-booked Household CleanUp Collection is a free service offered to City of Ryde residents for the disposal of unwanted bulky household items. Each property can have up to five free collections per year.

Bookings often fill up around busy holiday periods, so make sure you plan ahead and book your Pre-booked Household CleanUp Collection now to avoid the Christmas rush.

If you live in an apartment, please contact your building or strata manager as they will make a booking for the whole apartment complex.

HOW CAN YOU BE MORE PLASTIC FREE DURING COVID-19?

The City of Ryde is committed to reducing single-use plastic items due to their harmful impact on the environment.

Unfortunately, since the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic began earlier this year, there has been a significant increase in the disposal of single-use items, as well as overall plastic waste.

To help reduce the amount of single-use items and stay plastic-free while staying safe through the COVID-19 pandemic, here are some tips everyone can follow:

- Visit Council's 'Be Fantastic. Cut Single-Use Plastic' web page at www.ryde.nsw.gov.au/befantastic where you will find a stack of resources to help you progress on your journey to becoming more sustainable.
- Continue to use your reusable items and wash them thoroughly between each use.
- Make a coffee at home in a reusable cup or purchase from cafés accepting reusable cups.
- Remember to take your reusable water bottle when you go out; you can refill your bottle at one of Council's filtered water stations. A list of all locations can be found at www.ryde.nsw.gov.au/filteredwaterstations.
- Use the Trashless Takeaway tool to find a list of cafés and restaurants that will accept your reusable containers for takeaway food, at www.trashlesstakeaway.com.au.

A reminder that the most effective measure to prevent the spread of COVID-19 is to practice good hand hygiene and cleaning with a focus on shared or frequently touched surfaces. Just because we are in a period of change, doesn't mean we can't avoid single-use plastics.

REHOMING AND RECYCLING SERVICES

Are your items too good to go to waste?

The City of Ryde provides a range of free services to help you rehome and recycle your unwanted household items.

Some of the options available to each resident include:

- Book a free Collection and Rehoming Service and The Bower will collect your unwanted household items from your property
- Hold a second-hand garage sale and Council will advertise it for you, free of charge
- Book a free kerbside TV and Computer Collection Service
- Organise a free kerbside Chipping and Mulching Service and turn your branches into mulch for your garden
- Use one of our clothing bins located in more than 30 convenient locations across the City of Ryde
- Drop off your household batteries, light globes, ink cartridges and mobile phones at one of our seven Problem Waste Drop-off Stations.



SESQUICENTENARY - HARD TO SAY, FUN TO CELEBRATE

In November this year the City of Ryde will be celebrating its birthday – its sesquicentenary - which is the 150th anniversary of its formation as a council in November 1870.

For a birthday we would usually invite everyone to a party but, in these coronavirus times, that party will be held online instead.

You will be able to find out what has made us who we are by exploring our history and development through an online exhibition of 150 photos and objects. Arranged in three categories of People, Places and Progress, it will bring together items from the collection of Ryde Library as well as the Ryde District Historical Society and provide an immersion into Ryde's history which will be informative, endearing and, we hope, entertaining.

Explore a time when Ryde was known for its market gardens, orchards and poultry farms; when you could build an aeroplane in your backyard; when children made billycarts from old fruit boxes and when Council developed an innovative post World War II housing scheme. This and much more.

FIRST AID PROGRAM FOR NEW PARENTS

A new program has been launched by the City of Ryde library service that will teach people how to deliver first aid to newborns in emergency medical situations.

The online Baby First Aid program is designed for expectant and new parents, providing knowledge and important advice on how to handle the most common reasons a young baby might require first aid care.

The course includes advice on common children's illnesses, access to Parentmedic Triage Tool Symptom Checker and how to get GP help from home through our telehealth partner Medinet. Participants in the program will also have the ability to submit questions and have them answered online.

The Baby First Aid program is free to register and use. It is available online until 31 December.



Council's 2020/2021 operating and capital revenue budget comprises of the following:






Rates are essential to help keep the City of Ryde running, here we explain why.

The below information provides a snapshot of where Council's income is derived from, how your rates are going to spent over the next financial year and top-8 programs of capital works.



Sportsgrounds amenities renewal and upgrade - \$2.47 million


Stormwater renewal - \$2.47 million

In just over six months we have:

- Introduced a new Financial Hardship Policy in which approved JobSeeker and JobKeeper applicants may defer rates payments until November and are also eligible for a \$400 Council rates rebate
- Endorsed a 2020/21 Budget and Capital Works Program which forecasts total capital expenditure of \$80.64 million on projects that will assist with the City of Ryde's economic recovery
- Introduced a Small Business Support Package to provide financial assistance support for café and restaurant owners operating from Council premises as well as other commercial tenants of Council
- Walved more than 40 different fees and charges for local businesses for six months
- Introduced a new procurement policy that helps support local business and help generate employment
- Walved ground hire and sports field lighting costs upon application for the remainder of the 2020 winter sports season
- Established the Eastwood Small Business Hardship Fund, which provided support grants for more than 230 eligible businesses.

In addition, we are investing in key projects, such as the Ryde Central project and a new multi-storey shopper car park in Rowe Street, Eastwood.

These projects will create jobs, help revitalise our town centres and help put our economy back on the road to recovery.
